ROBBERS TAKE \$65 FROM TWO ABOARD TRAIN IN WYOMING

Two Youthful Soldiers Face Charge Carrying Penalty of Life Sentence or Death For Stateroom Banditry

 RAYMOND, Wyo., May 19.—A train robbery in Wyoming where two youthful soldiers were taken aboard at frequent intervals for more than 36 years, three passengers of the westbound Union Pacific, Los Angeles, train, were bound, gagged with adhesive tape, chloroformed and robbed of \$65 and a watch by two youths early today.

Two Fort P. Warren, Wyoming, soldiers, Russell Howard, 19, of Philadelphia, and George A. Bodman, 18, of Milwaukee, were taken on the train at Rock Springs and brought to the state penitentiary here for investigation. Officers said they recovered the loot from the soldiers.

The victims were Mrs. Joseph E. Huber, 59, her son, J. R. Huber, 30, and Mrs. A. A. Johnson, 59, all of St. Paul, Minnesota, who were en route to California. At the request of authorities, J. R. Huber, who has remained in Wyoming to assist officers in charge of the case.
