**RUSSIAN TELLS OF  
QUAKE CAUSING 71  
DEATHS IN MEXICO****Film Producer Gives Eye-  
Witness Account of Cata-  
strophe Fatal to Many  
Worshippers at Guadaloya**

(By The Associated Press)

**MEXICO CITY, Jan. 17.** — Death of 71 persons in a church at Guadaloya during Wednesday night's earthquake was related today by Serge Eisenstein, Russian film director, who returned here today with the eye-witness account of the disaster.

Eisenstein, who has been in Mexico for some time making motion pictures, came from all parts of the country to witness the quake for a film.

When the quake struck to worshippers and a priest were killed outright, and 20 have died since from their injuries. In all, 10 old priests, built years ago by the Spanish conquerors, leaped into their midst.

Guadaloya, 30 miles west of Oaxaca, was badly damaged by the quake.

The Soviet producer brought back a vivid account of the disaster in Oaxaca, where he had been recovering because of the great mass of debris inside the church. Most of the bodies of the dead were still standing upright, and spines had been saved.

Eisenstein said only 10 feet below him in Oaxaca, the largest and most important cathedral in Mexico, was constructed. The market place was shaken down and all the houses three stories high both sides.

He added that the body of the 71 who died at Guadaloya had been recovered yesterday because of the great mass of debris inside the church. Most of the bodies of the dead were still standing upright, and spines had been saved.



## ON THE SIDELINES

HENRY CHADWICK, father of baseball, probably would not recognize some of the game he made. If he could see it played today, but as early as 1874 he had some same ideas on the subject of hitting.

Father Chadwick wrote a baseball manual in 1874, when he was baseball editor of the New York Clipper. In defining the expression "popping one up," he said:

"This term is applied to a ball hit up high, which readily falls into the hands of an infielder. It is the poorest hit in baseball." Baseball has changed but pop-ups have not. Fifty-six years after the great Chadwick wrote his indictment of a poor hit, he called it the poorest hit made.

His definition of a hit:

"This term is applied only to a player who is not only experienced and skillful, but also has physical qualifications; but who also uses his mental powers in the game to aid him to excel."

There are major league managers who will say there are few "artists" playing baseball.

HENRY CHADWICK'S 1874 manual was published in England and was intended to make baseball popular among the British. He told the British they could not afford to neglect baseball for it was far too good a game to overlook. That they did not take his advice is another story, and probably it was not for lack of knowledge for he told them all about it.

TOOK UP each position and advised prospective British players in detail. Catchers were told that it was not safe to throw with great accuracy and speed a live ball a distance of 50 yards and be able to stop and pitch half-inches from grounders, and he especially on the alert in judging foul-bound balls, batters having the nerve to face sharply tipped bats direct from the bat."

In those days the catcher played back when the bases were unoccupied and caught pitched balls on the bound. With runners on he came up under the bat. Hence the reference to throwing with "speed and accuracy" a distance of 50 yards to him at his point farthest removed from second base he would not be more than 160 feet.

CHADWICK refers to one word of baseball slang which has fallen into disuse. The term "muffin" is not applied to the palookas of today. Said he: "A player may be able to hit long balls and to make home runs, and yet for all that, be a veritable muffin from the simple fact that he can not field, catch or throw a ball decently. Muffins are the lowest in the class of club men. Next to them come the 'amateurs,' then 'second nines,' and then 'first nines'."

Fans in some major league cities possibly will agree that there are a few "muffins," and undermine ones at that, in fact company today.




