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Hoover Counts Peace Efforts Outstanding Accomplishment

CHIEF MAGISTRATE REALIZES AMBITION TO NEGOTIATE PACT

President Fulfills Determination to Promote Good-Will Among Great and Uninfluential Lands

(This is the second of three articles by Elmer Simpson, veteran Washington reporter of the Associated Press, outlining the problems and nationalities of President Hoover in his two years as President—Editor.)

WASHINGTON, March 9.—There can be little doubt that Mr. Hoover looks upon his labors in behalf of world peace as the most striking accomplishment of his first two years as president of the United States.

Negotiation and ratification of the London pact fulfilled an ambition Mr. Hoover entertained from the hour he determined to seek to great with his old friend, Ambassador Gibson through whom his suggestions for the London pact were first made at General White's residence in the White House.

Yet there is reason to suppose that Mr. Hoover looks upon this treaty as only the beginning of his work—two years—his whole attitude on foreign affairs, from his pre-inauguration good-will mission to Europe to his administration in January, 1921, of the League of Nations, to his part in the signing of the Kellogg-Briand pact, those first two Hoover years.

During the last congressional campaigning, it was upon Hoover's leadership that the Republican campaign agencies built up their party appeal. And it was Hoover first in the list of accomplishments under that leadership, probably with Mr. Hoover's endorsement.

Yet there has been criticism in the way of government rearrangement in the past few years. It is to be forgotten in the hurry-churry of his many clashes with the senate over such things as the farm debt certificate, the tariff, supreme court nominations and the denial of confidence in Judge Parker of North Carolina, prominent of the reorganized power commission, drought relief and so on, but that Hoover has made the loan value of veterans' bonus certificates.

It is the inauguration of all veteran aid activities, for instance, under the spot-man control of Administration bills.

Again, there was the transfer of prohibition-enforcement activities from the justice department to the treasury control—that was a first recommendation of Mr. Hoover's law enforcement study commission, commencing with all the influence of his office to execute that recommendation.

There are other things accomplished in Mr. Hoover's first two years that reflect his fame as a business engineer and a sponsor of efficiency.


They range from revamping the methods and equipment of federal prisons to the reorganization of prison reform in state institutions, to swift progress on the building of a new and beautiful Washington.

There has been revision, too, of American diplomatic contracts with other nations, particularly in the selection of men of the career foreign service for assignments in Latin America.

The White House has given special attention to that, it seems possible, in the light of

Loucks, his former secretary, charged with the woman's murder.

Dr. Smith, called as a witness, was asked to describe the wound and his findings. Dr. Smith, unbuttoned his vest, produced a hooded surgical instrument and showed the jury exactly how he learned the depth and the course of the wound. He described the bright red blood oozing from the gash.

BRITISH VOTE TO LET LEAGUE RUL

House of Commons Approves Resolution to Accede to General Act in Disputes

LONDON, March 9 (AP)—By 211 votes against 118, the House of Commons tonight approved a resolution that the British government should accede to the general act of the League of Nations for the settlement of international disputes.

A resolution was moved by Arthur Henderson, foreign secretary.

The liberal party voted with the government and accounted for the large majority.

Britain's signature to the general act will be subject to certain reservations, however, those include the barring of disputes between members of the British commonwealth and of questions which arose prior to Britain's accession to the act.







YOUTH MUST SERVE SUSPENDED TERM

Arno Kerpa, 22, Buhl, Goes to Prison 1 to 14 Years for Violation of Parole

Under sentence of imprisonment that was suspended two and a half years ago, Arno Kerpa, 22, Buhl, must begin serving 1 to 14 year term in the Idaho penitentiary for theft of automobile belonging to L. J. Johnson, Buhl, mayor, on July 10, 1929, Kerpa was sentenced to 18 months in district court here yesterday, the first day of the March term of court.

An affidavit signed by O. W. Witham, prosecuting attorney, accused Kerpa of violating terms of the parole to which he was admitted when he pleaded guilty to the automobile theft charge. The prosecutor's affidavit referred to the theft of the car and continued, setting forth a felony charge of robbery of a bank check preferred against Kerpa in April, 1929, and referring to Kerpa's arrest at Alamogordo, New Mexico, his escape from jail there, and his return nearly two years ago to Buhl where he was arrested last Wednesday. When arrested at Buhl last week, the affidavit stated, Kerpa had in his possession a car that he admitted having stolen.

Kerpa and Floyd Manning, 22, Seattle, held on a robbery charge, have been confined in the "cage" at the county jail here since last Friday morning when they were discovered in a secreted attempt to break jail.

Represented by W. L. Dunn, attorney, in court yesterday, Kerpa's counsel in his case today. He is alleged to have robbed P. W. Dodd, the Kimberly store owner, proprietor, of \$150 at the point of a gun, last February 22.
