Rebates to Ranchers For Power Used by Pumps

BOISE, Dec. 12 (AP)—Rebates to farmers on power used in irrigation pumping were fixed today by the state auditor at \$90,000 in excess over \$750,000 a year ago.

The increased rebate was attributed to two factors, a marked increase in the amount of power used this season, and a change in the system of figuring the rebate. Under the new system the grower gets the rebate on the actual amount of power he uses while before it was on a set basis determined on the installed power available to him.

The total value of the equipment used in irrigation pumping was \$1,000,000 in 1929 compared with \$750,000 a year ago.

TEMPERANCE
Curiously enough, while the air is full of clamor about prohibition repeal and home-made wine and revivals of the brewing industry, some one starts talking about Francis Murphy and the remarkable normal he made.

It was sixty years ago that Murphy delivered his first temperance speech in Portland, Maine. He knew what he was talking about, for he himself had been a drinker. He developed a notable oratorical gift and spoke with persuasion. Three years later, in the business department of eight hundred agents, he is really trying to impress the country.

There has been discussion of temperance and temperance movements in the last year or two, but nothing much has come of it. Possibility of temperance movements will not flourish under a system of compulsory deprivation. If prohibition is abolished or liberalized, will it be different?

With prohibition or without it, there should be honest, unemotional instruction and persuasion as to the evils of intemperance.

WORLD COURT
A petition from an influential group of Ohio citizens, asking the Senate to let the United States join the World Court, as requested by President Hoover, seems to express the reasons thereof unusually well.

"The promulgation with which the signatory nations unconditionally accepted four of the five basic international in their hundred treaties, and the equally prompt and generous spirit in which in nineteen hundred treaties they accepted the Four Big Four agreement with the fifth reservation, in our judgment, bearing in mind the customary amenities of international intercourse, call for action without further delay on the part of the Senate.

It is the thought by many who see any danger to the peace and safety of our country involved in the rendering of advisory opinions by the court, assuredly the right of withdrawal at any time at our discretion, as provided for in the Four formula, should be ample protection for the most powerful nation in the world against such danger.

There are good grounds for believing that a majority of the American people are in favor of this step. The Senate will decide it again, long and wisely, and probably keep it in the end as it accepted the London pact treaty.

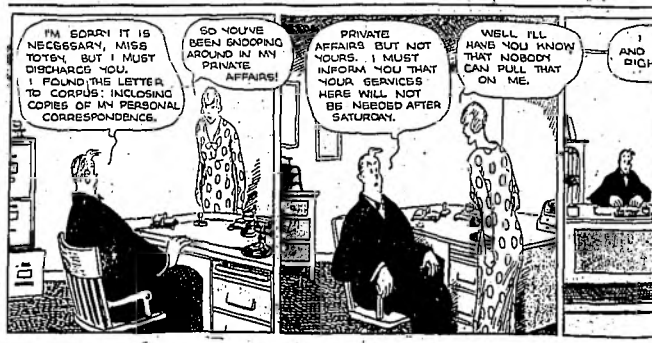
