CAPONE ANSWERS

FOR PROSECUTION OF INCOME TAX LAW

Gangster, Facing Prospects of 32 Years in Jail, Surrenders After Indictment And Puts Up \$50,000 Bail

CHICAGO, June 6.—"Screw face Al" Capone, one of Chicago's underworld, was indicted by a federal grand jury today for evading the taxes on a six-year income of \$1,038,539.34. Three hours after his arrest, Capone posted \$50,000 bail and was released.

As on his other recent appearances in public, the heavy-set gangster was escorted by a number of curious people. He slipped into the federal building and into the district court, where he was arraigned, and he was released after his bail had been posted by Federal Judge John H. Egan. Capone had been a defendant in a number of cases and a crowd of reporters and photographers gathered outside the court.
