AROUND HAGERMAN

Gale Overtakes Number of
Smaller Buildings and
Uproots—Large—Poplars

HAGERMAN, April 24 (Special to The News)—Beginning about 5 o'clock Wednesday, a cold, dry wind from the north, blowing from the east, reached the peak of its fury at 6 o'clock in the afternoon and continued to blow with great violence.

A number of small buildings in the town and vicinity were overturned and some of them demolished by force of the gale and the uprooted trees. Large trees were uprooted. Damage done at the grade school building through windows was considerable. Wind blown over made it necessary to close the first and second grades for repair work could be done.
