FALL BEGINS TERM OF YEAR AND DAY IN SANTA FE

Former Interior Secretary Arrives in Ambulance With Caravan at State Prison After Long Fight

(By The Associated Press) SANTA FE, N. M., July 20.—Alfred B. Palf, former interior secretary convicted of bribery in federal oil lease, tonight entered the Santa Fe state prison to serve a sentence of a year and a day.

He brought from El Paso, Texas, by easy stages in an ambulance, tonight directly to the prison, where he is expected to serve his term.

The usual photographic, flatter printing, and other publicity, which was dispensed with until Fall is reported by the prison physician, Dr. E. W. Pike, as being in poor health.

He arrived here from his beautiful Alamo (Three days' ride) at about 27 miles away from here. He had stopped there (12 miles) resting from his previous 12-mile trip.

Fire-Car Caravan
The Fall ambulance led a caravan of four cars. First behind the ambulance was a car driven by Dr. E. W. Pike, who was charged by the government with responsibility for delivery of Palf to the state prison.

Except for stops, the caravan proceeded rapidly at about 10 miles an hour, making the trip in 7 1/2 hours. Palf chatted with the crowd as the trip proceeded.

MINISTER DIRECTS THOUGHT TO ANGEL WORK AND DESTINY

Rev. Mackey J. Brown, in sermon Preached at Nazarene Church, Inquires—Into Spiritual Celestial Ways

The origin, work and destiny of angels was the theme of the sermon preached by Rev. Mackey J. Brown, Nazarene minister, at the Nazarene Church of the Nazarene last Sunday. In part, he said:

Woe betide the man who follows in the footsteps of the fallen angels! A super-natural messenger of God; a spiritual celestial being; a being of man in power and intelligence; attendant spirit; genius; demon.

The Bible is replete with scriptures relative to the existence of innumerable hosts of angels who were created by God.

Before the entrance of man, some one has said, the Bible is its own commentary. It is interesting to note the clearness and completeness of the Scriptures as to the origin, work and destiny of angels. A story is told of a noted minister presented an elaborate treatise on the subject of angels to a Southern negro preacher. When asked as to how he liked the treatise, the colored minister replied: "The Bible show us three light on this commentary. Thus, the colored man's philosophy was good."

Not to be Worshipped

The Bible teaches that angels should not be worshipped. John, when in an act of worshipping an angel in the life of Pauline, was admonished by the celestial being not to worship him, but God.

Like man, angels were originally put on probation. Lucifer, the archangel, rebelled against God and was with the third of the angels who also sinned, cast out of Heaven. Complete Bible scholars teach and the Scriptures seem to confirm that Lucifer became the devil and that the fallen angels were transformed into demons. When these fallen angels rebelled they undoubtedly lost much of their wisdom and power but they still retain intelligence and strength superior to man. Lucifer, who we believe, became Satan because of his pride and rebellion is referred to in the Scriptures as appearing to men "as an angel of light." Church history and the Bible confirm the fact many heretics and false doctrines have arisen because of the counterfeit supernatural manifestations which undoubtedly have their source in Satan, and his hosts of fallen angels who appear as "angels of light." Through the power of the Holy Spirit in the world as God's executive and through His presence in the heart of the Christian, these fallen angels can be detected and overcome.

These evil angels are not omnipotent, but they move about with lightning velocity, bent on the destruction of men. The prevalence of crime, suicide and murder today is according to the Scriptures, primarily due to the ingenuity of evil angels. They hover over wicked men until their diabolical work is accomplished and then at death they deliver their victims into eternal punishment.

This is indeed a sad but true picture of the picture is a bright one, when we consider the gracious work of Holy angels who surround and protect those who fear and worship God.

The Psalmist David proclaimed under inspiration and perhaps when in danger, that "The angel of the Lord encampeth round about them that fear him, and delivereth them." (Psa. 34:7)

The prophet Elijah and his servant were graciously delivered from the Assyrian army by these celestial beings who, though at first unseen, lifted the mountain round about them that fear him, and delivereth them. (2 Kings 6)

The three Hebrew children, who were cast by Nebuchadnezzar into the fiery furnace were delivered by an angel without even the angel of fire on their garments. (Dan. 3)

One of these Holy angels accompanied the prophet Daniel into the lions' den where he was cast by King Darius, because he prayed regularly to his God. In a miraculous way, the angel shut the mouths of the lions and rescued him. Daniel and his companions in a perfect deliverance. So great was the miracle that the King ordered that no one should speak against the God of Daniel. (Dan. 6)

Reverent Angels

In the Scriptures we also find the benevolent work of Holy angels. Christ was strengthened by an angel both in the wilderness temptation and in the Garden of Gethsemane. The apostle Peter was cast into prison and bound with chains was visited by an angel of God who smote him on the side and his arms and immediately the chains fell off. Peter was then commanded by the angel to gird himself, put on his sandals and garment and to follow him and when they reached the prison gate, it opened of its own accord. After escorting Peter into the street, the angel of God winged his way perhaps to some other child of God who needed his assistance.

Another important work of angels will take place when Christ returns to earth again. The Apostle Paul declared that Christ would return with the Holy angels, taking vengeance on those who know not God and obey not the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ.

As to the destiny of angels, those who are holy will continue to worship and obey God throughout eternity, and those who keep not their first estate and thus became

fallen angels, shall with the devil, spend eternally in the lake of fire. (Matt. 25:41)

May we all worship and obey the loving, all-wise, all-powerful God, and his Son Jesus Christ, and thus we shall be enabled to say with David: "The Angel of the Lord encampeth round about them that fear him and delivereth them." Amen

Selwyn Palmer, 10, Recently From Essex, New York, Drowns in Swift Water

RUPERT, July 20 (Special to The News)—Selwyn Palmer, 10, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Palmer, who recently arrived in Rupert from Essex, New York, was drowned in a lateral canal north of Rupert last evening when a swift current carried him into deep water. He was unable to swim.

The body was recovered by O. W. Paul, manager of the Boise-Payette lumber company plant here, about 20 minutes after it disappeared. The city's janitor was called at once, but life had left the body.

The accident occurred about 7 P. M., only 15 minutes after the boy had with his two brothers, Junior, 12, and Norman, 8, left their home two blocks away.

The body lies in the Goodwin mortuary here. As soon as arrangements are completed the elder brother, Lyman, 16, will return by rail with the body to New York.

There are seven surviving brothers and sisters: Wilma, 18, Roberta, 14, Joyce, 4, Junior, 12, Norman, 8, and Peter and Pauline, twins, 21 months of age. The family will return to New York by motor for funeral services.

EQUALIZATION BOARD CONCLUDES SESSION

Lopping \$2,300,000 off Twin Falls county's assessed valuation was the outstanding achievement of Twin Falls county commissioners sitting as a board of equalization during the past month. Sessions of the commissioners as an equalization board were adjourned yesterday pursuant to statute.

The board reduced by 10 per cent, the assessed valuation of all irrigated lands and business and residence property, and also improvements on business and residence property, and cut 20 per cent off the valuation put on Salmon River project irrigated lands.

These reductions, according to estimate by Harry C. Parsons, county auditor, will lower last year's assessed total tax rolls by approximately \$2,300,000.

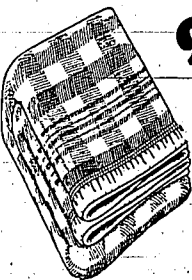

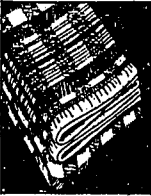
