REBELS SLAY NINE AMERICANS DURING WEEK IN NICARAGUA

Marines Land at Port of Puerto Cabezas to Protect Citizens of United States Still in District

By The Associated Press. PUERTO CABEZAS, Nicaragua, April 16.—Nicaraguan rebels have killed nine Americans and an undetermined number of natives since last Saturday, but today United States marines landed from the battleship Albatross to protect the citizens of this port.

Refugees from the water in which the attack was reported said the marines landed early Saturday morning on the settlement at Logojon, 10 miles from here, a company telephone clerk saw them coming and had time to call the town's firemen to meet them and cry for help before the marines landed.

The operator notified the marines and the American consul in Managua, and the marines started for Logojon. They were met by Captain William Peley and four more marines.

The marines captured the little expeditionary force, killing Captain Peley and wounding two. They captured a machine gun and a quantity of ammunition.

Subsequently Lieutenant Clyde March, set out with 20 men, but they were ambushed. They fought off the attack until marine reinforcements arrived.

On Monday the beleaguered post was relieved and the slain of the marines were buried.

The American flag was hoisted. Captain Peley, Philadelphia, W. D. Bond, St. Louis, Mo., and others were among the marines.

Stimson Reaches Decision

WASHINGTON, April 16.—A decision to keep the garrison at Puerto Cabezas, Nicaragua, as long as necessary to protect the citizens of this port was announced today by Secretary Stimson.

The decision was announced in a military report which is being prepared in American private property cases in the form of a report to the secretary of the Standard Fruit and Steamship company, New Orleans.

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TWIN FALLS MAN PLANS FOR LARGE PROJECT IN IDAHO

I. B. Perrine Proposes to Build \$18,000,000 Irrigation Enterprise in Two Southern Counties

By The Associated Press. TWIN FALLS, Idaho, April 15.—An \$18,000,000 irrigation project providing for bringing 200,000 acres of land in Twin Falls and Owyhee counties under irrigation was disclosed today when filings on Snake river by I. B. Perrine, one of the promoters of the Snake Side Twin Falls project, were made public at the department of reclamation.

The filings call for diversion of 200,000 feet of water from Snake river and construction of two concrete canals each carrying more than 2000 feet flow, 20 feet high for the land on the Snake river.

Perrine, a Twin Falls resident, was reported to be in Washington, D. C., where he is in the office of the reclamation department call for construction of two dams, 2000 feet long, 20 feet high for the land on the Snake river.

One canal was to be taken from Miller dam, the diversion point, and the other from the Snake river. The canal would carry a stream for 110 miles through the present Twin Falls valley, following the channel of the Snake river.

The other canals in the project would be Snake Valley, Paradise Valley, Williams, Larkham, Caldwell, Joseph, Graham, Blue Springs, Arden, Peterson, New Meadows, Bluff, Donkey, Challis and Frank River, Idaho, Nevada.

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Airplane Saves Days in Rushing Injured Man to Boise Hospital

BOISE, April 15.—An airplane from Boise to the Central Idaho wilderness was successful tonight in bringing Red Robinson to a hospital for treatment for a broken leg in a head-on snow and dirt slide which struck yesterday when a rock and snow slide caught him in the back of his head.

To speed up the rescue, an airplane was launched from Casper, Wyoming, by William O'Connell. A cot had been rigged up in the plane under the direction of Dr. G. H. Mumford. In the trip to the Casper ranch, where the injured man was taken, he was kept in flight more than an hour before the plane landed in a meadow, 700 feet from the spot where Robinson was taken to the veteran's hospital.

Robinson was placed in the plane which flew back to Boise and was taken off with immediate to fly to Boise for treatment at the veteran's hospital.

An examination disclosed Robinson's injuries to be less serious than first reported.

No bones were broken but he was covered with bruises and deep cuts and suffered an injury to his back, the exact nature of which will be determined by x-ray examinations.

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Tammany Tangle Promises to Influence Presidential Race

DEMOCRATIC LINEUP FOR 1932 DEPENDS ON INVESTIGATIONS

Republican National Committee Turns Guns Upon Governor Roosevelt

ISSUES OF CAMPAIGN RECEIVE ATTENTION

Political Strategists Believe New York Executive's Chances at Stake

WASHINGTON, April 15.—A series of events washing scenes on the national political scene, a new and confusing shadow has been cast.

Tammany hall's stewardship of New York's governmental life has been challenged for investigation by the narrow margin of a Republican victory in the state.

On the outcome of this investigation all in the future, may possibly turn the nation's destiny to the hands of the next president of the United States.

That party faithful in Washington recognized this possible national significance of a head-on intra-New York political development was evident almost instantly.

On the heels of action by the legislature to authorize its investigation of New York's administration, Democratic newspapers—especially the Tammany hall and the Frankfurter—have been clamoring for a many-supported Democratic governor of New York.

From Democratic national trenches, down the street, rumbled an immense return fire from the headquarters of the Harding administration.

The Albany republican sponsors of the move to explore the city's process of municipal government and the conduct of its affairs, had held their action as a non-partisan drive for good government.

In Washington, national agencies of the two great parties dismissed that idea of non-partisanship with scorn. No effort at objectivity or impartiality marked their mutual handshakes.

Efforts to read into this reaction by the Republican national body the idea of New York's Democratic decision to make Tammany hall's campaign as its own in 1928 seem premature.

Issue Might Fall—The decision of the Democratic convention on the conviction that the Democratic standard-bearer in 1928 would be a Democrat is a decision that may fall otherwise, Tammany as a national issue would fall to the ground.

In 1920, 1924 and 1928 former Democratic Governor Alfred E. Smith was Tammany favorite but a Democratic national convention. Each time he was nominated by Franklin Roosevelt, once a bitter foe of Tammany.

Roosevelt was called to nominate Smith in the successful effort which led to his opposite faction and for the party, up-state and city, both being Smith.

That smiling expectation or desire may be set to the 1932 nomination he has not publicly stated.

It was considered as an event to have the state electoral vote in this presidential race in 1928, however, the victory would be a bitter pill to swallow for Tammany.

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STATE'S PROPOSAL GETS APPROVAL TO SAVE HEALTH UNIT

County Commissioners See Way Clear to Continued Operation During Coming Year

The Rockefeller Foundation, cooperating with the state and county and the United States public health service in maintenance of the Twin Falls health unit has approved ways and means for continuing the unit which were suggested by the state commissioner of public welfare as a substitute for the appropriation of state funds for the appropriation of state funds to meet the health unit.

Members of the board of county commissioners announced this development following a conference Tuesday with Dr. W. C. Conington, director of the Rockefeller Foundation, and Dr. George C. Jellie, director of the health unit.

Instead of an appropriation of state funds, according to the county commissioner's plan, a state inspector would be detailed to this county. It was stated:

Members of the board of commissioners indicated their opinion that the contribution by the state of the services of one of its health inspectors would be worth as much as the appropriation of \$1200 which the state has been making for the health unit this year, and that with the approval of the Rockefeller Foundation of this country, it was a virtual certainty that operation of the unit would continue this year on the same basis as in the past.

Since the failure of the state appropriation, the fate of the county health unit has been a matter of concern to citizens and organizations who look to active part in the health unit.

The Rockefeller Foundation contributes for operation of the unit \$1200 a year, and the state health service \$400 a year, and the county has budgeted this year \$1000 for the health unit.
