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## SAM H. THOMPSON BECOMES MEMBER OF FEDERAL BOARD

Owner of 500-Acre Farm in Illinois. Ellis Vacancy Resulting From Resignation of Alexander Leggo

(By The Associated Press)

**WASHINGTON**, March 19.—Sam H. Thompson, who owns a 500-acre farm in Illinois, today was appointed to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Alexander Leggo.

The appointment was announced at the White House upon receipt of a telegram of acceptance. Thompson's commission was signed by Secretary of State Frank B. Kellogg before the latter left on his Caribbean cruise.

Thompson has been an active farmer-for-years and has been instrumental in the drafting of agricultural legislation.

At the time of his appointment he was serving his second term as president of the American Farm Bureau Federation. The directors of that organization, meeting yesterday, voted to postpone their annual convention until May 1 to permit him to take the new post and elect Edward Clegg, Montgomery, Alabama, to finish his unexpired term.

**Honors**—**Washington**. Thompson has been a life member and active supporter of national farm legislation. He supported the old McFadden-Haugen bill, and the new bill, which was introduced by Senator Frank Murphy, to finance the new road and electric power project.

Thompson was born in Adams County, Illinois, and is a graduate of the University of Illinois.

He has been associated with the National Farmers' Organization, and engaged in livestock raising and grain farming.

### AGED BY LABOR

**CHICAGO**, March 19 (AP)—The aged, who have labored hard to champion the agricultural marketing act, will respond in delegations of the federal farm board.

Sam H. Thompson, stopped and went beyond his 80 years of work for agriculture, today accepted appointment to the federal board of agriculture, and his election to membership of the board, the third was the crystallization of his dreams.

The man chosen to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Alexander Leggo has been fighting hard for the rights of the small farmers and for equality of agriculture with other industrial groups.

He is a charter member of the Illinois Farm Bureau Federation, has been president of the American Farm Bureau from 1922 to 1924, residing during his third term.

He has been a leader in the battle to surrender his president to the farm board, and chose Edward A. (Red) Morgan, Portland, president of the state, to succeed him.

Sam H. Thompson, vice president of the Twin Falls, Idaho, Lions, was elected to the new board.

He has 600 signatures.

Best remembered of Thompson's battles came when the house committee tried to speak for the farmers of Illinois in 1924, in a forty-four hour round trip to Chicago and return, he led the fight to defeat the bill.

The bill, which had been introduced by the late Senator George W. Norris, was defeated.

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Mrs. John L. Black, Blackfoot, president, will preside.

BORAH ACCEPTS \$208.33 SALARY INCREASE AFTER TURNING DOWN \$16,000

**WASHINGTON**, March 19 (AP)—Senator Borah will receive an increase of \$208.33 in his monthly pay check on April 1.

He had been shifted to the Senate six years ago when Congress increased the salary of senators and representatives from \$10,000 to \$12,000. He agreed to accept it, saying he had been elected to a \$7,000 job.

Borah was re-elected last November, so he can accept the boost. In all, he remained twice as much as he was paid when he first became a senator.

His pay check April 1 will be the second increase of \$208.33.

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## SEARCHERS FAIL TO FIND LOST AVIATOR

Lack of Identification of Pilot Blasts Hope for Glenn W. Brophy's Safety

**MANILA, Friday Morning**—Hope that Glenn W. Brophy, missing since March 10, had been taken off from Manchuria, China, early yesterday on a trail-blazing flight to Manila, might be safe if quick action is taken by the searchers.

That a plane was seen flying over Liangmen, central Lunan Island, was not definitely identified as that of the missing aviator.

Authorities here said the plane sighted over Liangmen might possibly have been an army spy-patrol flying for the Japanese.

The Liangmen postmaster early reported to the director of the bureau of posts that Brophy landed at Liangmen about 10:30 a.m. and left for Manila five minutes later, but, according to a cable from the director of the bureau, the American aviator had not yet landed at Liangmen, but that one passed over the city at that time.

Brophy took off from Macau, China, on March 10, bound for Shanghai. From Macau he headed over the China sea, 800 miles to Manila. He should have arrived here early yesterday afternoon.

Search Down-Sized

The Los Angeles flier was forced down late on route from Shanghai to Manila.

Meanwhile authorities had virtually abandoned hope for P. A. "Pete" Beck, San Francisco, and William Scott, Manila, believed to have fallen into the Pacific ocean off the wild east coast of Mindanao Island, 11 days ago.

## COMMUNIST ADMITS SABOTAGE THREATS

**PAUL KASSAY Confesses Plan To See Disgrigible Akron Never Takes Airm.**

**ATLANTA, Ohio, March 18 (AP)—**A confessor, he planned to see that the dirigible "Akron," now under construction here, "never take the sky," was arrested Saturday by federal and county officials.

Paul F. Kassay, 37, reputed Communist and former Austro-Hungarian officer, Assistant United States Attorney, William J. McDermott, announced.

The announcement was made after Kassay and other officers descended on the city Saturday morning.

Kassay, 37, admitted, in his confession he had told men at the Goodyear-Zepher Corporation, Akron, that he had planned "Akron" to remain incomplete, that he was "going to get in the control room before the ship left the ground and blow it up."

He also admitted he had "set out rivets to weaken the structure," the federal officer added.

McDermott said the statements of Kassay would be turned over to the federal department of justice agents, who had worked with him in the apprehension of the man.

He was identified as a member of the Communist party, but declined to state the nature or duration of his affiliation.

He admitted, McDermott said,

that he was once arrested in India in 1924, in connection with the Communist revolution which followed the work stoppage resulting in being arrested at the time.

The confessor implicated no one, the officials said.

Government and Zepher corporation officials said they had no information as to what damage had resulted to the craft, declaring the quick inspection would quickly checkmate any possible damage.

Officials were divided as to whether Kassay was a co-conspirator or a simple plotter.

Kassay was the only man charged, and W. W. Madala, county detective, gave it as their personal opinion that he was the principal conspirator.

He was accused of being a spy for International Communists.

The arrest was made after an investigation which had been ordered

in Washington; he was held for federal authorities, at McDermott's request.

It was planned to take him to the state attorney for further arrangement before a federal commissioner.



Two silver lion cups are to be awarded to the winning team and the quintet showing the best sportsmanship. Players selected for the all-star team will receive gold baseball watch fobs.


Losers of the first round are to be put into a consolation bracket, which will determine the grand champion in previous years under the double-elimination system was used.

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## VOTERS PREPARE TO PASS UPON ANNUAL INCREASE OF LEVY

Election Will Determine Right of Trustees to Exercise Same Discretion As in Past Years.

Everything is ready for voting today between the hours of 1 P.M. and 4 P.M., on the question whether the qualified voters of the Twin Falls school district will be permitted to go to the school board, as they have done annually since 1921, to levy an additional tax of \$15,000 to be used for the maintenance of schools which will be levied without such election.

Prior to the passage of the act of 1921, the board was permitted to levy \$10,000 annually, but the voter was needed to petition to school board of education for the right to levy and amount of tax. Since 1921, however, it has been granted annually and the total amount of 15 mills levied, as it has been regularly since that time.

### Two Qualifications

Regular electors under the law of Idaho, who are residents of the state, and the right to vote is granted them who have one of the following qualifications:

Parents or guardians of a child under 18 years of age, if the child are under 21 years of age, and when such child or children and the parents or guardians thereof are registered to vote at the time of the election; or

A person who pays taxes within the district, and the number of wife and children, if any, in the household is married. A person of poll tax is not a taxpayer within the meaning of the law defining the qualifications.

Voting places will be in the Bickett and Lincoln school buildings. The place of last election, however, is the Lincoln school building, located east of Blue Lakes boulevard, northeast of Shoshone street, and east of the highway number 91, from which the name of Blue Lakes Street will be at the Bickett school building, and place of last election for the 1930 election, the Lincoln building west of Blue Lakes boulevard, northwest of Shoshone street, and west of the highway number 91, from which the name of Shoshone Street will be at the Lincoln school building.
