# SHIPPERS SCHEDULE POCATELLO SESSION

Gate City Chamber Reports  
Plans for Central Western  
Advisory Board Event

POCATELLO, Oct. 29 (Special to The News)—The Pocatello Chamber of Commerce has just announced that the business men of the city, acting in the like chamber, have obtained the twenty-fourth regular meeting of the Central Western Shippers' Advisory board for this city. The meeting will be a two-day affair and will be held in the Hotel Danmore, December 7 and 8. It was announced here today by Paul Nash, secretary of the local chamber of commerce.

It will consist of delegates representing all lines of wholesale and retail trade, manufacturing, farm production and distribution, as well as bankers and other business executives from the states of Colorado, Idaho, Nebraska, Utah, Wyoming and parts of Oregon and Iowa.

These leaders in the economic affairs of this region meet three times each year and consider the trend of all business for the purpose of forecasting in advance the needs of industry for transportation service by the railroads; to analyze and interpret agricultural programs and, with the managers of the railroads in this section, make such plans as will assist in bringing about orderly processes of production, marketing and distribution.

To Discuss Problems  
They are intimately concerned in discussing, for the benefit of all, the views of various lines of commercial activity and they will come to this meeting with definite information in the form of commodity reports on the grain and milling trade, lumber industry, road and building materials, fruit and vegetable industry, livestock producers and feeders, and all the other trade and financial factors in this region.

These reports will reflect the trend of business in these lines during the first three months of the year 1932. In that respect they may be the most valuable barometer that the business men of Idaho will have access to for some time.

This will be the second meeting of this nature ever held in Pocatello and all the industrial leaders of the state of Idaho are being urged to attend and take part in the deliberations.

Met in Twin Falls  
Previous meeting of this organization held in Idaho have been as follows: Pocatello, November 26, 1922; Boise, July 16, 1924; Twin Falls, June 20, 1930. The last meeting of the board was held in Cheyenne, Wyoming, September 29 of this year.

The executive committee, the railroad contact committee and the agricultural council will hold their meetings on Monday, Tuesday will be devoted to the regular board deliberations.

The meetings of the agricultural council and the board are open forum affairs and everyone interested is welcome.

There are no dues or other assessments levied against those who participate.

W. L. Harvey, executive representative of the board, from Pocatello, is visiting various sections of the state and conferring with board members in preparation for the event. He was a visitor in Pocatello Wednesday. Two or three hundred people are expected to attend these meetings.

Hanel, chairman of the local Red Cross, assert that more liberal support than customary will be forthcoming this year. On November 8, which is Red Cross Sunday, all ministers are to give sermons relative to the Red Cross, and talks will be made at clubs, lodges and public gatherings explaining the purpose of the organization and costs and methods of distribution of the funds it handles.

## SHOSHONE'S RED CROSS PLANS FOR RELIEF WORK

SHOSHONE, Oct. 20 (Special to The News)—A Red Cross meeting, to which the public was invited, was held at the courthouse here Tuesday evening, October 20. The purpose of the meeting was to get the organizations together to make the relief or charity work for winter clothing for the county and to elect a new chapter chairman for Lincoln county, to take the place of Mrs. J. J. McMahon who has moved to Idaho.

An executive committee, consisting of Dr. P. E. Barrett, chairman, Stella McFall, L. J. McNeary, chairman of the board of county commissioners, Fred Martin, Mayor Ben Darrah, Mrs. E. O. Gooding and Truman C. Anderson, was appointed to take charge of the relief work. They will elect a sub-committee next Thursday night, when they meet at the home of Mrs. Frank Clem, vice president of the local chapter.

The committee is formed to gather foodstuffs and clothing and have them housed for future use. It was suggested that they buy staple foodstuffs and give them to the needy instead of giving money.

It was also suggested that all clothes be gathered for the Relief society and other organizations to make before they are given out.

The investigating committee will study the cases. It was suggested that the mayor outline work for the unemployed so that they would not feel they were receiving donations, but would be able to work to pay for it.

L. J. McNeary, in behalf of the commissioners, suggested cooperation of all organizations in the county to work under one head, as this method would be less expensive and more ground could be covered.

Mr. McNeary gave these figures to show the people that demands on the county are increasing. In 1930, an average of \$223 a month was expended for the care of county poor and charity, while in 1929 the average amount of money expended was only \$105 a month.

Mrs. E. O. Gooding, home service chairman of the Red Cross, said that \$250 had been paid out since January through the home service department alone.

## POTATO MEN MOVE TO IMPROVE MART

Session at Idaho Falls Recommends Holding All Number 2 Grade Off Market

IDAHO FALLS, Oct. 20 (Special to The News)—A representative meeting of potato growers and dealers in the upper Snake River valley, between Pocatello and Ashton, was held Monday evening, October 27, at Idaho Falls. This meeting was called by the Idaho Falls Chamber of Commerce, upon the request of agricultural interests in this area, for the purpose of discussing ways and means of improving the marketing conditions of the present potato crop.

In view of the price being received by the producer for the Number 2 potato, which is approximately 50 cents a bulk, it was agreed that the fact that these are going on the market in direct competition to the Number 1 grade, and that the Number 2 potatoes will justify a minimum price of 25 cents a bulk weight to the producer.

In discussing the present value of the Number 2 potato it was agreed that the producer was not benefiting himself in selling at the present price, and that the dealer was not benefiting himself in buying at the present price for livestock was in excess of the amount being received. It was estimated that one half of the potatoes being shipped from the state were Number 2 grade.

The representatives present at this meeting recommended and requested that the Idaho Falls Chamber of Commerce forward information of this action to the agricultural organizations throughout the entire state and to the commercial organizations, to banking interests and other groups interested in the Idaho potato industry and to those who are able to present this appeal directly to the producer.

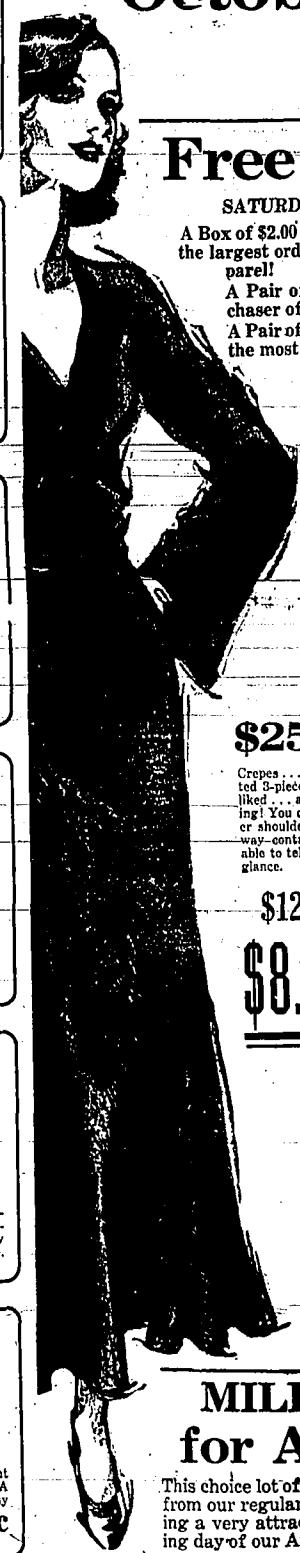

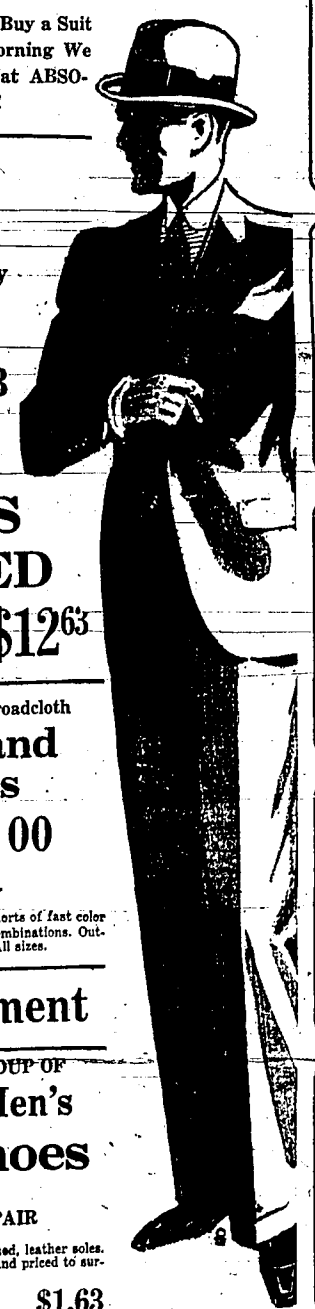

## UNIVERSITY STRAIN LEADS BEAN TESTS

Twin Falls County Agent Announces Results of One Season's Experiments

University of Idaho Great Northern bean seed selection developed on the university experimental plots at Twin Falls yielded 3.5 bushels per acre, as compared with yields ranging from 2.1 to 3.5 bushels per acre by five other strains in the bean field test on the J. S. Feldhusen farm, Kimberly, this year.

Harvey S. Hale, Twin Falls county agent, announced in the current issue of Agricultural Experiment Station Bulletin No. 100, the results of the county agent's office this week.

The University of Idaho selection, designated U. I. No. 4, made only 68 per cent stand, which was the poorest stand in this test. The small stand was attributed to improper storage conditions for the seed. The difference in stand was not considered in figuring the yields, the county agent said. The university selection showed 4.9 per cent blight.

Results of the test of other seed strains used in this test were given as follows:

Levy—100 per cent stand; 6.1 per cent blight; 3.5 bushels per acre yield.  
Arratis—100 per cent stand; 6.2 per cent blight; 2.1 bushels per acre yield.

Certified Great Northern—75 per cent stand; 5.8 per cent blight; 2.4 bushels per acre yield.

Common Great Northern—74 per cent stand; 4.5 per cent blight; 2.1 bushels per acre yield.

Arratis certified—58 per cent stand; 4.9 per cent blight; 2.1 bushels per acre yield.

Testing for one year, the county agent explained, can not be taken as conclusive evidence as to which strain is most desirable, due to varying conditions from year to year. This year blight was not a determining factor in the yield as it was in 1930, and the selection most susceptible to blight gave heavy yields in the western part of the county where blight is ordinarily quite severe. These tests will be carried on another year on a larger scale, and after several years of testing very reliable information should be gained.

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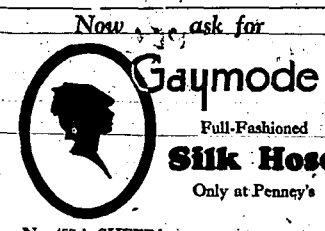

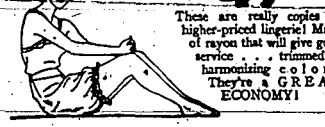
