FEATURE FLASHES FROM FAR-FLUNG FOREIGN FIELDS

King Of Abyssinia Sits On Shaky Throne As Claims To Titles Stir Feudal Rulers

Provincial Chieftains, Real Powers of Land, Said to Have Supported New Emperor in Return for Promises of Formal Crowning, Declare Selassie I Lacks Royal Blood

ADDIS ABABA. Abyssinia—Selassie I sits on a shakily throne which Ras Tafari erected for himself in this strange city and which he ascended with the title of Emperor Haile Selassie I.

The tumultuous shouting of the coronation pageantry had scarcely dimmed before

feudal rulers of the provinces began to argue that several of their number have more legitimate claims to the "King of Kings" than does Ras Tafari, who was born as a king later than ever before.

The mutinous aspirants, however, are not royalists, but they are the real powers of the country and it is said that the new emperor was their "supported" by promising to reward them with titles and lands as well as titles of nobility.

The provincial rulers are descendants of the original tribesmen who founded the ancient empire of Abyssinia, the throne of which was occupied by the son of

King Menelik II, the last ruler of the empire.

One who has joined the debtors' camp is a debt collector who carries the same name, and the debtor, guarantee and creditor make a weird trio as they stalk through the streets

of Addis Ababa, the capital of the empire.

There are great sections of the population of the land who believe he still is on the throne. This is nothing uncommon either for Abyssinia to take advantage of the situation or for the United States faith as they would in the name of God.

These rebels have lived in the capital for many years, trying to know the almost continuous strife between the real tribal groups and the 100,000-strong army of the emperor.

Their scheme is to get the emperor to Tafari and his older brother and brother-in-law to the throne, and then to the native Abyssinians who were forced to flee the capital, "take over" which was at one time a kingdom.

For Commemorations

The emperor's influence is said only in the Addis Ababa district where he has built a large French-Abyssinian railroad. Outside these limits he must depend upon holding the good will of the tribal leaders, who are the real power in the country.

It is true that Tafari has a trained army of his own of 60,000 men, but the rebels can always raid the telegraph and other communications.

If the rebels succeed, however, in the interior, it would be big business for them and there would have to face a force of perhaps greater strength and made up of equally good fighters.

Their advantage would be in their knowledge of the terrain, especially the mountainous regions.

They are said to be well armed with rifles, machine guns and airplanes which foreign governments have given them.

But an empire's victory by means of these foreign engines of war would not enhance the standing of Tafari among the people.

Dependence on Foreign Powers

In the last analysis his permanent must rest upon the support of the three great powers, England, France and Italy, which, by virtue of a collection of big debts, now do, together, to Abyssinia and her country in the form of the exercise of a sort of benevolent dictatorship over the realm.

But here again, Tafari's power cannot be sure of the dependence of his supporters.

Another source of danger to the emperor is Li Yau, grandson of Mengole, who was captured by the British and the Chinese, and is now in British service and actually occupied

Work Begins on Railroad Bridge in Africa to Open U Undeveloped Region

LONDON, Jan. 3 (AP)—Tapping the mineral wealth of Rhodesia, the British government has announced that the construction work will be started for three years on the 100-mile-long bridge which will be

cross the Zambezi River to connect the Trans-Zambezi and Central African roads.

The bridge will be built in two sections, each 50 miles long, and a rail connection with the road system will be made at the junction.

Construction material must be British, and British engineers and workmen

will serve the far-flung river.

Connected by the Trans-Zambezi and Central African roads, and an all-weather road, the bridge will be a great boon to the undeveloped region.

At the head of the government, the contract price of the all-weather road is £1,000,000, and the contractors must be British.



Anti-Socialist Lawyer In Austria Takes Office As New Manager of Republic

Writer of Constitution of Province of Vorarlberg and Self-Appointed Governor Assumes High Post

VIEENNA, Jan. 3 (AP)—A man who once was a member of the Communist party in Austria because his wife was ill has been called to the management of the republic.

He is Dr. Otto Ender, self-appointed manager of the province of Vorarlberg on the Swiss frontier.

Dr. Ender not only placed himself as governor in 1918, but he was elected to the Diet, the legislature, when he went to Vienna a week ago to assume the chairmanship of the Vorarlberg provincial assembly.

He has assumed the chairmanship, left to the superintendent, and decreed that the Vorarlberg traditions, in accordance with his wife's wishes, shall be observed.

STUDENTS ASK FOR ENGLISH IN TURKEY

Lack of Instructors Hinders "Americanization" Drive in Study of Languages

ANGORA, Turkey, Jan. 3 (AP)—Large numbers of Turkish students want to learn English as a second language.

But there are no qualified teachers for them, are two facts

emerging from Turkey's Americanization program.

The program was added to French and German in Turkish schools as one of the foreign languages.

Educators here attribute the government's eagerness to have English rival French as a second language to its desire to "make English the 'business tongue of the world.'

They admit, however, that the teaching of English is not yet fully developed in the country.

The lack of qualified teachers

is due mainly to the fact that

the number of English-speaking

people in the country is limited.

Students here are asked to

study English in their free time.

But there are not enough English-speaking

people in the country to teach

them English.

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
