



# W. W. DEAL URGES HOME PERMANENCY AT RUPERT SESSION

100 Grangers Hear State  
Master Emphasize Purpose  
of Agriculture—"to Mag-  
nify Virtue of Home."

(Special to The News)  
RUPERT, Jan. 1.—In a dinner speech delivered Wednesday night at the Hotel Minidoka, the state master of the 100,000 members of the State Orange Master W. W. Deal, stamp departing from a discussion of the "Orange Master's" efforts to bring the Orange to "bring agriculture back to its original position—that of making homes of permanency." 

# Taxation and Unemployment Occupy 44 States' Legislators

## MATTERS INVOLVING FINANCE DOMINATE SOLONS' THOUGHTS

Extension of State Taxing

Powers Appears Noticeable in Trend of Times In Many Commonwealths

**N**EW YORK, Jan. 1.—Two economic extremes—domestic on the one hand—and on the other, foreign—liberal—sluggish spending and unemployment—challenge the legislative ingenuity of American commonwealths this month.

Taxation is the everlasting chore of lawmakers. This year it is made intricate by the problem of unemployment.

In 20 of the 44 states whose legislatures will be in session this year, most of them convening the month after the election, there is a demand for certain measures of economy. To the remaining states economy lacks primary emphasis only because it is not a major item in the immediate matters of state concern.

The picture is sharply sketched in

statements to The Associated Press by the correspondents at state capitals throughout the country. An attempt by the last Idaho legislature to tax stocks of banks and similar institutions was defeated by a vote of 30 to 10. The South, taxation seems large again this year as the major problem of the Far West—Southerners are asking for a "flat" tax, revision of the old "partial" taxation will bloom again everywhere in the Middle West.

The 30 states in which money promises to be the transcendent concern of lawmakers during the current session are: Maryland, New Mexico, Idaho, Kansas, West Virginia, Michigan, Illinois, Oregon, Wyoming, Colorado, Missouri, Nebraska, Iowa, North Carolina, Vermont, North Dakota, South Dakota, Washington and Nevada.

The question of state taxing powers is a noticeable tendency. That individual citizens, particularly property owners, are taxed more heavily than the public, has charged him representative in the state capital to do two things: (1) Reduce state expenditure to a point where it can be met by taxation, and (2) seek means to additional tax monies by extending taxation to reach individuals.

Idaho farmers and other residents of the state are asked to pay more taxes this year, that the legislature find some method of lowering taxes. The method proposed is an income tax on all property.

# BETTER DAYS LOOM IN AVIATION WORLD DURING NEXT YEAR

**MEDICALS OF SOUND BUSINESS AND ECONOMICS TREAT OVER-EXPANSION AND 1931 PROMISES HEALTHY INDUSTRY**

**WARNING:** Jan. 10—Aviation's horoscope bodes better days ahead, but the nation must be alert.

Chiefly—small aircraft generally recognized to have faced a hard year and leaders believe, since the day has been well-watered, leaders will but to build on a solid foundation.

Overdevelopment, a serious ill incurred by the industry, is blamed in a cable that administered the medicines of sound business and economics. 1931 heritage is being made a healthy industry.

The major projects launched by the post office department when the year began have been completed but a number remain.

Chief among these will be a straightening of lines along the coast from San Francisco to the Carolinas, will be placed on the airmail map and probably become the American terminus of an international line between Europe and the Americas via way of Bermuda and the Azores.

In the Middle West an extension planned connecting Louisville, Kentucky, with Lubbock, Texas. An international connection to Winnipeg, Canada, through the twin cities of St. Paul and Minneapolis, will connect Denver with Pueblo with Fort Worth and a line run from Fort Worth to El Paso.

A transcontinental airmail line may be definite since the post office department prepared to offer a contract to operators starting Feb. 1, 1931, though earlier date is anticipated. It will depend on service as far as Terre Haute.

The United States already has the world's greatest network of highways and roads and the department of commerce will augment the system with 3000 miles by June 30.

Post office department stations will be extended so that by the same date there will be scarcely a square mile in the country where there is no post office. The post pilot will not be able to receive weather information during flight.

To direct the enormous sums spent annually in erecting stands and catering to the public to more

substantial prizes Cleveland has been stamping the permanent license of the air races.

In military circles, too, both in the U.S. and abroad, the half-way mark in their five-year programs, the outstanding event in the coming year is expected to be the introduction of a new type of aircraft, one well-designed in the field and modern, the world's lighter-than-air craft.



## FERTILIZER MINOR FACTOR FOR BEANS

**Tests Here Show Increase in Yield Does Not Pay For Material Applied**

Unsophisticated farmers in Twin Falls county have not given the increase in yield that was obtained on most other crops, according to a report of the Soil Conservation Service, Bureau of Soils, Idaho Falls, to the county agent.

Only indirectly, the county agent concluded, can bean crop production be increased by applying phosphoric fertilizer, and that is where phosphate is used to increase yields of other crops that contribute humus to the soil.

Even on the soil where phosphoric gave large increases in yield, no notable increase in the vine or leaf growth of beans could be noted, even though the vine was reported on the Okanogan and Spokane lines, and both farms showed an increase, but not enough to pay the extra cost of beans for application.

Test Results

Where a test plot on the Glasser Ranch yielded 32 bushels of Great Northern beans per acre, a plot with 123 pounds of ammonium phosphate per acre yielded only 100 bushels, and another plot with 250 pounds of phosphate was used yielded 287 bushels of bean per acre.


