NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—An appeal to the American people to donate \$2,000,000 to the American Red Cross for relief of the drought sufferers was broadcast over a national radio network tonight by the national broadcasting system and the voice of President Hoover led the list.

The president, as head of the Red Cross, and Judge John Burton Payne, its chairman, spoke from Washington.
