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FISH PLAY PART IN COURT PROCEEDINGS

Piscatory Exhibit Breaks Precedent and Proves Embarrassing to Custodian

Three fish, two little ones and one bigger one, were offered as evidence in district court here yesterday, and the exhibit was said by court attaches to be without precedent in the annals of the court here.

The court reporter, H. M. Brann, being required to retain the exhibit, placed the fish in a desk drawer, and is awaiting developments.

The fish were offered in support of the claim of Dr. C. D. Weaver, Twin Falls county physician, and his wife, Mrs. Meta Weaver, for \$279.00 for the fish, owned by a hatchery here.

Dr. Weaver alleges Mr. Frame accepted his offer of one and three-quarter cents each for 100,000 trout to be taken and counted from Frame's pool, "general run and without reservation as to size" last January, and then culled out the best fish, and delivered many runs.

The small fish shown to the court were culled samples of the inferior fish Frame delivered.

The smaller fish were about three and four inches long, and the larger one about eight inches long. All are said to be of the same brood.

In his deposition Dr. Weaver's complaint, Mr. Frame asserts that in the negotiations when he sold the fish there was no word or intimation as to the size or character of the fish except that the number agreed upon should be delivered from the brood, and at Frame's hatchery. He denies having culled out any fish and asserts that he delivered all the fish he had in the lake, which fell short of the specified number, and that with Dr. Weaver's consent.

POTATO QUOTATIONS SHOW WIDE RANGE

Lately Organized Growers' Association Sets High Mark at 90 Cents Net

The price of potatoes net to the grower quoted here yesterday ranged from 60 cents to 90 cents a hundred pounds for Idaho No. 1 grade, the higher price being quoted by Carl L. DeLong of the lately organized Twin Falls District Potato Growers' association, for a carload of potatoes sold in Chicago.

The Chicago buyers, Mr. DeLong said, reported that this carload of potatoes was one of the first few carloads of good Idaho potatoes they had seen this season.

The first two carloads of commercial pack potatoes, packed in plain bags and marketed through the growers' organization, sold for 50¢ a hundred pounds, net to the growers. Mr. DeLong stated. Commercial pack potatoes now are being offered in the southern markets, and are being sold at low prices, Mr. DeLong said, in order to get the buyers to try them. A strong demand for commercial pack potatoes is anticipated later in the season.

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JURY'S AWARD FAVORS BONDSMEN FOR FARMER

A jury which returned a verdict in district court here yesterday in favor of J. C. Gales, Bush Justice of the peace, and M. J. Japanese farmer, and against G. F. Johnson, Twin Falls, found that Gales and Japanese were not liable for payment of any sum to Johnson under terms of a \$5000 bond which they signed for G. Tomita, Japanese farmer, in March, 1928. The jury received the case at noon and returned the verdict two hours later.

Johnson sued for \$287.25, alleging Tomita had failed to deliver certain mortgaged livestock and farm implements to satisfy a judgment debt. The bond that Oster and Joe

signed was given as security that Tomita, as custodian appointed by the court, would turn over the property on demand. Though the original owner of the property, and he gave to Johnson a mortgage covering it when he rented land near Bush from Johnson in the fall of 1927.

The mortgaged property included 10 horses, two of which died during the four-year period they were held by Tomita as custodian. It was brought out in evidence and argued at the trial that bondsmen were responsible for delivery of all the property or its equivalent. It was shown further that the horses were worth about \$15 each.



Intention to move for a new trial was indicated by J. H. Bodwell of counsel for Johnson. J. W. Taylor was attorney for the defendant bondsmen.
