## DISARMAMENT OF EUROPEAN NATIONS HOLDS SPOTLIGHT

Stimson-Reaches Rome Just As Proposal From France For Discussion of Naval Slash Arrives at Capital

(By The Associated Press.)  
DISARMAMENT began to loom forward into an important place today in reparations discussion in European capitals.  
Plans were being made for the experts committee on the Hoover committee plan to meet in London next Friday, on the same day that Prime Minister MacDonald and Foreign Minister Arthur Henderson were to leave for Berlin to return the visit of the German chancellor and foreign minister.  
It was announced at Washington that the United States would expect an observer to the London experts committee.  
The American government also made it known that it would accept an invitation received today to participate in the general disarmament conference at Geneva next February.  
Secretary of State Stimson arrived at Rome last night almost simultaneously with a proposal from the French government suggesting a revision of the Franco-Italian naval limitations of 1919.

LONDON, July 8.—Representatives of the chief countries allied to the Hoover plan, falling some unexpected light, will meet in London today to discuss the details of the plan and the Hoover moratorium which were left awaiting the Franco-American agreement in Paris.  
Although the United States is not a sign of the young plan, she is not expected to be followed by a moratorium.  
Preliminary negotiations will be conducted by financial experts only, but it was regarded as highly probable tonight that these technical discussions would be followed by a meeting of the plenipotentiaries.  
The nature and scope of such a meeting, assuming that it occurs at all, will naturally depend on the course taken at the experts conference.  
Best informed commentators agreed today that the British government has become more and more impressed with the vital necessity for speed if full advantage is to be taken of the Hoover proposal and if the war of London, Paris, and Berlin are to maintain their buoyancy.  
In this connection it was pointed out that the British government had proposed an experts' conference to meet as early as next Monday. ## CURED

Emergency clauses of the tariff law have been called into play to stop a leak in the tariff wall which millions of pounds of Chinese dried eggs poured into this country and seriously impaired the American poultry industry.

Under the President's proclamation that remedied this situation, the duty on dried eggs has been increased from twenty-seven cents a pound to thirty cents.

It is desirable to have a duty on eggs in the tariff, and the whole duty of American industry has been created on the protective policy, then it is desirable to have a duty on dried eggs, and everybody saw it that way, except a few lemon pie and ice cream makers yielding influence all out of proportion to their importance.

The President's proclamation has moved the situation in respect to the poultry industry.

They remain to be applied a similar remedy with respect to the duty on eggs.

## TEACHERS' PAY

Chicago school teachers have been parading for their pay. Such a demonstration is unusual. And sad to say, it doesn't seem to have accomplished much. All the indignities teachers got was vague promises.

The school authorities possibly cannot help it. The school system, like many other taxation units in Chicago, is bankrupt. Taxes are exhausted and public and private loan resources are exhausted.

If the teachers can't blame the school board, they can blame Al Capone and his racketeering associates. It is his crowd and their affiliated political racketeers who are mainly responsible for the break-down of business integrity and public credit in Chicago. There is nothing in such a situation more shameful than the way school teachers have to suffer for business and governmental crookedness.

## AIR MAIL EXPANSION

Air mail service continues to expand. This month will see sixteen additional lines established, all but two or three of which are new routes.

There are extensions of present transcontinental service. It is expected that the air mail service soon will be handling one million pounds a month.

Along with this development goes increased passenger service. W. Irving Oliver, assistant postmaster-general, reports that the Postoffice Department is equally interested in both lines of service. He adds the interesting fact that the West makes more use of available passenger air lines than does the East. Perhaps this is because there are greater distances to be covered in the West than in the more populous industrial East.

As a matter of fact, we aren't absolutely abandoned, yet, but we're getting there.

## LESS ILLITERACY

We are making real progress now in lowering illiteracy in the United States. The percentage of illiterates to the total population ten years and over has changed as follows:

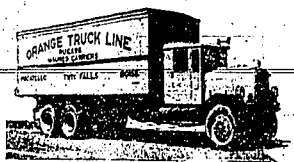
