YELLOW RIVER ADDS TO CHINESE DEATHS

Another Great Flood Disaster Increases Toll of 350,000 Lives in China

SHANGHAI, Sept. 7 (UP)—Another great flood disaster was inflicted today upon China, already suffering from the most tremendous inundation of its modern times.

With at least 350,000 already dead and 50,000,000 said by the government to face starvation in the coming winter, the Yellow river overflowed its banks in northern Honan province.

Reports that the latest disaster has caused huge loss of life were partly confirmed. Press dispatches said 700 were drowned in the Meinaiing dis-

The Yellow river, long known as "China's Sorrow," rose to dangerous heights for 400 miles of its meandering course across Honan and Shantung provinces. Anxiety was felt for safety of several mission stations which did not reply to telegraphic inquiries.

Indicating the widespread character of the Chinese flood, reports of "incalculable casualties" came from Yunnan province in the far south-eastern interior. The mighty Yangtze river was said to have covered the

Hundreds of miles down its course the Yangtze burst several dykes at Sinit. Eighty thousand persons clung to remaining levees, awaiting food and medicines by boats dispatched from Hankow, 75 miles northeastward.

These latest calamities augmented the frightful distress in northern Kiangsu province and the vast Yangtze valley. With grand canal flood-

Officials Decide to Open Competition for Title At First of Next Month

CHICAGO, Sept. 7.—(AP)—The world's series between the champion Philadelphia Athletics and the national league winner, probably St. Louis, will begin on October 1, executives of the National and American leagues decided today after a meeting with Baseball Commissioner Kennesaw Mountain Landis.

Whether the opening scene will be at St. Louis or New York remains to be determined. It was determined that Philadelphia was designated as the city in which the contesting teams will meet for the first two games on National league grounds.

Should the Cardinals clinch the pennant, the Missouri city will see the teams in action Thursday and Friday, October 1 and 2, and Saturday and Sunday will open dates for travel to Philadelphia, where three games will be staged October 5, 6 and 7.

In the event more than five games are necessary, the battleground will again shift to St. Louis and play resumes on Monday, October 12.

However, if John McGraw's crafty Giants seal a march on the Cards and gain the National league championship, the first two games will be played in New York and the third in Philadelphia, October 3, Sunday will be the first day and the Cardinals resumed Monday and continued Tuesday.

It will be the third consecutive year that Philadelphia has emerged winner of the American league pennant drive, having won the series in 1929 and 1930.
