Snow Descends On States Of West And Strong Wind Causes Extensive Damage

Reno Reports 11-Inch Snowfall, Heaviest Recorded in April in Notorious Nevada City in 50 Years

(By The Associated Press)

SAN FRANCISCO, April 29—The weather chef dished out his entire menu today and scrambled it over the Western states.

Snow, rain, wind, hail, sandstorms, frost, dust storms, lightning, forest and brush fires and sunshine were reported. Some sections were damaged by high winds, sandstorms, forest fires and blizzards while others got much needed moisture from snow.

Strong winds wrecked much of the tent city at the site of the Hoover dam at Boulder City, Nevada, damaged crops and crops in the Northwest and Utah, damaged houses and trees in Utah, damaged motorists in Washington and interrupted wire and power service in several sections.

Reno, Nevada, reported 11 inches of snow, the heaviest recorded in 86 years in April. More than a foot fell in California, mountain districts and parts of Montana, Wyoming, Utah, Arizona and Colorado were covered. Rain fell in many parts of California, aiding crops and adding to irrigation

Wind and frost damage was reported in orchard districts of Washington by the state director of agriculture. A sandstorm stranded motorists and otherwise interrupted traffic in Central Washington. Several small forest fires were reported in western Washington and Oregon, all being spread by high winds.

Crop damage in Davis county, Utah, was estimated at more than \$150,000 by the district agricultural inspector. Beets, grain and other crops in sandy soil were destroyed by wind.

Skies were reported clearing in Montana and Wyoming after storms.

The blizzards at Boulder City carried away or blew down more than 200 tent houses. The camp of Six companies, Incorporated, builders of

Hoover-dam, was hardest hit. Every tent along the edge of the Colorado river was damaged. No one was believed hurt.

Weather forecasts for most of the Western states tomorrow were cloudy and unsettled.

The storm started Tuesday. On Monday mercury went up to 64 in San

Fragisco, the warmest day of the year and the warmest April 20 on record. The next day Reno reported a temperature of 80. Then a couple of barometric pressures, one high and one low, got to quarreling and the storm resulted.

BOISE, April 23/37.—Southern Idaho buttoned up its coat under wintry skies tonight but abided in peace and freedom from worry over a storm which struck viciously at its neighbors to the South.

Some electric power lines were blown down, particularly in the vicinity of Shoshone, bringing temporary darkness on several communities. Many trees toppled before it.

The gale was reported to have reached a pitch of 60 miles an hour at some points, delaying automobile and railroad traffic by clouding the road with dust and sand. Today, however, the state highway department reported all traffic going through undelayed. The weather bureau reported a 43-mile-an-hour

One passenger train was held up between Pocatello and Salt Lake City, arriving in Boise five hours late. An eastbound train arrived in the afternoon one and one-half hours late. The exact cause of the delay was not

Two automobiles were wrecked on wet streets in Boise and one man, Talmadge Cowan, was slightly injured. He narrowly escaped a plunge into the Boise river when his car failed to stop at a bridge and climbed up the steel end girders. The other car lurched over on a downtown street.

—Slight damage to fruit in the path of the sandstorm was believed possible but department of agriculture officials predicted it would be slight. Checking continued on the frost damage of early in the week but department officials said the exact damage would not be known for two

SALVATION ARMY VETERAN VISITS

Field-Major Andrew Loney
Swags Big Audience Here
With Wit and Earnestness

Field Major Andrew Loney, Washington, D. C., a veteran of 44 years experience in the war, on a tour of inspection and social service, addressed an audience last evening that filled the Salvation Army hall on Shoshone street to the top. "Thinking While We Wait" was the subject of Major Loney's address last evening. With quick wit and a touch of humor, he drew upon the rich treasure of his long experience in the service of the Salvation Army, and spoke to the audience with eloquence and earnestness.

He is to speak here again this evening, on "The Language of the Road."

On this present, low level of economy and a month and a half that will take him to 100 cities, Major Loney will visit here on Friday, April 24, and will spend the night at the hotel, and will visit on to San Diego. He is to go from here to Portland and Seattle.
