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
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

## IDAHO FARM CROPS

## FOR RELIEF NEEDS

Twin Falls Chapter Would Endeavor to Collect \$2000 Worth of Beans and Spuds for Drought-Stricken Area

With the Red Cross Crop Fund appeal, it is suggested that the Red Cross national headquarters will endeavor to collect and contribute beans, potatoes and other vegetables for a campaign for relief of sufferers in drought-stricken areas of the United States.

A. L. Ervin, Twin Falls, who was designated by the meeting to submit this proposition to the Red Cross national headquarters, estimated that the Twin Falls chapter in this relief campaign would have here one carload of beans and two carloads of potatoes which, at current market prices in the Mississippi river region, would cost approximately \$10,000.

Mr. Ervin suggested that Twin Falls, with its large number of farms, had the highest price per bushel and the retail price at between \$10 and cents a pound. Number 2 potatoes, he figured as being worth 10 cents a pound, were being sold at 15 cents a pound.

Warehouse receipts in Twin Falls for storage of donations of beans and potatoes exceed \$10,000, and the Red Cross, through the Hayden Bean company, C. P. Dorsey, told the meeting last evening.

The Red Cross chapter to which reference was made last evening "showed that the national organization "some three thousand carloads of corn, beans and a similar amount of beans from Twin Falls, and paid transportation charges to Porto Rico for its relief activities following a disaster."

**Relief Threatens**

The call for the Twin Falls Red Cross chapter for assistance in the relief work of the drought-stricken area was delivered to Mrs. Sturgess McCoy, chairman, Wednesday, from San Francisco divisional headquarters.

"Greatly increased demands during the past 10 days," this message said, "have made immediate relief funds to meet an emergency situation existing throughout parts of 20 states in the drought-stricken area. An amount of \$100,000 is needed to prevent starvation among the most destitute groups."

MONUMENTAL WORK OF RELIEF OF FAMILIES IN THE DROUGHT-STRICKEN AREA has been done, it was reported yesterday, so that "your people will not fail to meet their share in this monumental task." Dr. W. H. Verney, president, Dr. J. M. Jackson, secretary of the Idaho Farm Crop Fund, and Dr. John W. Grimes, chairman of the Men's Brotherhood of the church on Sunday at 8:30 P. M., Dr. Verney will speak at a banquet of the church members.

The program will be put on at the regular evening service by the young people, and Dr. Verney will speak during the service.

Genes appear similar in spite of effects

PARADEA, Cal., Jan. 15 (UPI)—The invisible "genes" which genetically govern all hereditary characteristics from color to height, are believed to share a close relationship with the variety of their effects.

On the basis of Dr. C. E. McClintock's work in the Collie dog, it is known that genes, like steps in a staircase, increase in step with their rate of reproduction, even through a great range of variation.

Genes are considered as strong together, and the more closely related they are, the same rate as those of their neighbors; their division leads to division of the chromosomes which lie side-by-side within the cell.
