GANDHI WARNS LONDON CONFERENCE OF COURSE

LONDON (Tuesday morning)—Mahatma Gandhi emerged dramatically from his customary Monday of silence with the fervor of a crusader to launch into a stirring speech in behalf of Indian independence at the round-table conference today.

Indian nationalist orators previously had joined in dramatic midnight appeals to Prime Minister MacDonald to ignore "disfranchisement" and give India a federal constitution with responsibility at the center.

In the midst of the flood of oratory, the Mahatma said that the end of his day of silence, then he suddenly spoke.

"I would strain every nerve to secure an honorable settlement without exposing the millions of India, women and children to the terrible ordeal of civil disobedience," he said.

"But if the fight has to be fought, I will not flinch."

IDAHO WINS CONTEST INVOLVING INSURANCE

BOISE, Nov. 30 (AP)—Idaho today won in the supreme court its long fight to prevent International Brotherhood of United Miners from securing an insurance in this state.

Noted Economists Foresee Bankruptcy and Political Upheaval If French Officials' Views Prevail

NEW YORK, Nov. 30 (AP)—The German situation is gradually reaching its climax, and two conferences held here today by the press will determine to a considerable extent the economic and political fate of Germany.

This view was expressed in an interview today by Dr. Edmond Madoen, dean of the school of commerce, accounts and finance, and Dr. Marcus Nadler, professor of finance, at New York University.

They explained that at present Germany's total amount of short-term debts may be conservatively estimated at between \$1,500,000,000 and \$2,500,000,000. This is substantially above the \$1,000,000,000 estimate in the report of the Virginia committee.

In discussing the cleavage of opinion between France and England and Great Britain and the United States on the other, they said:

"If the French are to have their way, Germany will be forced into bankruptcy which may lead to political upheaval which will not only destroy the status quo but will also destroy Germany's capacity to pay reparations."

Well Known in Finance

Dr. Madoen and Dr. Nadler are well known in the financial world as director and assistant director, respectively, of the Institute of International Finance. They emphasized, however, that in discussing the German situation today, they were speaking strictly as individuals and not as representatives of the institute.

This institute was founded five years ago by the Investment Bankers Association of America.

Prominent New York bankers have been reluctant to issue any statement of opinion on the situation, in advance of the discussion at Berlin and Basel for which Dr. Madoen and Dr. Nadler are expected to sail on Saturday.

In informal interviews, however, they take a pessimistic view of the situation, pointing out that it now is in a bargaining stage, which may be expected to continue for some time.

They said that the situation is not so conciliatory as it appears around American short-term private loans to Germany have been estimated at high as \$1,000,000,000, but now are understood to have been somewhat reduced.

HOOVER PROPOSAL MEETS OPPOSITION

GRIM BATTLE WITH SEA ENDS 12 LIVES

Attempt to Recover \$5,270,000 in Gold and Silver
From Sunken Ship Goes On

BREIT, France, Nov. 30 (AP)—A grim battle against the sea, which has already engulfed a ship and has taken 12 lives since the light began, is going on 20 miles off the coast where the Italian salvage ship Argo is trying to recover the treasure of the sunken liner Egypt.

Five tons of gold bars and 45 tons of silver, worth about \$5,270,000, are the prize. The metal lies in the strong room of the Egypt, 30 feet down, 25 miles southwest of Toulon, and 10 miles from Point du Four, a spot swept by vicious darts where divers can work only at slack water and only in fair weather.

Idaho's Poor Folks Get 41 Bison From Yellowstone Park

MINISTER DECLARES RETURN OF CHRIST NEED OF HUMANITY

Pastor of First Baptist
Church Preaches on Pro-
gram of Savior for Red-
emption For Mankind

Taking for his theme, "The Need of the Hour: The Christian's Blessed Hope," and for his text, John 1:3, Dr. George H. Young, Hollywood, temporary pastor of the First Baptist church in Twin Falls, Idaho, declared the great need of the world to be "The Lord's Return to establish His reign."

"Christ is coming," he declared, "and the world is ripe for it," he declared. In part Dr. Young said:

"Christianity is supernatural. When the fullness of time was come, the promise appeared. That was His first advent, and the culminating fact of His earthly career was His ascension into heaven. But before He went He said 'I will come again.'"

"That is Jesus now? The answer to that question is given in the New Testament. He is in heaven. The Apostles' Creed teaches that fact. He ascended into heaven and sits at the right hand of God the Father. Almighty whence He shall come to judge the quick and the dead. Christ's second coming to this earth again is clearly taught and definitely promised."

"Through the long centuries of the Christian era there have been controversies over the teaching of the Lord's return and perversion of the doctrine have brought ridicule and reproach. But this blessed hope of the believer and of the church should be presented in its loveliness as a ceaseless source of encouragement for God's children in dark and troublous times."

"According to the New Testament, the next event in Christ's program of redemption is His advent in glory for the consummation of righteousness. His first coming had to do with humiliation and sacrifice, with only flashes of His divine power being manifested. But the next advent will be for judgment and glorification of goodness. So we look for the Saviour out of heaven, the Lord Jesus Christ. And this expectation of the believer is in itself an experience filled with glowing hope of victory over injustice and sin."

"There is tremendous need for another advent of Christ—this time in the power of righteousness, for the world of men is in a tragic condition. As one looks at these two billion souls in this planet, nothing things appear. It is a world in which God has provided plentiful resources for all, but millions all starving along cut a pitiful existence. It is a restless political world; old forms of government are being overthrown and new strange systems tried; great armies stand ready to strike at each other in cataclysmic destruction. All this and more is an evidence of human inadequacy, injustice, and sin. The thing we have developed, called civilization, will bring our own de-

struction unless there is injected into it a power beyond human.

"The church, as present constituted, seems impotent to bring better things to the world. Yes, they are guilty as the governments for the all great war. And now nearly all of them are losing ground. At the end of the last century some churches were gaining five per cent faster than the population. 161 4-H CLUBS WORK IN SOUTH IDAHO AREA

BURLEY, Nov. 30 (Special to The News)—There are 151 standard 4-H clubs in the South Central Idaho club district with a total membership of 1287, as disclosed by the annual report of Dan E. Warren, Burley, district extension club agent. There are eight counties in the district.

There were 22 boys and girls enrolled in club work in Camas county, 184 in Cassia, 33 in Blaine, 136 in Lincoln, 138 in Jerome, 138 in Gooding, 266 in Twin Falls and 89 in Min-

Idaho counties. The projects taken up by the club youngsters comprised aviculture, dairy calf, beef calf, corn, potatoes, sugar beets, beans, food, sewing, canning and room improvement. Of these projects, sewing had the largest enrollment, namely 558, followed by foods, with 374. Dairy calf projects had 193 enrolled, aviculture 108, sheep 30 and beef calf 41. There were nine each in beets and beans, and seven each in corn and potatoes.

Percentages of project completions varied from as high as 61.9 per cent in Gooding, 61.9 per cent in Camas, 60.1 per cent in Lincoln, down to 33.4 per cent in Blaine, where the enrollment was very low.
