CASCADE RANGERS
FACES CHARGE OF
SLAYING NEIGHBOR

Absence of Town Physician
Delays Legal Machinery
Involving Figure in Fatal
Controversy Over Liquor

CASCADIA, Idaho, May 28
—(AP)—The town physician today held up legal machinery which was expected to charge responsibility on Thomas Burnside, ranchman, for the slaying of a neighbor.

Dr. Rocco C. Ward, the coroner and town physician, was called away to one of his widely scattered patients in this timbered territory so that liquid and filth of charges may be pending there, which may be two or three days.

Sherriff Robert Wilson said the charges against Burnside were sworn out against Burnside "in the next two or three days," or as soon as the coroner returns.

Meanwhile the sheriff repeated his conviction that the shooting affair on the Burnside ranch grew out of the liquor among Burnside, the sheriff said, and S. B. Hamrick, the latter said he was a fugitive who escaped following a raid on a saloon in the town.

Billings and Wallace were shot down yesterday when they went with William Brown, McGill, described by the sheriff as "a deputy of some kind," to "talk over" with Burnside some trouble which the sheriff said had broken out of liquor operations during the past several years.

Admiring Shooting
The officer said Burnside admitted the shooting, declaring he believed Billings had one of the ranch to carry out a threat against him. He heard them come, he told officers, and dashed to his house for a gun. He said he was shot by two shots in his body. Brown, unharmed, rushed him home where he was taken to the hospital.

Sherriff Wilson said he was certain Wallace had no part in the liquor trouble but had gone with Billings and McGill. "For the sake of the community," he said, he was certain Hamrick, Burnside, and Billings, aligned first in one combination and then in another, the sheriff said, had been the cause of the trouble.

Trout and Frog Seasons Open in Gem State At End of Month

Improved Motors Allow Racers To Pick Own Speeds

New Rules Permit One Carburetor and Eight Valves For Every Two Cylinders On Cars in 500-Mile Grind

INDIANAPOLIS, May 28.—The courage and skill of drivers in the annual 500-mile automobile race at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway may be challenged as never before in the spectacular history of the event.

New rules permitting additional valves and carburetors virtually open the way to speed machines never before attained on the rough track of the four-cornered 2 1/2 miles.

Improved spring suspension, greater freedom from tire hazards and other mechanical betterments will put the demand of speed solely up to the pilot of the car.

Only one of the 40 cars which will be permitted to start.

The record for 500 miles is 101.13 miles per hour average driving time, established by Peter DePaese in 1925. The race will start at 10:30 a. m. on Saturday, May 29.

The riding machine, reintroduced to speedway a year ago, will be used in its narrow slot beside the driver. His duty will be to pump oil, pump for wearing tires and gasoline consumption, catch signals from the pit manager and be ready to meet any emergency that may arise.

One carburetor is permitted to each two cylinders of the 16-cylinder machine, and four valves to each cylinder. The race will be run on a 2 1/2-mile track, the same as the 1930 season, with the number of cylinders and valves being left up to the driver.

Only two valves are permitted to each cylinder.

Race drivers and engineers may make changes in the engine or chassis, but will be given no more than 15 minutes to make such changes.
