# OKLAHOMA'S CHIEF EXECUTIVE GOES TO

## BRIDGE WAR FRONT

**"Alfalfa Bill" Arrives at  
Front Line With Horse  
Pistol and Eats Liver  
and Onions With Privates**

(By The Associated Press)  
DURANT, Okln., July 25—  
Governor W. H. (Alfalfa Bill) Murray arrived here tonight from Oklahoma City and took personal command of Oklahoma national guardsmen engaged in the Red river bridge war. He had an ancient horse pistol in his valise.  
The governor, accompanied by Adjutant General Charles F. Barrett and a newly appointed colonel, A. L. Roach, chief highway department engineer, also a supper of livers and onions with a group of buccannars.  
Shortly afterward, one of his

Alces, Lieutenant Colonel John A. MacDonald, gave verbal notice to Joe W. Bailey, attorney for the Red River Bridge company, that he would defy a federal court order, handed down today at Muskogee, Oklahoma, restraining maintenance of a barricade erected by Oklahoma Indians at the approach to the Denison-Durant toll bridge.

Governor Murray departed from the state capitol today to take a personal command of operations in a martial law zone he had ordered erected at the Oklahoma end of the bridge. The south end of the structure is in Texas.

He announced he would "hold them in check" with his detachments of guardsmen against any attempts of the authorities of the eastern Oklahoma federal district court to enforce the injunction issued by Federal Judge G. G. G. Neblett.

The temporary injunction, naming Adjutant General Charles F. Barrett and other Oklahoma officials, but not the governor, restrained the maintenance of a barricade erected on Oklahoma soil to prevent travel over the toll span.

The bridge war turned to a clash

of authority between the governor and Judge Neblett on the subject of the side of the road for "AHEAD" signs was his major objective when these managers threw open to travel the Denton-Durant intercity highway, near the toll structure. LONDON, July 25.—Kingsley Hall settlement, where Gandhi plans to live in September when he comes to the round table conference, reminds one of a little of an American Young Men's Christian Association. It lacks a gymnasium and some of the apparatus, but it has something of that air about it.

Mrs. Lester, who will be Gandhi's hostess, founded the settlement in the late 1800s—some 20 years ago, but the modest, modern building now housing it is only a few years old.

Gandhi and his entourage are to live in the big hall on the ground floor. At one end is a pulpit and on three sides are tall windows. The floor is oak and polished by use. This hall serves the settlement both as a chapel and concert-hall.

Just outside and on the same floor is a tiny room known as the "sanctuary" where one may go and pray or meditate in quiet. Gandhi may use it if he likes, especially on his week days of silence.

On the floor above is a club room, with ping-pong tables, a billiard table, a pool table, a small bar, but the cocktails have no alcohol, which should please the Gandhi. The floor is oak and polished by use. This hall serves the settlement both as a chapel and concert-hall.

On the top floor are the cells in which the settlement workers live. They are for men. Finally there is the roof from which Gandhi will see hundreds of homes of the poor against a big background of industrial smoke.

In one corner is a rock garden, where the settlement workers are busy. This will be mostly reserved for Gandhi when he comes.

Peace the settlement's surroundings are Spartan and utilitarian, and Gandhi will like that, Mrs. Lester says.

She thinks, too, that they will have no trouble in preparing his food, if he desires. Many of the workers are vegetarians, and his diet is world-famous by this time.

She says that Gandhi's selection of this settlement as a residence, a dozen milk goats were offered and Mrs. Lester accepted one with a good word.

## DANZIG, GERMAN AT HEART, RESISTS FRENCH EFFORTS TO STABILIZE POLISH CORRIDOR

DANZIG, July 25.—The "Danzig question," one of the by-products of the World War, has again become acute because of France's pressure on Germany for a "Locarno of the East" and because of a fresh crop of disputes between the Free City and Poland.

Charges of aggression by German Nationalists in Danzig against Poland, which they claim is a threat to the subject to direct France's attention to the subject. The eastern "Locarno" of security pact which the French want to see signed, and which the German-minded among Danzig's citizens are protesting against, is a campaign for modification of the Polish corridor and return of the port to German sovereignty.

The trouble dates back to establishment of Danzig as a Free City. 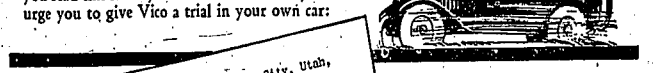
