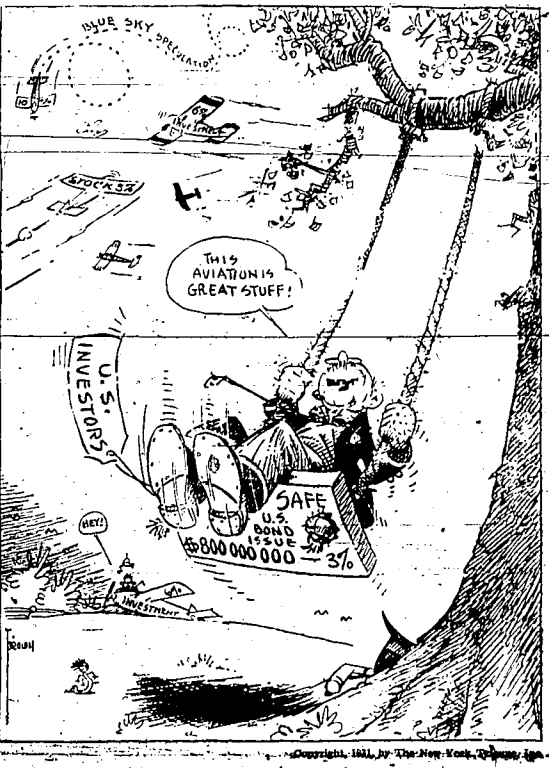

George Arliss' Consummate Artistry Again Casts Spell Over Theatregoers

"The Millionaire" is an engaging American comedy with Arliss in what we predict will be the most popular role he has had in talking pictures, not even excepting the now famous "Daredevil" and "Old English."

NEW YORK, Sept. 15 (AP)—Valentine Williams must be a young man of mixed feelings today. He wrote his first play, a melodrama, called "Three Times The Hour," and it came to Broadway with an aura of advance glowing reports.

Those who had seen the drama in its layouts said it was excellent, and that young Williams would have a hit in his first effort at writing for the theatre. The morning after the opening, Williams arose to find that all the critics thought his work novel, but thin in action and badly directed.

Novel Device

"Three Times The Hour" is a clever melodrama. Its three acts take place at the same time, but each on a different floor of the same hotel. Introductory events take place on the first floor, leading in the second act to what was happening at the same time on the second floor, and so on to the third floor.

Jerry Dalmonte, who has no peers in the South as an end, is the only one regular of the great "Bama" variety of 1933—John Hurry Cain, backfielder—remains, but Frank Thomas, who succeeded Wallace Wade as head mentor, has his year's second team intact, with a number of new stars.

Alabama's stock troops of 1933, it is believed, could take the measure of most Southern teams.

Over at Athens, Georgia, Coach Harry McPherson has a great Georgia machine ready to roll against all comers, including Yale, New York University, and Southern California.

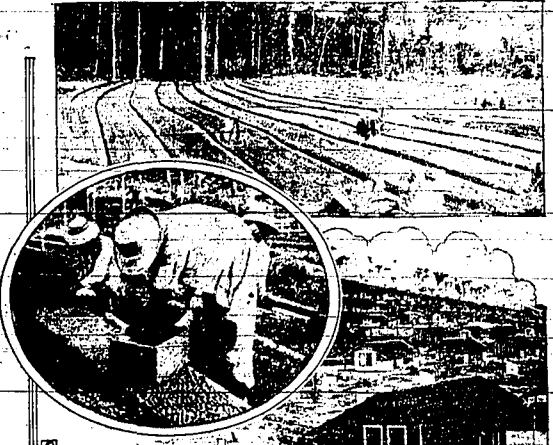
PARA, Brazil, Sept. 12.—Transforming the Brazilian of the Amazon valley from near nakedness into a fully clothed workman with money in his pockets is, says A. MOSCOW, Sept. 12.—A fighter by her husband's side up from czarist oppression through the dark days of revolution and the difficult years of reconstruction, Nadejda Konstantinovna Krupskaya, widow of Lenin, carries on as Red Russia's most militant feminist leader.

Like her contemporaries in the United States and England, here was a role of pioneering for women's rights, but under much more hazardous conditions than were faced in other countries during the early days of the suffrage movement.

She wanted not only equal political rights for women. She demanded also freedom from what she called "domestic slavery."

The first goal has been attained, for there is not discrimination against her sex in any phase of the new Russian life. She has lived to see the young socialistic state making progress toward achievement of the second.

Even before the revolution, Krupskaya's battle cry was: "Down with domestic work! Down with illiteracy!" At 63, those phrases still form the keystone of her philosophy.

SOVIET'S GRANDMA

For of Kitchen Work

Childless herself, although known as "grandmother" to all Russia, she has been always an enemy of such "unproductive" work as cooking, washing and child rearing.

She has been indicted a vigorous advocate of communal dining halls, laundries, sewing factories, nurseries and kindergartens so that women need not be free to take active parts in industry.

To a friend who asked her recently what she would like most to see before she dies, she replied: "Illiteracy gone from the United States Soviet Russia, and women emancipated from domestic work."

Born in 1850 of poor parents Krupskaya's early life was one of hardship, and her mother died when she was only five years of age.

BULL FIGHTS REDUCE LISBON SHOW CROWDS

LISBON, Sept. 12.—The theater crisis here is attributed to bull fights. Thronged theaters have deserted the stuffy theaters for the large open-air "Praza de Torres" where in addition to a fight they are treated to ballet and other attractions. Motion picture houses equally hit by bull fights competition have arranged in common with the stage to seek protection of the authorities.

Since Lenin's death she has lived alone within the Kremlin in an apartment house which also shelters Kalerina, nominal head of the Soviet government, and other notables of the Communist party.

ILL DUCE PREPARES TO VISIT GERMANY

Mussolini's Proposed Trip Causes Officials to Worry Over Leader's Welfare

ROME, Sept. 12.—Mussolini's proposed visit to Berlin, a so-called official Italy great worry—and is leading to much anxious preparation.

This is owing to the fact that once outside Italy, Mussolini is exposed to the plots and revenge of thousands of "fascist" or Italian political enemies.

The OVIRA, or Fascist secret police, are investigating and planning; the police of Berlin are doing the same; the Italian ambassador at Berlin, Grimaldi Baroni, is laying special plans.

Many of Mussolini's friends would prefer that he not go at all.

Seven years in Italy

It is difficult to picture the visit when he formally promised Heinrich Brüning, German chancellor, that he would return the August visit of the chancellor and Foreign Minister Ciano to Rome.

For seven years Mussolini has not left Italy. In 1924 he crossed the Italian border into Switzerland to sign the Locarno pact. The year before he went to Geneva, the year before that to London. There and the trip Italy has just made are becoming premier.

Mussolini's last trip coincided with the time when Italy became a one-party country, with every opposition to the fascists treated as criminal and with the law of the land prison islands facing individuals who might disregard the new order.

Thousands of anti-fascists have fled, particularly into France and Switzerland. There many of them have been thrown in the side of the French and Swiss police, bombing Italian consulates and shooting official Italian representatives and visiting fascists.

Filed whole on Guard

As long as fascism stays in power and these elites stay in opposition to it they cannot hope to return to Italy. They may be willing to go to any length, even assassination, to overturn the government.

The OVIRA are watching circles in the Italian industrial cities which are believed to be passively hostile to fascism to learn if they are in communication with anti-fascists abroad. They are also investigating circles believed to have communist tendencies to learn if they are exchanging ideas with the

Frau Curtius Ranks As Busiest Among Hostesses In Public Life Of Germany

BERLIN, Sept. 12.—Frau Julius Curtius, wife of the foreign minister of Germany, does more official entertaining than any other woman in Germany, not even her daughter-in-law of President von Hindenburg, who is official hostess of the republic.

As the presidential palace official affairs are few. At the home of the foreign minister they are, during certain periods of the year, an almost daily occurrence.

If Frau Curtius could live as she wished, she would find her supreme happiness in devoting herself to her husband and her five children. The oldest of them, a daughter, has just completed the foreign minister with his first grandchild.

Frau Curtius is the perfect type of the living wife and mother. It is a unanimous thing to see her walking with one of her younger daughters, mother-and-child—getting a great kick out of window shopping.

When Dr. Curtius is away on one of his numerous journeys to foreign lands, he can be sure of two things—one, that his wife will talk

to him over the long distance phone the other day she will be at the station on his return. The devotion of the Curtius couple is proverbial.

As a hostess at her home or as guest of honor at some foreign embassy Frau Curtius can draw upon her knowledge of foreign languages to make her partners feel at ease.

Ramsey MacDonald, leading her to table at the British embassy on his recent Berlin visit, was surprised to have her converse with him in excellent English. When Laval and Briand come, they will find her quite as proficient in French.

Frau Curtius has a way of making everybody feel at home. That is due, perhaps, chiefly to her naturalness. There is no pose, no "putting on" of effort to act a part.

It is, however, also due to her background of culture. Her conversation is never flippant—it is one of common-sense tempered with that genial sense of humor that characterizes the inhabitants of the Rhineland.

It was there, as the daughter of an industrialist, Frau Curtius spent her childhood and youth.

OSTRICH FEATHER TRADE IMPROVES

Return of Mid-Victorian Hat To Popularity Aids One of World's Waning Industries

LONDON, Sept. 12.—Revival of the funny little bowler hats of mid-Victorian days, has given new life to one of the world's waning industries, ostrich farming.

Feather merchants of London and the continent, faced with the booming demand for ostrich plumes for use on the new hats, have issued urgent calls to the world's sources of supply for more feathers.

Already three ships have been chartered to bring thousands of feathers from Port Elizabeth, South Africa, to London.

A large number of incubators for ostrich eggs have been rushed over to Africa from manufacturers in this country, who see a prospect of the ostrich feather regaining some of the popularity it had in pre-war days.

Hundreds of girls have been enlisted to undergo judicious training for work on the ostrich farms of South Africa and special staffs have been put together by London merchants to cope with the rush of orders from retailers from all over the empire.

"There is a large risk, however, involved in the revival of the trade in the feathers. The hats are an extreme style and the craze for them may vanish as quickly as it appeared."

MIDNIGHT COCK CROWS PUZZLE PARIS SAVANT

PARIS, Sept. 12.—Why the cock crows at midnight is a problem the French Academy of Sciences has been called upon to solve by M. Biquard, honorary director of the Paris conservatory.

M. Biquard has reported that often while making astronomical observations he has heard the cock crow at midnight, and he wants to know why.

Country people say that when the cock crows at midnight it means bad weather next day.

FISHERMEN ARM AGAINST POACHERS FROM FRANCE

ENRIEIRA, Portugal, Sept. 12.—Fishesmen hereabouts have armed their craft against French poachers on the local fishing grounds.

The coast is devoid of government patrol and the fisheries are often involved in miniature battles against the unwelcome visitors.

Revolvers, shotguns, rifles and sometimes even bombs are brought into action by the fishermen.

Included in his 1932-1933 proposals is \$2,300,000 for a new library, high school and junior college, drydock, police station and road and hospital improvements.

Half a million dollars is proposed for living quarters, which are inadequate to house all Canal Zone employees.

RENOBLE, France, Sept. 12.—Lightning set fire to the old fifteenth century house at Autun, France, the property of the father of Marie Henri Bayle, better known as Stendhal, inventor of the modern psychological novel. Local authorities have organized a committee to insure preservation of what is left of the house.

LISBON, Sept. 12.—In its economy program the Portuguese government has instituted a "public salvation tax" whereby 5 per cent is levied on the salaries of all government employees, the army and the navy.
