CHICAGO, Dec. 15.—My good luck in being chosen as the healthiest 4-H girl in the country wouldn't be half so funny if people didn't make such a fuss about it all. The hullabaloo of taking our pictures, asking us all kinds of silly questions and everything connected with winning the championship is just like life in a big city. I guess—hurry, hurry, come and make noise, make noise. It's sure a lot different from life on my father's 200-acre farm in Dakota county, Nebraska, where we get up at 6:30 in the morning and go to bed around 9 o'clock at night.

Personally I don't like a big city. It's too noisy and dirty. People are too much in a hurry, and there's not enough fresh air. They keep asking me how I happen to be so healthy, and I have to laugh. There's no secret to it. I just grew up that way, thanks to my mother. They seem to think I should be athletic just because I won the health contest, but I don't have time

for athletics in high school because our farm is 11 miles out, and I have to get home after school to help mother.

There's a lot of work for a girl on any farm, and I get lots of it because I'm the only girl in our family. One of my brothers is older than I am, and two are younger. My exercise in housework makes up for any other athletics I miss. But I like all kinds of housework—really I do—even dish-washing. We do a lot of canning at our house, putting up fruits and vegetables, and I enjoy canning especially. Sometimes I milk the cows when my father and brothers are away, but I don't make a practice of it. I like to ride horseback, and I'm a good rider. In school I'm taking a straight course. They don't give home economics at South Sioux City high, but I've had plenty of that right at home.

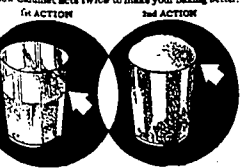

PIONEER IN RUPTIT HEARS FINAL CALL

R. F. Ray, 64, Dies After
Long Illness at Home
On Minidoka Project

RUPTIT, Dec. 17 (Special to The News)—Rupert, Idaho, Dec. 17, 1931. R. F. Ray, a native of Trondheim, Norway, died Wednesday night, at his home after a long illness extending over a period of two years. Death was due to spinal trouble.

For the last 21 months Mr. Ray has been confined to his bed, much of the time a great sufferer. When 37 years of age he with his mother, two brothers and a sister, came from the old country and went to Chicago in 1884. Five years later his marriage to Anna Josephine Nelson, Chicago, took place. She with their four children survive. Two sons, Sidney, of the forestry service, Ralph, Rupert, and their only daughter, Mrs. Zora Martin, Hermiston, Oregon, were at the bedside of the dying father. The son, Walter Ray, Olympia, Washington, was here recently, having left only a few days ago.

When Mr. Ray came to Idaho in 1909 he bought a farm near Ada and while his family farmed he established himself in the plumbing business here. He was succeeded in Hagerman, Wendell, Oakley and Rupert. Of later years he and his son Ralph operated the Rupert business.

His brothers, Olat E. Ray, attorney in Chicago, a younger brother, Thoralf Ray, also of Chicago, a niece in Boise, and a nephew in Seattle also survive.

Awaiting funeral arrangements, the body lies at the Goodman Mortuary here.

MOSCOW HEARS OF IDAHO MINE ASSETS

Stewart Campbell, State Inspector, Sees Bright Future in Mining Work

MOSCOW, Dec. 17 (Special to The News)—"The depression may depress metal prices to the point where many mining operations are forced to curtail or suspend entirely, but the people of Idaho should not lose sight of the fact that no depression, no matter how severe, can take away the state's vast ore reserves or destroy the bright outlook for its mining industry," declared Stewart Campbell, state inspector of mines, in an address before the students of the University of Idaho school of mines this week. Mr. Campbell spoke on the present situation in the mining industry and the future outlook.

After discussing the development work done in Idaho during the past year, in which he emphasized particularly the activity of the large interests concerned in proving new districts and developing ore-bodies for long-time operations, Mr. Campbell asserted he was more convinced than ever that Idaho offers greater mining opportunities than any other state in the nation. "I have made this statement many times," he explained, "each year's progress in Idaho makes its soundness more apparent."

Tells of Gold and Antimony Accomplishments of the Bradley interests in the Yellow Pine district in Valley county demonstrate that gold mines, really big ones, can be found in Idaho if fortitude, nerve, and initiative are present. Mr. Campbell asserted he predicted that the Yellow Pine district was destined to become one of the great mining areas of the state. He also forecast that some day this district would supply the United States with antimony, 55 per cent of which is now imported from China.

Mr. Campbell told the mine students that their state's mining industry produced \$30,000,000 a year, ranked second in lead and third in silver output. Idaho produces one-fourth of the nation's lead and one-eighth its silver, he added. Because of low metal prices the production for 1931 will fall below the average of \$30,000,000, he explained, but urged his listeners not to lose sight of the fact that Idaho's vast ore reserves were still intact and would continue to add to the state's wealth as generously as ever when conditions returned to normal.

NEW POTATO GRADE RULES REACH TOWN

State Department of Agriculture Gives Out Special Pack Regulations

Complete details of the new grading and branding rules of the new special pack approved by growers generally, it is stated at their recent meeting at Idaho Falls and at other meetings, providing for a special pack including 90 per cent or more of large numbers 1 potatoes, and 20 per cent of smaller ones, were received yesterday by the district office of the state department of agriculture.

It is claimed that the new pack, when properly branded will meet the requirements of the national grade, with a minimum size of 6 ounces. The remaining 20 per cent shall consist of potatoes meeting the requirements of the United States number 2 grade, with the following exceptions:

1. Only two second growth knolls that will not break off in transit.
2. Not to exceed three small worm holes.
3. No clipped or cut potatoes allowed.

4. Healed ground cracks not seriously deforming the potato.

"In order to allow for varieties incident to commercial grading and handling, not more than 5 per cent by weight, of the entire lot may be below the preferred size and in addition not more than 5 per cent by weight of the entire lot may be below the quality requirements of this pack as specified herein and not to exceed one-sixth of this tolerance or one per cent shall be allowed for potatoes affected by soft rot."

"This does not provide any tolerance in the 90 per cent portion which shall meet all requirements of the United States number 1 grade. The entire tolerance applies only to the remaining 20 per cent."

BRANDING

"The wording on the front of the bag to read as follows: IDAHO POTATOES SPECIAL PACK FEDERAL-STATE INSPECTED 100 LBS. NET WHEN PACKED"

"The wording on the reverse side of the bag to read as follows: 'Eighty per cent or more United States number 1—6 ounce minimum. Twenty per cent or less United States number 2—10 ounce minimum.'"

"All lettering to be in two inch letters or larger, and the lettering on the reverse side to be in block letters in the center of the bag."

COUNTY AGENT AT JEROME REPORTS

Thomas E. Speedy, Agricultural Agent, Tells of Activities During Year

JEROME, Dec. 17 (Special to The News)—Thomas E. Speedy, Jerome county agricultural agent, today issued a brief summary of activities carried on through his office during the last year.

Results of the weed eradication program, in which the Idaho highway department cooperated, indicated that farmers could control weeds where sufficient chemical was applied and where irrigation water was held off the weed patches.

Experimental planting of the new strains of Great Northern beans proved gratifying, the report stated. Special disease-resistant out-tined seed has been developed in the county this year and will be available to planters next year. Additional experiments with soy beans, indicated that that crop can be successfully grown in Jerome county. Wisconsin Black, Mandarin, Ho San Min and Manchou were found best adapted to Jerome county soil and conditions.

The report told of experiments with soil fertilizers, especially triple-super-phosphate, which revealed that increased yields and quality were not sufficient to pay the cost of the application of the chemicals, except in the case of alfalfa, and possibly sugar beets. The tests were made with oats, potatoes, beets and hay, and although slight increase in yields were recorded, the margin of difference was not sufficient to pay the cost.

Experiments in sub-soiling showed the practice to be definitely valuable in moisture conserving, deeper root penetration results from use of especially constructed "chisels."

A new fly-resistant sugar beet seed yielded satisfactory crops in two fields in the county this year, the report shows, and it is expected that extensive use of the new variety will be made next year.

The report told of potato growers' meetings, distribution of information on lamb feeding, dairymen's picnic and tours, cattle testing, study of egg quality production, rabbit breeding, farm forestry, planting farm management conference, women's club meetings, organization of 16 new 4-H clubs and a 4-H club which was organized during the year.

The following statistics were noted in the report as it was sent to the extension office at Washington: Days in office, 352; days in field, 220; office calls, 1,637; telephone calls, 742; farm visits, 261; home visits, 126; individual letters written, 1,638; 21 circular letters were written, totaling 562 copies; new articles prepared, 90; bulletins distributed, 185; special help given, 45 days; meetings held by the county agent, 71; and attended by 2043 persons; 14 method demonstrations were held, and 243 result demonstrations; 30 demonstrations were completed, or carried through the year; 1343 demonstrations involved 93 acres.

The annual report for Jerome county complete, and details and figures for all demonstrations and experiments are on file in the county agent's office, available for all who are interested, Mr. Speedy stated tonight.
