

70,000 Persons Expect To Witness Army-Navy Gridiron Clash

Service Elevens
Await Signal to
Play for Charity

Unique Athlete Episode
Marks Greatest Good Ever
Rendered by Game of Col-
lege Football to Poverty

NEWS YORK, Dec. 12.—A unique athlete episode marking the greatest service ever rendered by the game of football to charity will bring together the football teams of the United States naval and military academies at the Yankee Stadium tomorrow before a crowd estimated at 70,000.

The ranks of those who will flock to the Yankee stadium to see the ancient rivalry renewed in the interests of the public welfare have three ranks even swelled by last-minute ticket buyers whom it had all day despite dismal weather. The game is likely to be severe and the score is apt to be short of a dozen.

No rain is predicted for tomorrow but the final workouts of the army and navy teams were held yesterday in the open air which made the gridiron soggy.

The navy worked out on the scene of the battle while the Army ran through its final drill the company town of Bronx Park a few miles outside the city, where the squad is quartered.

Although light, work was in order for the midshipmen and cadets the afternoon with both teams defining one-fourth of the budgeted football games in army-navy annals.

Since not since 1927 have the Army and Navy met in the gridiron and the ten-year-old rivalry of three years will be ended at once as the moment of the kick-off comes.

Neither Coach Bill Ingram of the navy, nor Ralph Steele of the army was able to make his definition of the team line-up because both are in training in doubt until shortly before game time.

Coach Steele said his two first-string halfbacks, Steele and Franklin, will be retained in the starting line-up and that their places in the starting lineup might be taken by Fields and Brinkley as regards the players whose names frequent the leading punter.

With tickets ranging up to \$50, the game is the highest priced affair in the history of football.

All the tickets have been handled by a joint Salvation Army-cadets' committee headed by Dr. Whalen, former New York City postmaster.

This special post-season benefit game marks the thirty-first battle between the Army and Navy.

The game will be the 121st in which three games have been tied.
