GREEN JUBES CALL FOR CONFERENCE ON LABOR

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., April 21 (AP)—A national economic conference, to be called by President Hoover to tackle the pressing problem, was advocated tonight by William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor.

Addressing the Harvard business school of Harvard university, Green said:

"If we are to avoid a future repetition of the disastrous experience through which the nation is passing, some remedy must be found and something constructive must be done."

"It involves more than a question of immediate relief," he added. "The big fundamental question is employment, dignified and stable."

The purpose of meeting the question and of facing responsibility is, in his opinion, that a national economic conference should be held. This conference should be held by the president of the United States. Green said that representatives of industry, labor, the government and business economists should participate.

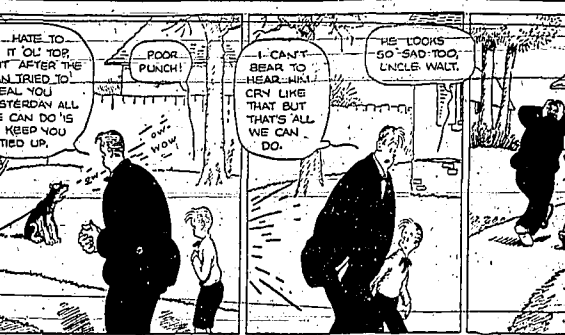
