





## INSTRUMENT SENDS 80,000 WORDS AN HOUR OVER WIRES

Radical Advance in Commun-  
ication Speed' Appears  
Probable in New Machine  
Being Tested in London

**LONDON**, April 30.—A radical ad-  
vance in communication speed  
is promised by a new machine being  
perfected here, but not as a con-  
dition of either the telephone or  
the telegraph. It is described  
as an acceleration of the telephone  
and television news for simple black  
and white reproduction at extra-  
ordinary speed.

The new laboratory model  
will send 80,000 words an hour  
over four-wire copper wires  
and four-wire rubber wires  
to be in full double that remain-

The number of words transmitted  
at one time will depend upon the  
material, whether handwritten, type  
written, or printed. It will, however,  
transmit only black-and-white, which  
excludes pictures or half-tones.

Signal Is Continuous

Briefly, what happens is that a  
typewriter paper, for example, is  
placed under a lens, the rays of  
a half-toner, and passes under a scanning point of intense light,  
which transmits the image impulses  
of the message to a photo-electric  
cell.

The cell then delivers to an ampli-  
fier circuit giving the tone value  
of the message—pure while a strong  
signal, pure black zero. The scan-  
ning is continuous, so that if a break  
in the signal occurs in the beam, the  
beam is interrupted. The signal  
is continuous.

Machines Synchronized

In the receiver an argon lamp pro-  
jects an intense glow upon photo-  
graphic paper in response to the  
proper intensity received, which facili-  
tates the message in the trans-  
mitter.

This photographic paper is on  
and off a developing tank at the  
same speed at which the original  
message moves. The two machines  
are synchronized.

The apparatus can be used over  
self-contained telephone or over  
phone line, but not over sea cables  
where the leakage is too great. It  
is being developed by the International  
Telephone and Telegraph labora-  
tories.



**INDIANAPOLIS—April 30.**—The 16-cylinder racers—an innovation a year ago—will be well represented in the annual 500-mile race here May 30. One of them is to be driven by the popular Leon Duray, Tom White, who helped to make racing popular in recent years, is reported to be building one of the big jobs. 


