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## CAMMING RESORTS IN NEVADA'S TOWNS RUN NIGHT AND DAY

Hundreds of Persons Take Part in Games and Mill About Devices in Principal Institution in Reno

(By The Associated Press) RENO, Nev., March 20.— Reno, along with the rest of Nevada, went "Old West" today. In the flush of wide-open gambling—the new 42-day divorce law was virtually forgotten.

At 10 o'clock in the morning the principal gambling hall in the heart of the city was packed with human beings who played in tables, roulette wheels, faro tables, mechanical dice throwers and other gambling devices.

The noisy hub of gambling, the clink-clack of machines and the clatter of poker chips was partaken by the rascally noise of a construction crew engaged in cutting through massive stone, brick and mortar walls to enlarge the gambling rooms.

While waiting for the printers to turn out gambling license forms, the more formally dressed official gamblers, Nevada's "bigwigs," were available regarding the number of permits which will be issued or the criteria to which the city, county and state will probably limit the number.

Makes Practice Legal

The signing of the new gambling bill yesterday by Governor Fred Balzar was the signal for augmented patronage of the gambling houses, roulette wheels and slot machines for the new state to merely legal what has been going on under nominal cover for years.

Throughout the night there was a continuous stream of gamblers, establishment, three game rooms, three "21" games, two crap games and well-catered restaurants.

"Dozens of the so-called 'speakeasy' establishments where dances and others play in an atmosphere of semi-darkness and mystery of 'exclusiveness,' enjoyed greatest patronage."

As the nocturnal players wandered off to their places of pleasure, all the gambling establishments operate 24 hours a day.

Paper currency of both large and small denominations huge stacks of coins and piles of bills and tokens of red, white and blue poker chips littered the tables.

Work in Shifts

Dealers and crookers—wearing green eye shades worn in eight-hour shifts, assisting or risking in the games—were everywhere.

Viewing the operation of one of the crowded games, Mayor E. E. Roberts, picturesquely survivor of the old "Wild West," said this was his idea of how a city should be run.

"It is nonsense trying to regulate people's morals by law. For eight years I've been trying to make Reno a better place to live in, but they didn't care—but they don't interfere with other people's rights."

"Now we can lawfully, what Nevada has always done, under cover."

## INCREASE IN TAXES LOOMS IN OPINION OF SENATOR BORAH

Treasury Officials' Esti-

WASHINGTON, March 20.—Sharply decreased income tax collections for the first quarter of 1930 were visualized today by treasury officials as they studied latest reports of receipts from that source.

Belatedly, the officials for the White House—headed by Secretary of the Treasury—had been collecting that day compared with the corresponding day last year.

It was explained the figure to be announced tomorrow would show more accurately what the treasury can expect from the 1930 tax, but already received as "discreasing."

Meanwhile, Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, said he believed an increase in taxes would be necessary but he declined to say his thought it should go into effect.

The report for Wednesday brought the collections for the month to \$10,142,637, compared with \$11,416,757 for the same period last year.

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**SABOTAGE PLOT AT  
AKRON FAILS WITH  
ARREST OF KASSAY**

Department of Justice Operators Continue Investigation of Alleged Design to Wreck Dirigible

(By The Associated Press)  
CLEVELAND, March 20.—A sabotage plot to destroy the world's largest dirigible, the Akron, which was believed to have been uncovered by a Department of Justice agent, continued an investigation of the Akron's design to wreck the plane and an alleged scheme of a worker on the dirigible to freeze rivets in the framework with water.

Paul F. Kassay, the suspected worker, was arrested at Akron, Ohio, where the giant dirigible is under construction. The agent who made the accusations said he was the victim of a frame-up.

Federal investigators said Kassay was innocent, but they believed he had been planning to die in a crash of the dirigible if necessary to accomplish his alleged purpose.

The Akron, designed for its first trial flight early this summer, is planned to be the world's most formidable fighting ship of the air and will be operated by the United States Navy.

**No War for Future**  
Officials of the Goodyear Zeppelin corporation which is building the Akron, said yesterday that no damage had been done in the alleged plot to wreck it, and that no fears were felt for the future safety of the dirigible.

The Akron, which has been under construction since November, is given daily inspection,

but had it gone into a fire which originally had been secured only by the efforts of the Akron workers, it would have exploded.

Department of Justice agents had been working on the alleged saboteur's plan to wreck the Akron since Kassay's arrest. It was the wreck of a bombing plane in San Diego, California, September 3, 1929, that started the investigation.

Pilot W. E. Thompson was killed in that crash when an upper wing of his plane collapsed from a ruptured fuel line.

On January 18, 1930, the Bureau of Investigation, which had been investigating the Akron's safety, recommended that the Akron be grounded.

Subsequent investigation of the navy pilot's death showed that at the time of the accident he had previously passed inspection and was dangerously defective. Someons had weakened a wheel bearing which probably would have exploded.

Discusses Plan

Supposition of the agents began to center on Kassay, Meanwhile, he had been held in custody by the Federal authorities. The department of justice agents put one of their operative to work before him, and recently almost entirely disclosed his plans.

Harold Mahan, acting chief of the bureau of investigation at Washington, told reporters yesterday that the man who the agents believe to be the mastermind of the plot to wreck the Akron, is 10 degrees lower than the outside atmosphere.
