Geneva Preparatory Disarmament Commission Ends Work

DELEGATES URGE EXPRESSIONS OF PUBLIC'S OPINION

Conferees Adjourn Sine Die, Leaving as Legacy Outline of General Treaty to Be Evaluated by Posterity

(By The Associated Press) GENEVA, Switzerland, Dec. 9.—The preparatory disarmament commission finished its work tonight and adjourned sine die leaving its legacy the outline of a general disarmament treaty the value of which history only can assess.

This outline, or draft convention, is to form the basis for the deliberations of a world disarmament conference which will probably be called to meet early in 1932.

Before his final adjournment the commission held solemn festivities at its native town and acknowledged that their results were important. In a series of radio broadcasts, statements among which that of Hugh Gibson, the American delegate, struck a vigorous note of optimism in the activity in public opinion of the world along the road of disarmament.

Reviewing the history of the commission speakers recalled that it was constituted by the league of nations in 1929 and met from time to time as the opportunity offered for advancing disarmament work. The final session ending tonight began November 4.

So far as is known at Geneva, the Franco-Italian naval controversy has not undergone any modification during the five weeks' deliberations here. Representatives of both countries are understood to have had occasional contact but no agreement or even near agreement was announced.

Mr. Gibson summed up the American estimate of the commission's achievements in his closing statement. He called attention to the "ambitions and words that have arisen from the special proclamation felt by numerous governments for their national security." By this expression, observers said, the delegates, governments for the first time acknowledged the existence of the problem of security which from the side of France has been supported by a strong group of Franco-Italian allies.

WESTERN BUSINESS MEN OFFER VIEWS ON ISSUES OF HOUR

Eighth Divisional Meeting of United States Chamber of Commerce Comes to Close Following Busy Session

(By The Associated Press) PORTLAND, Dec. 9.—Delegates to the 1931 convention city and adoption of resolutions to be submitted to the national chamber marked the closing session of the eighth western divisional meeting of the United States Chamber of Commerce here today. Delegates from the meeting were expected to return to their homes today.

One resolution, directed at the anti-trust law recommendations of the national chamber, recommended that action be necessary to free natural resources industries from the uncertainties caused by the laws. An investigation into the above situation, as it affects trade with South America and the Orient, was recommended. Another resolution stressed the need for additional funds to provide forests from white pine blight, insect, fire and other natural enemies.

The division delegates favored early construction of a highway from Alaska to South America and the appropriation of federal funds for the construction of a national park. They also favored the federal government should provide for the building of irrigation, reclamation, levee and drainage bonds and other federal works. Another resolution favored the appointment of a committee of national chamber to investigate the alleged purchasing of private labor supplies by the government.

Considerable unemployment. Considering unemployment, the chamber urged the active prosecution of work by public builders and works.

A resolution condemning the government's acceptance of free gifts for national defense works was adopted. Suggestions, designed to secure Alaska included: six mail lines to Alaska, maintenance of the Alaska railroads on a 100-mile basis, and the purchase of its value as an instrument.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.—An announcement has been made in Rome of the successful transfer of some 80,000 Arabs to the desert regions of Italian-occupied Cirenaica to the more hospitable coastal plain.

"Sited on a bold promontory protruding into the crystal waters of the Mediterranean, Cirenaica is a dry, parched land with scarcely a stream or creek. A shelf of limestone hills, resembling a gigantic backbone, but hardly justifying the Arab epithet, 'Green Mountains,' stretches across the base of the foreland. Between this ridge and the blue sea, a fringe of fertile fields 40 to 70 miles wide, lying dormant for centuries, now teems with Italian colonists and migrating Arabs.

Their fertile lands "for Rome," the principal export and capital, because of a rocky bottom which prevents dredging in the mole-inhabited harbor, passengers disembark into small boats which bob precariously on the gentle swell, characteristic of these coastal waters.

While hundreds of miles of hand sanded roads have been built, the automobiles, in cutting sections, still follow caravan trails used for centuries before the trail is an amusing sight.

The principal agricultural and food crop is barley, quantities of which are exported to the motherland and Scotland. Fennel, olives, vegetables, fruit and grapes are raised in the more fertile regions while dates, figs and akacia brought in by caravans from the south are shipped to Italy, the last to be made into glazes and dhoc.

"All that remains of the splendor that was Cirenaica are a few marble foundations, columns and monuments unscathed by archeologists. The rocky roads, Venus of Cirenaica, was torn by the rains after a heavy rain storm. This graceful figure is considered by many, even though hundreds of one of the finest bits of Greek sculpture ever brought to light.
