### DIRECTOR GENERAL IN LABOR BUREAU QUILTS

GRIM REAPER SUMMONS NOTED BRITISH WRITER

JOSEPH PAUL-BONCOUR, Foreign Affairs Chairman of Chamber of Deputies, Declares Third Republic Ready to Take Momentous Step to Insure Peace for Posterity

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PARIS, Aug. 31. (P)—Joseph Paul-Boncour, foreign affairs chairman of the chamber of deputies, today issued the Associated Press a statement in which he proposed that the armed forces of every nation be placed at the disposal of the League of Nations to put down wars of aggression.

M. Paul-Boncour, who will be one of France's principal delegates to the Geneva disarmament conference in February, declared France was ready to take that momentous step.

"Are other nations, like us, ready?" he asked. "If they are willing to put their permanent air, naval and land forces under the control and at the disposal of the League of Nations? By this gesture the problem of parity might be solved."

His statement was issued after careful preparation and painstaking examination lasting over a period of 10 days.

Under his plan, the League of Nations would exercise "an international mortgage" on the forces of the nations in the event of a war of aggression. This "mortgage" would be exercised under Article XXV of the League of Nations covenant.

The plan was a result of the fact that the League of Nations had been unable to prevent the outbreak of the war.

The article also authorizes the League to recommend to the governments what effective military, naval or air forces they should contribute to put down an aggression.

The Dow Jones industrial average closed at 236.46, down 1.14 points from 237.60 on Monday. The S&P 500 index closed at 118.12, down 0.12 points from 118.24. The volume of trading was moderate, with about 100 million shares changing hands. The market was generally quiet, with only a few sectors showing activity. The bond market was also steady, with government bonds showing a slight decline. The foreign exchange market was volatile, with the dollar showing a slight gain against the pound. The gold market was also steady, with the price of gold remaining relatively flat. The overall sentiment was cautious, with investors waiting for more signs of recovery before committing to a full rally.
