



## REED DRAWS FIRE WITH ATTACK ON DRY LAW BUREAU

Acting Prohibition Director  
Says Government Has Abolished  
Use of "Speakeasy"  
To Entrap Bootleggers

NEW YORK, Aug. 6 (AP)—Former Senator James A. Reed of Missouri, writing in the September issue of the International Communist magazine, charges the federal government with setting up speakeasies to entrap violators and thus becoming "a bootlegger's ally."

In addition, Reed charged the government with an "un-American" policy of "allowing" California grape growers and grape-concentrate manufacturers, "and with the assistance of federal agents to cooperate with state officials in making raids on wineries that would be illegal under federal law."

Two of the federal speakeasy investigations cited by Reed were 1926. One, he said, saw agents working with the director of the Virginia National League set up "a Negro speakeasy in a remodeling saloon."

The other cited "a notorious bootlegging club in New York City." The club was operated by prohibition agents with the approval of a federal judge.

However, immediately upon the transfer of the prohibition bureau from the treasury department to the department of justice, "he continued," we have a new prohibition operations. Reed said the establishment of this speakeasy was admitted by prohibition Director Woodcock. He added several Indianapolis police men had been sent to prison on the evidence obtained in this case.

The law to the California prohibitionists, Reed charged, was made with full knowledge that the grape and grape concentrate are being manufactured into 12 to 30 per cent wines and champagne in the homes in quantities more than three times as great as all the wine production of the United States before prohibition.

BUREAU HEAD DISCLOSES  
METHODS UNDER ATTACK  
WASHINGTON, Aug. 6 (AP)—Charges by former Senator Reed of Missouri that the government set up speakeasies to entrap bootleggers and "allow" California grape growers to cooperate with state officials in making raids on wineries that would be illegal under federal law, were met by prohibition officials today with the statement that such practices had been abolished.

Howard T. Jones, acting prohibition director, said the prohibition bureau now was "absolutely opposed to the entrapment of violators or bootleggers and will not tolerate it in any form."

Turning to the Indianapolis incident cited by Reed, Jones asserted that was not done by the prohibition bureau.

"We are not exactly sure of all the details of the case at Indianapolis," he said. "What we do know is that the administrator for that district authorized the hiring of a room in which agents could meet with bootleggers and suspected bootleggers."

"It was not a speakeasy. No liquor was bought or sold there, although we believe now some was drunk there. The agents called as though they intended to open a speakeasy, apparently hoping that bootleggers would declare their intentions of demanding bribes and others would propose to sell them liquor."

"This case came entirely too close to the line. I don't like it."

The acting director said these activities were on without the knowledge of officials in Washington and that Colonel Woodcock, the director, had set his foot down flatly against any similar schemes.





## IDAHO'S BONDED DEBT DIMINISHES

Nearly One-Million-Dollar Cut in Two Years

BOISE, Aug. 6 (AP)—The bonded debt of Idaho is nearly \$1,000,000 less than two years ago and is the lowest figure in several years, the monthly report of State Treasurer George Barrett showed today.

The present debt is \$1,121,230, compared with \$2,170,000 two years ago. While the total debt, including bonds, treasury notes and other items is about the same, the treasurer's report said, changes in the type of indebtedness have made it possible for the state to borrow at lower interest rates. The total debt is \$1,200,000, compared with \$2,200,192 two years ago.

The amount of treasury notes bearing low interest rates has been increased to permit paying off of higher interest securities bearing 6 per cent. The books were cleared of the \$271,000 with a payment of \$1,029,230 last month.

## HIGHWAY BUREAU ASKS SUGGESTION ON NAME OF ROAD

Chamber of Commerce Requests Cooperation in Obtaining Satisfactory Title for Trail to Dam

Appeal was made yesterday by the board of highways of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce for suggestions for a name for the highway extending from Baileys Canyon to Las Vegas, Nevada. Although unofficially known for some time as "Unit-aid" highway, number 80, it has just been designated officially in this country for its full length. Presumably part of the route had been officially so designated.

It is suggested by the highway bureau that the name be one that is appropriate and striking name, which will be satisfactory to all communities which it touches.

The following is the text of the appeal:

"The great highway artery rapidly nearing completion is entitled to a name—not an ordinary name that should be selected in haste, but rather one in keeping with the importance of the route, its location and history, and its international character."

It is possible to find a name that is descriptive of the route, that establishes it in its proper relation to the other great recognized north and south highways of the West such as the "Coast Highway" and the "Pacific Highway." To be sure, number 80 is called "Gardner Highway" in Idaho and is well known as the Sunnyside Highway in Nevada, and in Arizona is generally known as the "Coast Highway." In Montana and Canada we hear no specific name whatever.

Let a name be found that does not over-emphasize any one community or state, that is short, euphonious, catchy and yet descriptive and significant. Or possibly some one striking feature in one state will be so distinctive that it will be acceptable to the other states. In order to start serious consideration of the subject we submit a name and some reasons for its merit. This is a beginning may suggest a number of better names.

Why not call Number 80 the "Great Western Highway"? This route is truly a scenic cross-section of our striking features and achievements in conquering this western part of the continent.

Starting at Baileys we have the well known resorts of the Canadian Rockies, in Montana the Glacier National park, the lakes, Indian reservation, historic missions, mines and the continental divide are featured. In Idaho we have the Salmon river canyon, mines, Sawtooth mountains, and the Snake river. In Nevada the national monument, the famous Twin Falls irrigation project, the famous high bridge and Shoshone Falls; in Nevada the copper mines, the western desert, Lehman caves, the Buried City, Petrified Forest, and the Boulder dam being constructed. Extension of the highway across Arizona will present another set of interesting Western scenes to the traveler.

Twice, the route of Number 80 highway constitutes a panorama of the Great West in all its striking phases such a name as proposed is all-inclusive, and attracts no special attention to any one town or section of the highway. Then, why not call it the "Great Western Highway" for a name?

If you have in mind another name, let us hear it—along with a brief explanation of your reasons. To the committee, commercial organizations and the newspapers.

He was held in the Jefferson county jail at Ruby on an open charge, pending the outcome of Petty's injury. He was quoted by officers as admitting the shooting.


