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MOSCOW COLLEGE'S TESTS MOVE AHEAD

1000 Lambs Receive Ration Grown in Idaho in 100-Day Experiment in Feeding

MOSCOW, Dec. 6 (Special to The News)—Feeding experiments with 1000 lambs receiving Idaho grown alfalfa are under way at the College and Aberdeen experiment station farms, reports Professor O. W. Johnson, head of the department of animal husbandry at the University of Idaho. The experiments are over a 100-day period.

Five hundred lambs are divided into eight lots of 100 each and in the Caldwell subdivision. As a standard, is fed barley and alfalfa in open lots. Lot 2 has the same ration but the lambs have access to an open shed. Lot 3 is the same as the first group with the exception that in the case the lambs drink only cold water. In all the other lots drinking water is slightly warmed.

Overriding Penalty: For failing to get away from the need for regulation of some sort of motor vehicle driving.

Indications leading in this direction there seems to be a strong possibility that the present law will be replaced by a more effective one.

A "tombstone bill" prepared for consideration by the State Legislature at its coming session, contains that feature.

"An Oregon who license is revoked under this act shall not be entitled to apply for or receive any new license until the expiration of one year from the date such former license was revoked."

It is the opinion of a driver's license is a severe penalty. It puts one on foot to an age that is geared to the automobile speed ratio, and leaves him behind while the procession moves on.

In many cases driver depend upon the fact of motor vehicle of their livelihood. In such cases revocation of license may become catastrophic.

Because of its severity, the revocation penalty ought to prove more effective than any other measure.

Unless the penalty is commensurate with the offense, experience shows, it cannot be enforced.

There is reason to believe that the proposed driver's license law would be as strong as any other measure more flexible. In general, it would be firm in mind that what we need in Idaho is a measure designed to fit Idaho conditions, no matter how well some other measure may have worked out in conditions in other States.

ONE LESSON: A common sense suggestion looking toward betterment of the game and the conditions under which it is played.

Such a suggestion has been advanced by O. D. Thoms of Twin Falls, a regular and ardent follower of the game.

It is his idea that lists of eligible players should be filed with the State Board of Control before the season's start and no disqualification without their consent.

With bitter experience of disqualification of a number of teams in last days of the past season not only rankling in the hearts of participants but disturbing every thoughtful observer of the situation, the adoption of some such suggestion would seem to be only the proper common sense and good judgment.

A condition certainly cannot be permitted to continue where high school students may be led to believe that honors are to be achieved by fair means or foul—either they can get away with it.

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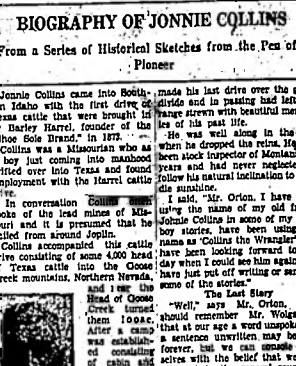

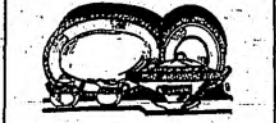

Nation-Wide Poll Finds Near-Perfect All-America Eleven

Many Stars Run Close in Ballot For High Honors

Most Comprehensive Voting Ever Conducted by Famous News-Gathering Organization Gives West Edge

By ALAN GOULD (Associated Press Sports Editor) NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—The All-America football team for 1930, as chosen by the newspaper experts balloting in the sixth annual Associated Press consensus, comes as close to being the "perfect eleven" as any in recent years. It has everything that the modern gridiron game needs.

Although many a close contest developed before the final results were posted, outstanding performers in nearly every position headed the votes cast by 215 sports editors and writers, representing 677 gridiron centers of 161 newspapers.

The poll was by far the most comprehensive conducted up to the present time, and was the first to be recognized as the performance of the Middle West and Far West.

The Middle West, featuring the work of Notre Dame and Northwestern, carried off the honors in the places of the first team. The Far West gained two, the East two and the South one.

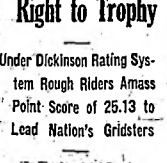

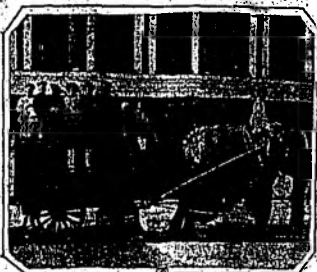
"Bootlegging" Operations in Scotland Cause Trouble For Customs Officials

AUSTRALIAN STATE RANCHES SELL AT HUGE PUBLIC LOSS

Disastrous Experiment In Socialism Begun by Labor Party Ends With Liability Of About \$12,100,000

(By The Associated Press) SYDNEY, Australia, Dec. 6—State of Queensland has disposed of public ownership cattle ranches at a huge loss, completing a disastrous experiment in socialism. Believing that profits of capitalism were too high and that the public was not doing for its best, the state government, when the Labor party came to power a few years ago, purchased a number of splendid ranches. These were managed by government officials with the aid of young men whose knowledge of ranching had been acquired at agricultural colleges. In theory the ranches should have been remarkably profitable, but the public should have obtained much cheaper meat. In practice they failed and meat was dearer. The last of the ranches has now been sold. They cost \$4,500,000 and made working costs of \$5,750,000, bringing a total liability of \$12,100,000. When sold, however, they brought only \$2,000,000. This experiment thus cost every man, woman and child in Queensland about \$12,100,000.

RAILROADS SET QUOTAS PARIS, Dec. 6 (AP)—The war cartel of European railroad car and coach manufacturers has established an office in Paris to regulate the exports of cars by each country. The largest quota was given to Belgium.

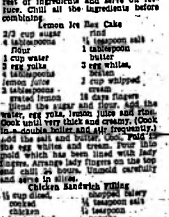

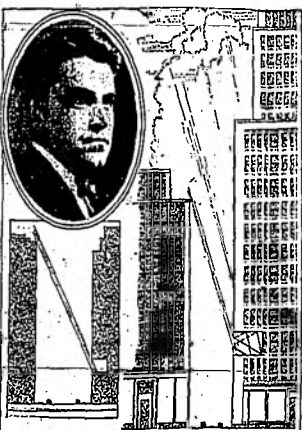
