## LEADERS OF SUGAR INDUSTRY MOVE TO REDUCE PRODUCTION

**Eight Countries Send 50 Men to Brussels to Attempt to Avert Chaos and All Look to America For Aid**

(By The Associated Press)

**BRUSSELS, Belgium, Dec. 9.—**Fifty men from eight countries gathered at Brussels today to devise ways and means to save the world sugar industry from the dangers of over-production. With one accord they looked to America for leadership.

In the great lobby of the Astoria hotel, Belgian sugar manufacturers, at which is represented every country which produces more sugar than it uses, the delegates assembled to form a committee of the state historical society, who said today that Hudson Bay company workers were cutting down trees in the forest where the pipe was found, 97 years ago.

# Geneva Preparatory Disarmament Commission Ends Work

## DELEGATES URGE EXPRESSIONS OF PUBLIC'S OPINION

Conferees Adjourn Sino-Dle.  
Leaving as Legacy Outline  
of General Treaty to Be  
Evaluated by Posternity

(By The Associated Press)  
GENEVA, Switzerland, Dec. 9.—The preparatory disarmament commission adjourned its work tonight and adjourned sine die leaving as a legacy the outline of a general disarmament treaty, the value of which history only can assess.

This outline, or draft convention, is to form the basis for the deliberations of a world disarmament conference which probably will not meet until 1932.

Before its final adjournment the committee took solemn inventory of its extensive labors and acknowledged that it had done well.

In a series of voluntary declarations among which that of Hugh Gibson, the American delegate, and of the Chinese representative summed up public opinion to terminate activity in putting government of the world along the road of disarmament.

Reviewing the history of the committee speakers recalled that it was constituted by the league of nations in 1928 and that it had been given as the opportunity seemed to offer for advancing disarmament were the final session ending tonight begun.

So far as is known at Geneva, the Franco-American naval conference has not undertaken any modification during the year of its meeting. Representatives of both countries are understood to have had occasional contact but no agreement or even understanding.

Mr. Gibson summarized the American estimate of the commissions achievements in his closing statement, saying that the committee had "analyzed and sorted what has arisen from the special preoccupation felt by numerous governments for their own security and for the preservation of peace," he said. The American government for the first time acknowledged the existence of the principles of the Geneva conference, of French policies and is supported by a strong group of French allies.

in the development of the interior, and a survey of fishing waters adjacent to Alaska.

The body requested a departmental committee to survey the Western states to determine commodities and manufactured products that may be exportable.

The establishment of silver as a purchasing medium in direct relation to the value of gold was advocated here today by Governor H. C. Baldwin, of Idaho.

He said the trade of the world demanded more money in circulation than was provided with France and England, and that the value of gold was \$10,000,000 less of the available \$100,000,000 in gold.

Particularly would establishment of silver as a purchasing medium increase in Oriental trade, he said. He pointed out that the Orientals have used silver as a standard of value for centuries.

America, he said, has been the chief market for silver in the Orient and the Americas have paid and urged restoration of the price of silver as a means of solving the depression, he said.

In advising establishment of silver as a "reasonable price" in direct relation to gold, he said, it would be no trouble to him in such a practice to stabilize the production of silver with the production of other metals, thus becoming as stable as the production of gold.

For a few years, he said, there had been a demand for silver in the Orient until the few mines producing silver were exhausted.

Then, he said, production would go hand in hand with production of silver and silver would be the chief product of the mining industry. The mining industry, he pointed out, estimates production in 25 to 30 years will nearly meet imports.

As an immediate remedy, he urged that the larger governments start rearing gold on a set basis and hold it in reserve.

As a stable purchasing medium, he predicted. Oriental trade and trade over the world would be greatly increased.










## MEN'S DISCUSSION CENTERS ON CRIME



Presbyterians Hear Problem  
Attacked From Three Angles at Luncheon Meeting

Crime was the topic for discussion from three angles at the annual meeting of the Presbyterians held yesterday at the church in the parson's of the Presbyterians church here last evening. The speakers who were present were: Mr. G. S. Smith, president of the club; Mrs. E. V. Larson, Twin Falls county prosecuting attorney; W. D. Smith, minister of the church; and Rev. Dr. James Miller, pastor of Twin Falls Presbyterian church.

Increase in crime, as manifested in Chicago "rackets," was the chief topic of discussion. Criminals of organized groups outside of prohibition, but run rackets are incidental in the general scheme of racketeers' operations, affecting a wide range of commerce and industry.

The principal cause of the crime wave, Mr. Larson concluded, is the lack of sufficient police, sheriff's, prosecuting attorneys and other law enforcement officials had sufficient honesty and courage, he said, the crime wave would soon be on the decline.

In concluding the prosecutor urged closer scrutiny of proposed substitutes for present laws, and the need for more efficient and environmental during the pre-school age. Mr. Smith said, will be vital in dealing with crime.

Father G. S. Smith, said, is advocating according to modern educational practice, the principal objective being inclusion and development of the child in all of his physical, mental and emotional growth.

To this end, he said, codes of honor are established, hero worship is encouraged, and parental self-government is emphasized.

Challenge To Church

Crime is not a new thing, Mr. Miller reminded his audience, but now, he said, there is a definite showing of 20 per cent increase in crime as compared with 20 per cent population increase, challenge vice, obscenity, gambling, prostitution, thought, and pressed these questions—Can society be safe without morality? Can Morality be safe without religion?

Among principal causes of modern crime, Mr. Miller included the World War and its aftermath, and break-down of family life.

"We," he said, "caused an emotional upset. What we need is emotional control. A majority of people are good, but they are swayed by emotion than by reason and logic."

Charging the church with failure to meet its responsibilities, Mr. Miller referred to theological controversies and "mixing of opportunity, heresies and the like."

"We have reflected ethics," he declared, "international ethics that prevent warfare, and personal ethics that prevent sins. We have failed to rebuke social injustice, and in the care of social corruption we have failed to rebuke social corruption."

The foundation of character, the mind and soul in education, is particularly important.

"The primal place of the church is to make society and religion," he declared.
