

# Officers Shoot Robber At Hazelton And Take Two Men Into Custody

**Ben Lawley, 24, Fires Twice Before Dropping Dead Across Threshold of Bank Door; Hugh Coppinger, 21, Surrenders and Former Policeman in Twin Falls, Awaits Probe**

DEATH waited for one of two bandits as they were leaving the Hazelton State bank. Hazelton, shortly after noon yesterday carrying away \$1231 after murdering two bankers and a customer in the bank vault.

Ben Lawley, about 24, fired twice before he fell back dead across the threshold of the bank door, his body riddled with a charge of 23 buckshot.

Hugh Coppinger, 21, his companion, surrendered under fire, a rifle bullet mangleling and carrying away three fingers of his left hand in which he carried a .32 calibre automatic pistol, while attempting to get into the bandit car.

The bullet was fired from a .38 Smith & Wesson caliber revolver, which was aimed at J. W. Thomas, Hazelton, a customer in the bank at the time who was slow about raising his hands. The shot, fired by Copping, passed between Thomas' right arm and his side.

New Jersey, inventor and scientist,

where Lewis machine gun was an outstanding weapon in the World War, died in the heart of the city of New Orleans, La., after a long illness from a drug store adjoining the Louisiana railroad terminal. He was 73 years old.

Colonel Lewis was talking with a friend while waiting for a train home when he collapsed. He died before a doctor could reach him. He had been troubled with a weak heart for several years, but

appeared in court hearing when he left home this morning for his office in New York.

The British government was quick to utilize Colonel Lewis's machine gun as a symbol of the ease of difficulty in obtaining recognition for it by the United States war department. A test by the American air forces finally convinced the war department of its acceptability.

## Buhl Man Faces Charge of Murder in First Degree

Sheriff Signs Complaint Accusing Fred Coppenbarger in Connection With Shooting of C. H. Van Winkle

Fred Coppenbarger, 50, who shot and killed Charles H. Van Winkle, 27, on the Coppenbarger farm north of Buhl the night of November 5, was charged with first-degree murder in a complaint signed by Sheriff R. P. Prater and filed in probate court here yesterday.

Coppenbarger has been held in jail here since the shooting. He said he did not know Van Winkle, but shot when the latter threatened him with a rifle. The fact of the shooting had been peering into the window of the Coppenbarger home and that a little earlier in the evening he had appeared at the door and demanded of Mrs. Coppenbarger to know his whereabouts. Prosecuting Attorney O. W. Grant, following an extensive investigation that Van Winkle "was shot in the back while he was running away."

The first-degree murder charge alleges premeditated shooting. Van Winkle, who came to Buhl about a year ago and stayed there at an uncle's home, has relatives in Clifty, Tennessee.

Coppenbarger, a former stockman, has been resident of the Melton Valley district north of Buhl for many years.


