TRUCE APPEARS TO HALT CONFLICTS IN LAND OF MYSTERY

All Signs Indicate Signing of Peace Treaty by Viceroy Irwin and Mahatma Gandhi Within Few Hours

By The Associated Press NEW DELHI, India, March 2.—All signs indicated tonight that Mahatma Gandhi and Viceroy Lord Irwin would sign a truce tomorrow, thus ending an era of peace to distressed India.

The strife and bitterness have torn the country into warring camps for 20 years—and especially the last year—costing thousands of lives, millions of dollars and untold misery.

Gandhi and his host of Nationalists rebels will be free to demonstrate in the streets of the cities and towns of the country.

This turn of events, following indication Saturday that there would be a truce, was regarded as the most momentous period in India's history since Great Britain took possession of the great peninsula 150 years ago.

SENATE COMMITTEE URGES INQUIRY INTO FOOD PRICE SETTING

'Tendencies Toward Monopolistic Control of Nation's Supply' Come In for Solons' Consideration

By The Associated Press WASHINGTON, March 2.—Investigation by the federal trade commission and the justice department into the monopolistic control of the nation's food supply were recommended today by the senate.

Reporting on its inquiry into the price of bread, meat, sugar, milk and other foods, the committee headed by Senator Capper, Republican Kansas, said it had found "a monopolistic tendency toward the monopolistic control of the food of the nation by a small group of powerful corporations and combinations."

It was pointed out that "particular care" in regard to bread and milk and recommended "a complete and exhaustive investigation of the distribution of milk and dairy products by the federal trade commission and the department of justice."

Within the past few years, the committee said, the absorption of independent farmers by large corporations, holding companies, sugar and oil trusts, has been carried forward with amazing rapidity.
