A. Edison ly Suffers al Collapse

85-Year-Old Father's
Condition as "Critical"

(By The Associated Press)

WEST ORANGE, N. J.,
(Sunday—Morning)

Edison, world famous inven-
tor, was resting quietly after-
noon following a sudden col-
lapse suffered late yesterday

Two of his physicians, Dr. Frederick M. Allen and Dr. William R. Williams, left the home of the aged ward shortly before midnight but Dr. Hubert S. Howe, the family physician, remained through the night by the side of his aged patient.

Shortly after midnight Dr. Howe said Mr. Edison showed improvement and was resting comfortably.

Physicians, after a lengthy consultation, issued the following statement late yesterday:

"MR. EDISON HAS BEEN FAILING IN HEALTH SINCE HIS RETURN FROM FLORIDA SIX WEEKS AGO. HE HAS BEEN WEAK AND UNABLE TO TAKE ANY EXERCISE SINCE HIS RETURN FROM FLORIDA. HIS NERVOUS AND DIGESTIVE ORGANS

The condition of the aged inventor, who is in his eighty-fifth year, since yesterday that one of his physicians, Dr. Hubert A. Howe, who had been swimming at Sands Point, Long Island, hurriedly chartered an amphibian plane and flew from Manhattan late airport to Newark, New Jersey, where an automobile and a police escort speeded him to

Charles Edison, son of the snow-haired creative genius, told intimate associates late yesterday that his father was "critically ill," and it was learned that Mr. Edison's usual afternoon automobile ride had been cancelled.

John Sloane, son-in-law of Mr. Edison, said the inventor had been "in the hospital" for several days recently, but neighbors said he had gone motoring during the last 10 days. It was necessary to carry him to the machine.

News of Mr. Edison was carefully guarded in the home, situated in Llewellyn park, a restricted and private residential district.

Upon arriving from Fort Myers, Florida in June, the inventor appeared more feeble than usual. The lack of his customary visits to his laboratory was the basis for reports that he had decided to retire. Denials were made with the explanation that Mr. Edison was indis-

MILKMEN'S STRIKE FLARES IN OREGON

Dynamite Explodes, Fists Fly and Vandals Destroy 10,000 Gallons of Milk

PORTLAND, Aug. 1 (U)—Violence broke out in the Portland milk district today as producers united in a strike against distributors. Dynamite was used, fists flew, trucks were hijacked and at least 30,000 gallons of milk was destroyed during the day. The strike was called after distributors refused to agree to higher prices demanded by the producers. Farmers and ranchers receive about 2 cents for

Vandalism and violence in many forms was reported. A small milk truck in Woodland; Washington, was dynamited. Milk trucks were held up on Oregon roads and drivers held while the milk was poured out on the highways. Milk cans which farmers had placed at the roadside to be picked up by trucks were emptied and soiled. Progress of milk trucks was hindered by nail-filled blanks. Farmers and truck drivers were threatened if delivery to the black-listed distributors was attempted. State police were assigned to guard milk trucks.

"Babe" Ruth Boosts Margin of Leadership in Individual Hitting Honors by 8 Points During Week

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—New York Yankees' margin finally has overtaken the Cleveland Indians in the struggle for the old-time Yankee supremacy in the batting championship of the American league.

After running in front almost since the start of the season, the Indians dropped to second place and the Yankees jumped in front by a 3-point margin after Thursday's games, unofficial averages disclosed today. The unofficial statistics gave the Yankees the lead with a 27 percentage, 104 to 101 by the Indians.

Ruth, himself, increased his batting average to .340, and during the past week to boost his lead in the individual hitting race by 8 points over Al Simmons of the Athletics. The Athletics held first place in the league with their 778 mark, but the Senators gained 10 points to creep up to 773.

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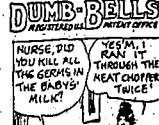

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POTATO SITUATION CREATES INTEREST

Growers and Dealers Seek
Information and Advice
From Expert Sources

Damage to potatoes in southern and eastern Idaho, as a result, it is believed, of the recent severe heat wave, was the subject of intense interest and unusual discussion here yesterday.

Arrival of experts connected with the University of Idaho, Moscow, and with the state department of agriculture, added to interest and inquiries were made of them and of the county agent, Harvey B. Hale, with a view of securing advice upon the potato situation.

Growers had generally conducted investigations into their own fields since varying periods. In a few fields the potatoes were found to be in good condition, in others they were found sprouting. In others the damage was considerable. It was generally believed that the damage was caused by the heat wave.

Checks totaling \$12,727 are to be distributed by the Twin Falls county agent's office among 18 growers who participated in a pool of 245 lamb acreage in a pool of 245 lamb acreage in a pool of 245 lamb acreage.

It was reported that in one large field near Burley, investigation as far as was indicated that exactly 50 per cent of the crop was affected.

G. R. McLeod, university of Idaho extension service specialist, and R. E. Zell, soil technologist of the state department of agriculture, arrived upon their arrival from Idaho Falls, that the loss in the Upper Snake river valley was estimated at 50 per cent.

The growing potatoes, principally russets, sprouted during the heat wave.

Mr. Taylor said that the conditions in the field elsewhere through southern and eastern Idaho always prevailed more or less in the early part of the season. This year the damage was not confined to any section. He said that heretofore the late commercial crop had not suffered to any great extent. This year, in his opinion, would be more serious.

At most cases affected fields are suffered from a very slight per cent, but in some cases the loss is as high as 50 per cent.

Harvey B. Hale, Twin Falls county agent, took a different view. He said the Twin Falls district was hard hit and advised against irrigation, saying nothing could be done to check sprouting and that the situation was serious.

He added, however, that cooler weather would probably be beneficial.

TOURIST TRAFFIC AT PARK SHOWS DECLINE

The number of auto tourists arriving at the eastern entrance of Yellowstone park so far this year exceeded by one per cent the number arriving during the same period in the average recent year, the hotel keeper at that point told Judge O. BEAN PROSPECTS IN IDAHO IMPROVE

Michigan Reports Indicate
Damage to Crop in Some
Sections Due to Heat

With approximately 100,000 acres of beans of all varieties in the Twin Falls project, the North Side project, and the Salmon project, with prospects for an excellent crop of fine quality, growers and dealers are studying bean interest. In conditions in other states bearing on markets. So far all indications are that the quality of the beans will be better than last year, unless damaged by late rains, it is said.

The crop is heavy on all projects, the farmers are said.

Conditions in Michigan, which grows a white bean, which is in competition with the Great Northern beans raised here, are watched with keen interest. According to dispatches received here yesterday by the Chicago River company and the Twin Falls Feed and Ice company, the central Michigan area is badly hit by the late rains. It was stated, however, in the dispatches that other Michigan areas have produced a good crop. It was further stated that general weather conditions have resulted in a stronger market.

The telegrams referred to, so far as they relate to crop conditions, are looking generally, complimentary of statements made over long distance telephone Friday night to St. Claude Street by the latter-in-law, Frank H. Hardy, president of the chamber of commerce, big Idaho, Michigan. Mr. Hardy said that beans promised to yield a large crop, but stated that rain was badly needed.
