

Indiana's Pistol Champion Wins Title of 1930 Corn King

GROWER OF YEAR'S BEST GOLDEN GRANN SCORES AT EXHIBIT

Herbert C. Watson's Field Yields 102.7 Bushels An Acre Despite Dry Season

New Ruler of Mid-West Agriculturalists Makes No Boast of Years of Experience

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, Dec. 20.—As a corn expert of the world's grain is a pretty good golfer, a football enthusiast and the best pistol shot in the state of Indiana.

Herbert C. Watson's 20 years of Reid's Yellow Dent won him the corn championship at the international livestock show in Chicago. Like most corn kings of other lands, he comes from Indiana—Tipton, to be exact—where he brings to his farm thence markedly individual characteristics.

He is 30 years old and makes no boast of long years of experience and patiently cultivated ability. While the exception of one, perhaps, he is the youngest corn king in history.

He is not a commercial seed man, although he does sell certified seed from his farm. Of his 123 acres only 43 acres were in corn in 1930.

One Year of Study He spent only one year in agricultural college study at Purdue, and that was nine years ago. After that his father bought the farm for him and he went to work on it as a boy of 21.

In school, as Purdue teachers remember it, he gave no particular promise and was looked upon as a good pistol shot than as a corn expert.

When he came to the national exhibit at the international livestock show, he won no fame comparable with that of his son.

Despite the 1930 drought which ruined the corn crop in wide areas in Indiana, Watson was able to grow a crop of 102.7 bushels an acre on a five-acre tract to win for the fourth successive time the title of corn king of a crop of more than 100 bushels per acre.

At the grain show, after the award was announced somebody said Watson looked more like a broker than a farmer. He is well dressed, with a physique like a football player, and looks even younger than 30.

Watson manages at 20 to keep another Indiana, L. O. Vogel, Hope, who won the title last year with a crop of 100 bushels an acre. His father has been developing for 50 years.



DESPITE HIGH ORE FINDS VAST AREAS REMAIN UNTOUCHED

University of Idaho School of Mines Summarizes Reports on Mineral Wealth

MOSCOW, Dec. 20.—Since Captain E. D. Pierce dipped his pan into the sands of Catal gulch, a tributary of the Clearwater river, in the summer of 1860 and found gold, Idaho has produced more than \$1,000,000,000 worth of the precious metal, according to a compilation of the University of Idaho school of mines. Captain Pierce's first pan yielded only about 3 cents in gold but subsequent tests along Catal gulch were the signal for a stampede of miners, which developed into the second of the three great Western gold rushes.

Sixty-nine years have passed since the prospectors followed the stream from the fabulously rich diggings of Central Idaho. Lode mining has supplanted placer mining as the principal means of obtaining the vast store of mineral wealth deposited within the borders of Idaho. The all-time production of Idaho mines is based on figures of the United States geological survey, the Idaho bureau of mines and various "philatelic" documents, announces Dean J. W. Finch.

This metal has accounted for a total of \$502,000,000, more than twice the value of silver, which has contributed \$222,000,000. 

RETAILERS IN EAST CUT PRICE OF BEANS

Heavy Reduction Follows Opening of Advertising For Great Northerns

Excessive retail prices on Great Northern and Red Mexican beans has been largely eliminated over the last few weeks, according to a statement given out yesterday by C. H. Deweller, manager of the Southern Idaho Bean Growers' association. As a part of their national advertising campaign and through the efforts of the growers' organizations, their sales agents and sales representatives they have been making a drive on retail stores to put their beans out at a reasonable price, he said.

Mr. Deweller's statement follows: "Retailers and jobbers who have stocks of beans purchased at the present market have been induced to cut their retail price. This has brought the consumer price in line with quotations to growers, and has resulted in the narrow margin over known between wholesale and retail prices. This is hereinafter, complete very materially, according to reports.

As an example one of the largest chains in Ohio to make a special of Great Northern and Red Mexican beans over their counter every first day and held the price right there at a cent per pound and are doing a big business every day on these beans. By getting the retail price down we are making more profit for Great Northern and Red Mexican and by introducing them at the most value for the money of all food products we are increasing consumer profit very much.

"In launching the more for lower prices, the association and their sales agency have followed the lead of other large cooperatives when confronted with similar market conditions. The California Bean Growers' association for example, included in their billboard advertising last fall the statement 'Beans are cheaper this year.' In addition to convincing consumers that the price offered is cut to the consumer, we stressed the fact that Great Northern beans are a fair value.

"At the present time the margin between the wholesale and retail prices on beans is narrower than it has ever been in most of the Eastern territory and we are going to keep up the drive till we have convinced every consuming territory. Until the organized effort for reduced retail prices, the differential in the market was very much out of line, beans selling most everywhere at the same retail price as they were when the grower was getting six cents or better. This was because jobbers and retailers were holding small stocks bought at higher prices and were unwilling to make the small sacrifice on these small stocks. As soon as it was pointed out to them that by selling these stocks in line with new prices and getting a good volume at the lower price they were very quick to make the change.

"Through the medium of their friends also agents they are developing many new markets. They are adding their influence to that of sales agents in cutting down the price differential between the producer and the consumer—or in other words, placing the necessary cut to the consumer who is entitled to this benefit. This sales differential program and the resulting of 'High quality food at lowest price' is expected to prove a very large factor in moving out the present crop at prices favorable both to the producer and consumer."
