**Mariners on Ships on Most
Parts of Atlantic Ocean
Summon All of Skill to
Battle Dangerous Gales**

(By the Associated Press)
THIS gale was a battering from within and without yesterday as storms, rage rivers and earthquakes.

Mariners over most of the Atlantic had to use all their skill to find safe sailing lanes. Storms raged in the North Sea, flooding flat lands along the English coast and imperiling ships.

In the United States, a blizzard swept the prairie states and the Great Plains, bringing high winds, snowplowing roads, and slowing traffic of all kinds. Snow covered much of the region. Cold northwest winds were blowing from the north into Dixie with promise of more to come. The weather man warned shipping in the Virginia Capes to jettison cargo because of the number of broken icebergs and demolished wrecks of earth rocks.

Italy Delay Ceremony Till
Other Powers See Text

ROME, March 7 (AP) - The formalities of the alliance between Italy and France were suspended yesterday as long as arrangements - the negotiations, on which the agreement came.

The Italian government had planned that the ceremony of signature would take place in London next Tuesday, but in other quarters it had been postponed until the United States and Japan had examined the proposed pact.

KHOKH AND HAIN FALL.

KANSAS CITY, March 7 (AP) - Compensation for the drought was distributed with a lavish hand yesterday, with snow and rain falling winter spread snow and rain over a large part of the country.

Virtually the entire Mid-West grain belt received a blanketing of snow and rain, and the winter rulers of Missouri and Ohio arrived.

Whipped by stiff winds, the snow and rain fell in sheets, and with rail service - and, too, down wires in sections of Illinois, Missouri and Iowa.

Missouri was downed upon as the storm brewed several days eastward. To the north, however, the cold was not especially severe. The "Marm" center was moving up the Ohio valley.

WATER IS Freezing.

Water in the Missouri flooded the land at Chicago where the snow struck this morning. A six-inch fall was recorded there as the disturbance howled over the Great Lakes and the Mississippi.

At Mount Zion, Illinois, snowdrifts 10 feet deep stalled two locomotives here, and a train was held up.

At St. Louis, a snow was recorded at Maryville in Northwest Missouri and Kansas City had received half-a-foot, causing some minor accidents.

The wheat and corn country in general needed a wet, protective rain, but the heavy snowfall from several states in a row - the snow was spread fairly east and north from the Texas Panhandle.

Cotton fields in the South and in Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama found little relief as the storm brewing several days eastward was received most of the area tomorrow.

The moisture came in millions of dollars to the growers, crop experts said.

Henry Squires, about 65 years old, was brought to the county general hospital by his wife, Mrs. Henry Squires, who found him lying on the floor of their home, which he had broken through a door against which a chair had been wedged, and found him with a wounded leg.

He had been sitting on his own bed, while suffering from illness and delusions.

Under treatment at the hospital, Mr. Squires received consciousness in a measure and recognized Deputy Sheriff A. C. Parker, a former neighbor of his, and his son, Jack Parker, and Sheriff E. P. Prater went to the hospital to question him late in the afternoon. He was unable however, to tell what had happened, but did say he had cut himself.

His condition was reported last evening to be favorable.

Mr. Squires' wife, Mrs. Mary Squires, residing at Castleford, regarding any relatives of the aged man, enjoyed the respect and esteem of his neighbors and acquaintances.

Perry Howard, owner of an adJOINING farm who last fall purchased Mr. Squires' land, said he had been to the cabin about 8:30 A. M. to ascertain his condition and needs, as he had done every day for the past month.

Without pausing to make any detailed investigation, Mr. Howard summoned Leander Todd, another neighbor, and together they carried Squires to the hospital here.

Construction of roads, bridges and public buildings is probably increased or prolonged because it is where the political situation permits in order to create jobs.

It is estimated that more than 2,500,000 men are out of work. Conditions are worse in Andalusia and in the principal industrial cities—Barcelona, Madrid and Valencia.

Many other provinces also are plagued by unemployment varying degrees.

Crop failures or shortages caused by drought, especially in the South, caused many idle workers. In some sections farm hands flock to the towns where, already, many small business houses around and mills and factories have been operating on part time.

Spill-Binder, Klementi Voroshilov, Head of "Red" Army, Boasts Popularity

BY VICTOR RUMIAK (Associated Press Writer) MOSCOW, March 7—Communist ideals and the socialist theories of Marx and Lenin are supposed to keep Russia's millions working together in the spirit of brotherly love—but the back-stop of it all is the "Ogur," or secret political police, and the Red Army of 2,000,000 men.

The man at the head of those forces is Klementi Voroshilov, comissar of war. Next to Joseph Stalin, he is the most popular man in the Soviet Union.

Voroshilov probably is the most popular man in the Soviet Union.

Recently he celebrated his fifth birthday amid a storm of jubilation.

Tall, well-built and considered handsome from the Russian point of view, he is a man who can move his bloated torso into a sheath and the others that greet him as he reviews his troops are spontaneously moved to tears.

The secret of Voroshilov's popularity is that he is not a soldier; born "now" nor had any special military training. But as a leader of troops there is no equal in Russia.

He's a Spell-Binder

Speechmaking forms a large part of an army general's duty. The commissar of war must be able to speak well and convincingly to the public at large, and be convincing.

Voroshilov is all-of-that.

He is a Communist, a rank member of the party, a spell-binder. What he says is so convincing that it is sometimes embarrassing.

As a matter of fact, now that the revolution is over, the Commissar of War is one of the most popular men in the Soviet Union.

Keeping the masses alive to the dangers of foreign invasion is considered great propaganda for the government.

Last year Voroshilov sounded a warning to the world that the Red Army would not have to have troops that not only will know which fork to use, but will be able to give a good account of themselves in any department of modern warfare.

Rose From Poverty

Like many another Soviet leader, Voroshilov rose from poverty and childhood. He was born in 1881, and his parents were illiterate, though he himself is moderately literate; now emerges from his three years in the army that he had to learn to read and write and "speak" Russian.

He also learned to keep clean and "ethicized." He also learns to keep clean and observe other niceeties of which he never heard before.

Later Voroshilov became commander of the arms of the North Caucasus.

He came to Moscow in 1921, when he was 38, and Franz did he was named as head of the Soviet land and sea forces.

The "Red" Army and the OGPU, secret police, of the Soviet Union could count Voroshilov.

But in Soviet politics, as in other countries, there is a "live and let live" attitude.
