Turner's alleged companions were Paul Quick, 21, Kansas City, and George Moran, 22, all three are under indictment for alleged violation of the federal automobile theft act.

Prisoners alleged to have attempted the break for liberty last evening, were confined in a cell room with eight others who, it is believed, are not involved. The jail breakers cut through the metal bars and pried open the door to the cell from which they attempted to descend by means of the improvised rope.

The hole in the ceiling was cut yesterday, Sheriff E. P. Foster said. A thorough inspection in the morning, when the prisoners were released from the cage, disclosed no evidence of anything out of the ordinary, the sheriff said.

The other prisoners, Sheriff Foster said, were lying quietly in their bunks inside the cage.

## ACCUSED SHEEPMAN INVOKES RANGE LAW

Jury Receives Case and  
Deliberates Long With-  
out Reaching Verdict

Range law was invoked yesterday in defense of Raymond Rugg, Bush on trial in district court here for alleged grand larceny of 83 sheep belonging to Berry Duncan, Bush, on the range near Rogerson last September 1. A half dozen defense witnesses testified during the day that it has been a practice among sheepmen for many years to put their own brands on unbranded strays in their flocks, and that no one can successfully claim ownership of unbranded sheep.

Defense counsel on the preceding day of the trial had drawn from state witnesses statements that Rugg had cut out 220 strays and turned them to Duncan's band before he began branding his own sheep on September 1.

Bandings from which Rugg marked his sheep with a "wagon wheel" and Duncan branded, his sheep with a "diamond bar," were brought into the court room.

The case went to the jury about 2:30 P. M. following three days trial. No verdict had been returned at midnight, when the jurymen went to bed in the jury room.

Testimony in Rugg's behalf was given during the day by his father, J. J. Rugg, who had made Rugg's branding iron, and by J. J. Ellison, J. B. Law, W. L. Berks, E. R. Baxter, James Wilson and E. Boardway, Bush sheep men. Harold Piercy, Bush boy, who has been subpoenaed as a witness for the prosecution was recalled by defense counsel for further questioning. The accused man himself was the last witness on the stand before the case for the defense was rested. Thereafter attorneys presented their arguments.

## TWIN FALLS HOSPITAL GETS WRECK VICTIMS

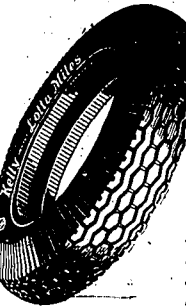
