CANADA CONCLUDES
TRADE AGREEMENT
WITH AUSTRALIANS

Pact Guarantees "Substan-
tial Tariff Preference"
to Benefit Exporters of
Commodities in Dominion

(By The Associated Press)
OTTAWA, Ontario, July 13
—Premier R. B. Bennett
today announced in the
house of commons—that the
new Canada-Australia trade
agreement had been concluded.
The agreement guarantees
the bulk of commodities ex-
ported from Canada "a sub-
stantial tariff preference in
Australia," he said. Canada in re-
turn gives Australia a preferential
tariff on specified items.

Throughout the negotiations, Pre-
mier Bennett said, the two countries
had "sought to adhere to the principle
of reciprocity to each other, in
which at the present time is being
done with countries outside the
British Empire."

For several years, he said, Aus-
tralia has purchased an average of more
than \$300,000 worth of goods from
Canada annually. "Canada is in a
position to supply a large pro-
portion of this demand and under
the new agreement we believe we will
do it," he added.

He quoted the letter of Patrick
McKirdie, Australian minister for
markets and transport, who said "the
step we have just taken is un-
doubtedly a very material advance
towards that ideal of inter-empire
preference which we all consider to
be a vital necessity in upholding the
position of the British common-
wealth."

Berlin Government Orders
Banks of Nation Closed to
Avert Financial Collapse

Directors of World Financial Institution
At Basel, Switzerland, Agree to Renew
Participation in Re-Discount Credit of
\$100,000,000 Accorded to Reichsbank

(By The Associated Press)
BERLIN, July 13.—The German
government, shortly before midnight tonight,
ordered all banks in the nation to re-
main closed Tuesday and Wednesday as
a desperate measure to halt demands for
currency which today threatened the country's
financial stability.

The government's action was taken follow-
ing upon the issuance of a decree by Presi-
dent Paul von Hindenburg authorizing the
cabinet to "declare bank holidays."
President von Hindenburg's decree was issued
under authority given him by Article 48 of the constitution
to decree laws in such emergencies.
The decree also gave the government
authority to suspend the operation of the
extension of the time-limits the banks must
remain closed if it were found neces-
sary.

The government hoped tonight,
however, that it would be possible
to keep the banks open again
Thursday, at least.

The Reichsbank is the only credit
institution in the nation exempt
from the closing order.

At the same time that it ordered
the closing of the banks, the govern-
ment prohibited the banks and the
post office money order department
from handling payments or trans-
fers of money, either by postal note
or otherwise.

PHILADELPHIA, July 13.—Philadelphia Athletics kept a grip on six games on the third straight American league pennant today as they split a double-header with the Washington Senators.

A seven-run rally in the eighth inning gave the A's the first game, 12 to 7, while the Senators won the second, 6 to 4.

With home runs ringing off their bats almost as frequently as singles, the champions drove in all except two of their 12 runs in the opener.

Philadelphia-Dwight Gooden, Rich-ardson, and the champions in the running in the early innings with their four-base hits and Williams and Simmons delivered in the eighth to rout the Senators completely. Williams, batting for Grove, hit his homer with the bases loaded while Simmons connected with Cochran on base.

TWIN FALLS CITY COUNCIL REDUCES LEVY BY 6 MILLS

Reduction of Interest Payment Through Refunding of Bond and Paying of \$48,000 Benefits Taxpayers

Owing to reduction in interest due to refunding of city bonds and to payment of \$48,000 of such bonds July 1, the levy for bond interest for the city during the coming year will be 9 1/2 mills against 1931. This levy being made by the Twin Falls city council last night. This means a similar reduction in the total levy which will be 24 mills instead of 30 mills.

The difference in the amount raised will be \$1,600.00. The levy last year of 30 mills based on a valuation of \$5,212,674 was \$159,380.13. This year, based on the same valuation, it will be \$127,941.04. Other items besides bond interest and millage are: city lighting, 2 1/2 mills; library, 2 mills; bond, 1 mill. Bonds were renewed for the following members of the police force for \$300 each: Ralph E. Leighton, W. A. Sears, W. R. Bush, William Taylor and E. E. Burns. Bond of \$500 for Miss E. Blanche Walker, water works clerk, and of \$200 for Robert Henry Deise, painter, etc. were also renewed. Plumbing license was issued to the Gooding Heating and Plumbing company, Gooding.
