PRESIDENT HOOVER FEELS FARM BOARD NEEDS NO COUNSEL

Invigorated by Caribbean Vacation Chief Executive Plunges Into Task of Disposing of Many Problems

By The Associated Press WASHINGTON, March 30—Invigorated by his Caribbean vacation, President Hoover today plunged into the task of disposing of a host of problems.

The chief executive gave recess appointments to three Federal judges and the White House is to know the president left the farm board well able to defend and defend its own policy.

President Hoover conferred for 20 minutes today with the cabinet. He said later he had no plans for his future political activities and that he had no intention of leaving them at this time.

## Wealthy Gotham Banker Observes Ninety-First Birthday Anniversary

One of World's Richest Men, Noted for Silence, Gives Only One Interview in Lifetime



George F. Baker (inset), the "sphinx of Wall Street," will spend his ninety-first birthday March 27 on exclusive Jekyll Island, off the Georgia coast. Only club members and invited guests are allowed there. This aerial photograph, showing the clubhouse where Baker lives, is one of the few that have been taken of the place.

**Baker each year will be a special occasion.**

The aged banker will take his regular morning and afternoon auto rides over the beautiful shell roads of the island and afterward enjoy a birthday dinner with his family.

An early sixteenth century carpenter settled on his "chick" of the South Atlantic coast, "Golden Gate of Cuba."

When 100 of the world's wealthiest men more than three centuries ago created the Jekyll Island, one of the islands thus designated literally became a "golden gate."

Two centuries of the club members was estimated at one-sixth of the world's total accumulation at that time.

The charter membership in 1888 included the Vanderbilts, Astors, and the Rockefellers, Morgans, Bankers, and Hills. Today such names as Rockefeller, Gould, Morgan and Baker remain, but the Astors, Vanderbilts and Fallucas no longer are on the roster.

Some of the island's wealthiest residents today. Membership is by inheritance only. No one who cannot trace his pedigree cannot claim the title.

Alexis M. D'Amico, one of the world's most famous social organizers, has been elected president of the club in residence here.

WORK ON CANAL AT LITTLE WOOD RIVER MEANS COMPLETION

Bureau of Reclamation Approes First 23 Miles of Project Reaching to Military Brothers Work

RECORDING March 30 (Special) The work on completion of the Little Wood river canal as far as Little Wood river will be finished by April 15, contractors stated here today.

The contract held by H. A. Doughty and James specifies that the 23-mile link which reaches the Stoddons diversion will be finished on the above date.

The bureau of reclamation has also approved the first 23 miles of the canal reaching down to Military Brothers bridge, known as the lower contract. Work on this section of 30 miles is being pushed and is expected to be finished by April 15.

Work at the branch crossing at Little Wood is nearly completed and the job at the military line is expected, in any event, to be finished by April 15.

Progress in building and priming work is going ahead on the lower Stoddons division of the canal and drag-line and a crew of men are operating in what is known as the "rocker" section. It is noted below the head of the canal.

Work will start in a few days on the construction of five houses along the line of the canal for the use of ditch riders. Three of these are in the Eden division and contract for their building will be let to a Twin Falls firm.

Don Knight, Gooding, will construct the other two. One house will be built at the canal junction with Little Wood river and the other six miles south of Dietrich. These houses will be occupied by main canal ditch riders.



Aurora Borealis Acts As "Electric Light" With Sun As Power Supply, Educator Finds

Upper Air Resistance Heats Solar Corpuscles, Resulting in Glow Over Poles

By F. H. COLTON (Associated Press Science Writer) —WASHINGTON, March 30.—The aurora borealis, or "northern light," apparently is a sort of giant "electric light" that uses the sun for a power source.



This diagram illustrates how streams of electric corpuscles from the sun, according to the theory of Professor Carl Stormer-Norwegian scientist, cause resistance in upper atmosphere, creating "northern lights."

The earth's upper atmosphere functions as an electric circuit. The corpuscles, causing them to glow and give the light that is the aurora borealis. The aurora borealis is a sort of giant "electric light" that uses the sun for a power source.

where the corpuscles are deflected by the earth's magnetic field to eddies in the upper atmosphere, which are constantly bombarding the earth, says Professor Stormer. Their effect is to heat the upper atmosphere, which may be positively or negatively charged.



The amendment, which would be made effective next July 1, requires testing of all cows, as a source of incubent fever germs, as a condition of their being taken to the city's milk plant.

The measure was held to be supported by a number of Twin Falls dairymen, a letter taken by the committee in this direction as a means of preventing spread of incubent fever, one of the causes of which is infectious milk.

Being taken on its first reading last evening, the measure is still open for discussion, and will be brought up at the council's next session, which will be held on Monday, April 6, at 7:30 p. m.

The measure was sponsored by J. R. White, commissioner of public safety. He terms had been outlined at a council meeting, but was following an earlier conference in which dairymen and health officers met with a number of city officials.


