

DEATH OF SPEAKER ADDS CONFUSION TO POLITICS OF HOUSE

Absence of Longworth Makes Both Parties' Struggles For Votes More Intense As Margin Grows Small

WASHINGTON, April 16.—The death of Speaker Longworth of Ohio added another factor of political uncertainty which surround the seventy-second congress as no other in the nation's history. A resolution to that effect was offered by Willis J. Abbott, editor of the Toledo Blade, Toledo, Ohio.

The amendment was introduced on serious charges and the association was powerless to remove his name from the membership rolls.

CASSIA COUNTY WAR ON SQUIRRELS COMMENCES

BURLEY, April 16 (Special to The News)—Ground squirrels in the foothill districts of Cassia county will be subjected to a grueling campaign of destruction beginning April 15, according to Sheriff Lewis W. Lewis, Malad, of the United States Biological Survey, who conducted a war-party against these pests in cooperation with County Agent W. Palmer.

The territory to be covered is state and government lands lying contiguous to private land holders, principally in the foothill districts of the county. Poisoned wheat is furnished free for this drive, which is held with the assistance of farmers in the neighborhood. It is estimated that one or two or two of the poisoned grains will be used. It is distributed by horseback riders, and thrown in the squirrel runs.

These campaigns are conducted usually twice each year, in the early spring and early summer, and have been carried on here for several years. The results of the campaign are a decrease in the squirrel population.

The state and United States government cooperate with districts to insure the success of the campaign. The cost of the poison is borne by the state, which shares in distributing the poison, and only two or three districts have been
