## Senate Approves Loan Bill Under Threat Of Veto With Two Overseas Men Opposed

Reed, Pennsylvania, and Bingham, Connecticut, Participants in War in Europe, Join Borah in Expressing Objection to Passage of Measure Giving \$400,000 Men \$500 Each

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—The senate passed the veterans' loan bill tonight, 74 to 12, completing one of the most dramatic scenes in the administration of Woodrow Wilson. The measure to which the president yesterday vetoed his vigorous objections was passed by the senate with only the votes of 34 Republicans for a bill with the support of many of those administration members in debate.

Applause rang from the galleries and the floor as the overwhelming majority of the senate passed the bill at the completion of the roll call shortly after 8 P. M.

The bill would allow World War veterans to borrow up to half of their compensation certificates at an average of \$300 to each of the 2,000,000

Two overseas veterans—Sen. Reed, Pennsylvania, and Bingham, Connecticut, who were in the army and navy respectively, joined in opposition to the measure in today's debate. Senator Borah also joined in opposition to the measure as it now stands.

It was passed by the senate in the afternoon, after the bill had been approved 74 to 12 on Monday. Bolstered with these tremendous majorities, the legislation will now go to the White House tomorrow and a certain vote was forecast.

Senator Harrison, Democrat, Michigan, introduced the measure today. It would be passed over the veto and the Republican leaders tonight confided that the measure would be passed.

Alarm that the measure might be killed by a pocket veto without returning it to congress before adjournment was allayed later in the day by the bill's passage in the senate.

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## LAW-MAKERS COST 45 STATES YEARLY ABOUT \$15,000,000

Number of Persons Taking Part in Affairs at 45 Capitols—Totals Approximately 15,000 at Present

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, Feb. 19.—The big business of passing legislation in the 45 states, around \$15,000,000 this year.

Forty-four state legislatures are now at work. Another gets started in April. More than 6000 men are at the state legislatures.

At the last session, on the basis of previous legislation it may be expected to produce 6000 bills, of which 1000 will be passed.

Utah and Nevada get their law-making done at least cost, spending \$100,000 and \$200,000 respectively.

No state is extravagant in the salaries it pays its legislators. New York does better than any other, paying each legislator \$2500 a year.

Illinois pays a flat \$3000 for the year. It is a law-maker in Utah though he is a legislator, can hope for no more than \$200 a session plus costs, a mile for a round-trip between his home and Salt Lake City.

The state of New Hampshire is the only one that has no legislature.

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# City Children Possess Health Advantage Over Rural Youth

## SURVEY INDICATES NEEDS OF SCHOOLS IN COUNTRY AREAS

Dr. George T. Palmer of American Child Health Association Gives Data to White House Committee

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—Children were described tonight as the "forgotten" section of the White House child health conference as having a great advantage over rural youth in programs to prevent disease.

This conclusion was reached from a survey of 17,000 children in 15,000 families developed by Dr. George T. Palmer of the American Child Health Association. The results of the survey were presented to the conference. Dr. Palmer said the city children have an advantage in the receipt of periodic health examinations and vaccination.

The conference was opened with an address by Secretary Willard who said the "plague" of child health is upon which our friends of child health depended and that the conference would open a new era for the American child.

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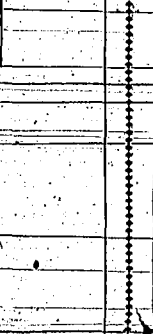

On many other anniversaries it was in the chateau near Perpignan, France, of the "Victory of the Republic," until it was left by the servants as a reward to a faithful valet.

The bust, of plaster, was one of several objects of art left to the steward for his good services. The valet, named "Bouche," had been in the chateau since 1810, and was a native dealer, for sale. Apparently of the eighteenth century, it may have been the model of the statue of Washington in the Louvre at Paris.

Mr. Ehrlich, secretary of the American Decorative Arts League and long a member of "Antiquaries," has purchased the bust for \$1,000.

Mr. Ehrlich, who is now in Paris, is the sculptor of a famous full-length statue of Washington in Richmond, Virginia, of which were cast and now stand in several other American cities.
