GANDHI REQUESTS INDEPENDENCE FOR INDIA'S MILLIONS

Mahatma Addresses Roundtable Conference as Representative of "Dumb and Half-Starved" Masses

LONDON, Sept. 15.—Proclaiming himself to be the representative of India's "dumb and semi-starved millions," Mahatma Gandhi today laid before the federal structure committee of the Indian national conference his demand for complete independence from Great Britain.

"If you can show me my claim is limited to the interests of the British Empire, I will personally resign," he said.

"I am open to conviction but even so I shall have to say my principal to consent to that revision."

The Mahatma, who said not a word during the first session of the committee, returned to the hall today in his day of clear, proclaiming his program in clear tones, speaking as a man, with personal authority.

He made his address, for which he used no notes, as he sat hunched in a chair at the end of the long table, facing the audience.

Tells of Dream
Mr. Gandhi told of a dream which came to him "as I was hearing Britain's shores last week—a dream of equal partnership between Great Britain and India."

But, he asked, would he be better, "an enslaved rebellious India, or an India which is free to share with Great Britain to share her resources and take part side by side with her in her misfortunes? As India is a single nation, he said, she can fight side by side with Britain, but for the exploitation of it, he said, it might be, for the good of the whole world."

Artist Tells of Corsica Banditry

ASHEVILLE, N. C., Sept. 15 (AP)—A harrowing story of being captured in Corsica by bandits who kept him chained to a rock in a cave at night and found him dead when he was rescued during the day told in a letter received here from Henry Merz, Chicago artist.

The painter is in Paris recovering from a wound suffered as he dashed to freedom in a hall of bullets on the evening day.

In the jail sent to Bruce Webb, Asheville, a friend Merz told of going to the top of Mount Rigi Poma to live in a hut with a guide and finish some sketches.

On the second day, while painting, he was captured and taken to one of a series of caves inhabited by some of the 200 bandits who later learned the island.

He said he was compelled to cook, farm, care for cattle and go to nearby villages to buy provisions for his captors.

Finally the bandits left to guard the island and Merz dashed to freedom. For 10 minutes he was in the forest, but he was captured again.

PRESIDENT HOOVER CALLS CONFERENCE ON HOME BUILDING

Finance, Design, Equipment and Household Management Get Attention at Washington Discussions

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15.—A four-day conference to deal with the whole question of home construction and ownership has been called by President Hoover to meet December 2 in Washington under the chairmanship of Secretary Lamont.

In announcing the call for the conference today, the chief executive said it would be the first of its kind on "this subject" in the United States and would embrace discussion of financing, design, equipment, city planning, household management, and many other aspects.

He said he believed such a discussion would "afford a basis for the development of a sound policy and inspire better voluntary cooperation to cope with the problem."

SAN PEDRO, Cal., Sept. 15 (AP)—Two veteran naval officials, who more than 40 years ago were classmates at Annapolis, stood on the gleaming decks of the Battleship Texas today and watched each other assume high commands of the nation's floating forces.

The ship in America's battle fleet brought Admiral Frank H. Schofield into the position of commander-in-chief and raised Vice Admiral H. Leigh to the rank of admiral in command of the battle force, the position relinquished by Admiral Schofield, his Annapolis classmate.

Another Annapolis graduate who preceded Admiral Schofield and Admiral Leigh was in a position to command the command of the nation's floating forces to Schofield. He is Admiral John C. LIFE TERM CONVICT FOILS KANSAS PLOT AND SAVES 25 LIVES

Prisoner Gets Temporary Parole as Reward for Disclosing Hiding Place of Prisoners' Firearms

ANSING, Kas., Sept. 15.—A life-term convict was credited today with frustrating an escape plot at the Kansas penitentiary here which Warden Kirk Prather said would have cost at least 25 lives had it been carried out.

As a reward for disclosing the hiding place of firearms, which the convicts had planned to use early in a desperate bid for freedom, the life-term was granted temporary parole by Governor Harry Woodring on recommendation of the warden.

The name of the informer was withheld in the fear an attempt might be made on his life.

Rescue Workers Find 150 Bodies

BELIZE, British Honduras, Sept. 15 (AP)—(Via Pan-American Radio)—The death toll from hurricane in Belize was raised today as rescue workers found 150 additional bodies under the wreckage of the Catholic church.

Authorities estimated the number of bodies recovered to date at 850, adding that the total probably would be increased with finds of outlying sections are searched.

Immediately after searching, digging in the ruins of the Catholic church, found the bodies, the wreckage was burned.

The bodies were taken to the huge funeral pyres in the center of the city and cremated.

None of the bodies were identified and no ceremonies attended the cremation.

Hundreds of persons are leaving here by boat as living conditions are becoming acute.
