WILBUR PENS "GO" SIGNAL FOR HOOVER DAM CONSTRUCTION

President of Six Companies, Incorporated, Expects to Employ 1,000 Men in 90 Days on \$48,890,995 Job

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, April 20.—**W**ilbur gave the "go" signal today to contractors of the Hoover Dam on the Colorado river.

He signed the \$48,890,995

contract—largest ever made by the government—under which Six Companies, Incorporated, will harness the Colorado to furnish electric power and water to the West, and build a great dam across the canyon.

The document already bears the signatures of officials of the contracting firm and of the reclamation bureau. W. A. Bechtel, vice president of Six Companies, signed his name as he signed. He later said he expected to have 1,000 men on the job within 90 days. At the peak of construction some 3,500 men will be employed.

Six companies has not been idle while awaiting signature. Already something like a quarter of a million dollars has been spent at the dam site, including work on roads and railways. Seven years is estimated to finish the job—2,265 days to be exact. At the end of that time the water will be available and contractors will have to pay the government \$3000 a day until it is finished.

"But, the way I feel now," said Bechtel, "with this contract, and a \$3000 a day charge, we will be ahead of the contract time, we'll be able to save."

More Details:

The first task the contractors are tackling is the boring of four tunnels, each 10 feet in diameter, flanking the site of the dam, 200 feet above 56 feet wide, lined with thick steel plates. Through them the river will be diverted by means of concrete walls, and the water will be handled in buckets containing 14 tons.

The size of the job is such, Bechtel said, that the equipment will have to be taken in pieces, never having been used before. The concrete will be handled in buckets containing 14 tons.

It will be built, right-angled to the dam site, and from a rising plant a couple of miles away. About 23 miles of temporary railway will be laid. Miles of road will be built, and hardening tools will be used to carry gravel down 800 feet—deeps—miles upstream to a high point near the concrete mixing plant.

As the contractor's bills will be coded by an elaborate refrigerating system—something never tried before—it will be hardening tools in the canyon bottom.

Bechtel said his company was now seeking to establish a base, for its workers that would be "liberal."

He said the company could make considerable savings in labor by keeping down the wage level, but since this is a public job we would like to have a good, liberal figure that would be acceptable all over the country and would contribute somewhat to restoring prosperity," he said.

SUPPLY OF WATER SEEMS SUFFICIENT

Watermaster for District 36
Expects Snake River Flow
to Touch Lowest Mark

IDALO FALLS, April 20 (AP)—Storage water in the American Falls and the Snake lake reservoirs is expected to last until June, according to irrigation farmers over the season, although the natural flow of Snake River is expected to be the lowest in its history, said George W. Watermaster for District 36 and son.

The average snow depth on the Snake water, he reported, is about 35 percent of normal and about 60 percent of the amount available in April in the previous dry years, 1919 and 1924.

The run-off of the Upper Snake river is about 100 per cent normal, and the off-stream flow 70 percent normal. Only heavy spring and summer rains can prevent the normal runoff of the river from being the lowest in history, Mr. Crandall said.

Irrigation is looked to as the chief factor in the river's capacity. The Jackson reservoir contains 420,000 acre-feet, and the 1919 fall of 647,000 capacity. The American Falls reservoir contains 1,550,000 acre-feet and is expected to be filled.

BURLEY'S TEACHERS RESENT WAGE CUTS

Trustees Plan Meeting to
Consider Petition Filed
By School Instructors

BURLEY, April 20 (Special to The News)—Trustees of the Burley Independent school district will consider a petition filed by teachers demanding a raise in salaries for the coming year, at a meeting Monday evening. At a recent session, the school board made a reduction in salaries of various amounts up to as high as 17 per cent.

The request for reconsideration of this action is supported by several arguments, among them that the district can afford to meet demands with the economic program of the United States Industrialists in that they are making great sacrifices in their own standard of salaries also, that teachers are already underpaid with other professionals.

It is also contended that the salary cut will not be based on teacher experience, but rather on intermediate and principal ratings. Salary reductions, it is claimed, will react as a detriment to the pupils, thus lowering the standards of education.

The resolution to be submitted to the board of trustees was adopted at a meeting of the Burley Teachers Association. Claude Theodore is president.




