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## RAILWAY LEADERS PREPARE REQUEST FOR HIGHER RATES

Executive of Eastern, Western and Southern Lines Vote to Petition for Increase of 15 Per Cent

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, June 11.—Presidents of Eastern, Southern and Western railroads meeting here today voted unanimously to petition the interstate commerce commission for an increase in freight rates of 15 per cent.

The New York Harbor, Hartford, Henry A. Boardman, president of the Louisville and Nashville, were appointed committee members of the Eastern, Western and Southern railroads, respectively, to advise and present the petition to the interstate commerce commission. It is expected to be filed next week.

"After taking the following action was taken: At a meeting of executives of the Eastern, Western and Southern railroads, it was unanimously decided to petition the interstate commerce commission, and to the state commission, for an increase of 15 per cent in all freight rates and charges."

A committee consisting of the chairman of the three groups was authorized to prepare and file a joint application with the respective state commissions. It is expected that this can be done within a week.

The application will contain a full statement of the reasons for the action of the carriers. Measures will be taken to afford the public adequate access to the statement and the application of the carriers."

Includes Various Charges The reference to "charges" in the statement is understood to include freight rates, terminal charges, service charges, and other charges which are collected for hauling freight. It is not to be understood that the carriers are asking for a general increase in freight rates, but rather for a specific increase in the charges mentioned.

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, June 11.—A Great British political crisis loomed steadily nearer late tonight with the threat of a split between Labor and Liberals, who are expected to determine the fate of the MacDonald government in next week's debate on the controversial land-tax bill.

David Lloyd George, Liberal leader, in a speech at Edinburgh today set forth the critical nature of a situation that, although confused in detail, is simple in its main outline and is increasingly threatening to the MacDonald government.

The contention is over the government's finance bill, which provides for a 10 per cent increase in the land tax. The bill is expected to be passed by the House of Commons in next week's debate.

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## ROSS POSTPONES PROBATION OF PRISON BORAH ENTRAINS FOR GEM STATE

Governor Refuses to Order Inquiry in Connection With Escape of Lydia Southard Famous Idaho Senator Continues Silence Upon Plans for Presidential Campaign

BOISE, June 11 (AP)—Governor C. Ben Ross declared today he would not order an investigation of the Idaho penitentiary in connection with the escape of Lydia Southard, twin sister of Senator Borah.

The statement was his first affecting the prison situation since the escape of Lydia Southard from the penitentiary on May 4. He has been confined to the hospital or convalescing on his ranch much of the time since.

The governor said he had considered the prison situation carefully and would make a thorough study of it with the assistance of a qualified committee. He would then report to the legislature.

"Such an investigation should be made only if the committee is of the opinion that the prison situation is such that it warrants such an investigation."

"This Idaho is not in a financial position to make such a change at present, and I do not care to make a superficial investigation in connection with the escape of Lydia Southard. It would not be at all fundamental."

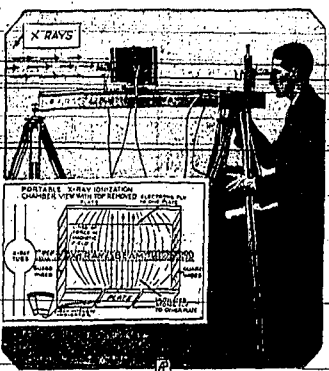
# Federal Scientist Finds Way to Standardize X-ray "Doses"

## GREATER BENEFITS APPEAR PROBABLE IN CANCER CASES

WASHINGTON, June 11.—Cancer patients may receive more benefit from X-ray treatments in the future because a government scientist has found a way to standardize X-ray "doses" as accurately as doses of medicine.

Lauriston H. Taylor, physicist and X-ray expert of the United States bureau of standards, has developed what is believed to be the first portable "X-ray yardstick," a standard unit for measuring intensity of all X-rays. It is known technically as a portable standard ionization chamber.

Few physicians at present give the maximum dose prescribed in X-ray treatments, Taylor points out, because they can not measure the dose accurately and fear "burning" the patient with an unscientific overdose.

An older type of ionization chamber was too bulky to be carried about to compare the strength of different X-ray machines.

Such a chamber consists of two electrically-charged metal plates about five inches apart.

The X-ray beam is passed through the electric field and will ionize the air between the plates. The electrons fly to one plate, the ionized atoms to the other, both following straight lines of force. The amount of ionized atoms striking the plate is registered on an indicator, revealing the strength of the X-ray.

The lines of force, however, tend to "bulge" outward, curving the straight-line of the electrons and ionized atoms should travel. To correct this tendency the old-style

In 1906 he married Miss Myrtle Wilkinson, Challis, Idaho. There were four children born, all of whom survive him. Mrs. Calhoun is at Pasco, Washington, with two of their children; Allen and Eve. Another daughter, Mrs. Archie Thompson, is at Yakima, Washington; and Leon, his oldest son, was with him in California when he died. He was 66 years old and there are six brothers and sisters living. 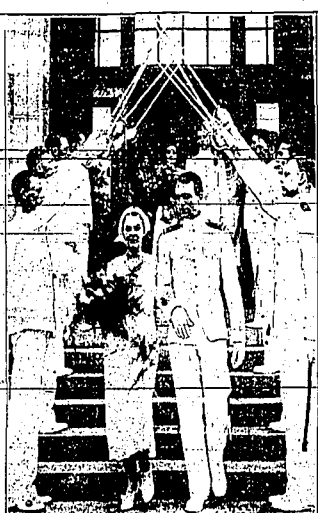

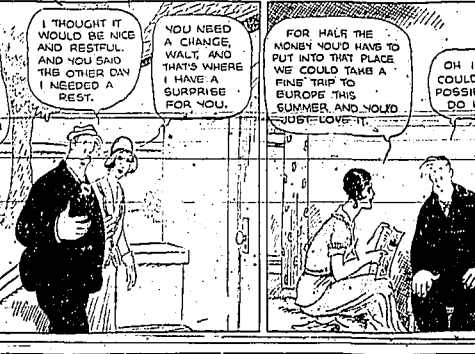
