DAWES REPRESENTS AMERICA IN COMING SESSION ON ARMS

President Hoover Also Announces Intention to Disregard Precedent and Send Woman to Geneva

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Dec. 22—Charles G. Dawes, a paragon of disarmament, will speak for America at the big disarmament conference in Geneva.

President Hoover announced today that the former U. S. ambassador to the League of Nations would head the delegation of the United States.

In addition, he let it be known that another precedent would be shattered and a field hither to closed to women opened.

The whole question of disarmament, it has been of profound interest to the women of the United States, the president told newspapermen at today's press conference.

"They have shown great interest in it for many years and I have determined to appoint a woman as a member of the delegation. I am now conferring with a lady high in the position as to her acceptance of that important mission."

MISSOURIAN IDENTIFIES HARLEM "BABY KILLERS"

NEW YORK, Dec. 22 (AP)—Quarried by six officers, a young man from Missouri, George Brecht, nervously told a witness stand today and identified Vincent Coli and Frank Giordano as the Harlem "baby killers."

The "mystery witness" whose testimony the state hopes will send the two gunmen to the electric chair, said he had seen them fire indiscriminately from a slowly-moving automobile into a crowd of children who thronged a tenement district sidewalk last July 29.

It was the fire from their weapon, he testified, which killed 3-year-old Michael Vannelli and wounded four of the child's playmates.

DIAMOND'S COFFIN SINKS IN DISHONOR

"Goodbye Boy" Sobs Widow of Outlaw Forgotten by Gang—Rejected by Church

NEW YORK, Dec. 22 (AP)—Through most of his adult years Jack (Lep) Diamond lived outside the laws of decency and state, surviving by the odds, trickery, and bagdadism to become a "big shot" in gangland.

Tonight his puny body lay in unhealed ground, finally shrouded in a shallow grave, deserted by all save his relatives, a few family friends and the wife he had neglected.

No overloads of gangdom stood any in the drizzling rain today as his casket was hurriedly lowered into the muddy ground in Mount Olivet cemetery, in Queens.

There was no pomp such as has been accorded in the past to a leader of the underworld. The only farewell was the muffled voice of his widow, sobbing "goodbye-boy."

Around the grave stood a few curious spectators, mostly women. There were only two policemen there.

Hoped in Vain

To the last, Diamond's widow hoped that the church, whose laws he had contemptuously disregarded, might permit his burial in consecrated ground. Permission was withheld.

The grave of the murdered gunman is located in a new and rather poor section of the non-sectarian cemetery.

BACKERS OF YOUNG PLAN FACE VEILED THREAT IN REPORT

Reparations Committee Tolls To Conclude Work On Document Destined to Play Important Part in Economics

(By The Associated Press) BASEL, Switzerland, Dec. 22—The report of the reparations committee expects to present as a Christmas present to the world tomorrow is a veiled threat on the life of the law-abiding Young plan. It was reported tonight in international banking quarters.

Just how "straight-forwardly" the document will put the matter remains for tomorrow to reveal. The persons usually well-informed said observations will be made which clearly indicate some changes in the Young plan should be effected.

It was expected, however, that the parts treating this subject will be so veiled that the French may contend the text means the changes proposed are temporary and that they will be valuable during the period of the present depression only.

At the same time, it was said, the Germans, backed by Great Britain, the United States and the neutral members of the committee, may influence the report as meaning death to the Young plan.

There was some irregularity in the bond market, reflecting the month-long and year-long liquidation here and there, but the trend was again predominantly upward, and net advances of \$10 to \$50 per bond of \$1,000 par value were numerous at the close.

There were numerous advances of \$1 and \$2 a share in principal stocks. Trading in both markets was quiet, but Wall Street appeared to be fully under the influence of the holiday spirit.

The ability of the share market to turn upward again, after a year's brief setback, was regarded as highly encouraging.

Five Persons Die When Library Roof At Vatican Falls

VATICAN CITY, (Wednesday Morning) Dec. 22 (AP)—Bodies of two more victims were taken from the ruins of the Vatican library at 8 A. M. today, making the casualties three known dead and two women still missing. It was considered certain the death toll would be five. The tragedy was caused by the collapse of the roof of one of the wings of the library building.

A young Italian lawyer was the first victim removed.

The attorney, Marco VALLAROA, was carried from the roof of the building through two floors of the building, destroying ceilings decorated by priceless frescoes. This collapse was caused by cracks in one of the walls which had been discovered Tuesday morning, but was pronounced alarming by a Vatican architect only two hours before the pile of masonry came tumbling down.

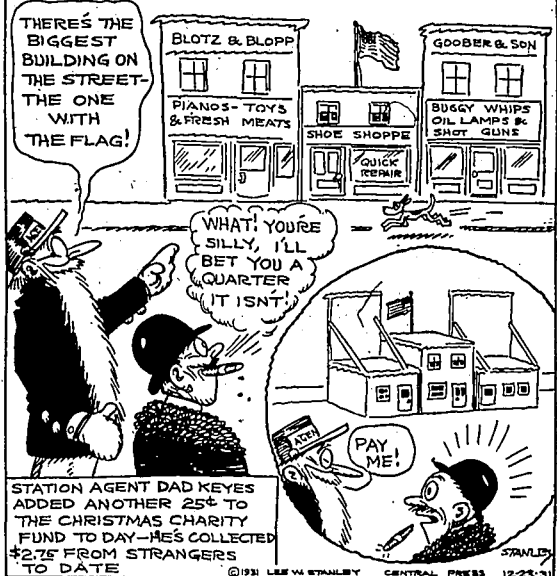

Twin Falls Police Officer One of Score On List to Divide \$1000 For Taking of Wendell Bank Robber

Nearly a score of Idaho citizens are in line to share in the distribution of a \$1000 reward which St. Louis metropolitan police officers for Earl Reed alias Rose, convicted of robbery of the Wendell State bank in July 1930, and later released from the Idaho state prison to return to St. Louis to answer for murder of William McCormack, St. Louis patrolman.

Reed pleaded guilty December 7 to the murder charge and was sentenced to serve a life term in the Missouri state prison, according to advices received here today by W. A. Sears, Twin Falls police officer who was a deputy sheriff in Jerome county at the time of the Wendell robbery and took part in the search for the bandit. Reed, according to these advices, also pleaded guilty in St. Louis to two robbery charges and was sentenced to serve 10-year terms on each charge, the sentence to run concurrently.

Reed and Phillip "Dutch" Simons, his accomplice in the Wendell robbery took refuge in the mountains of the Wood River region above Itasca, and were captured a few days later at Minidoka where they were taken from a freight train on which they were endeavoring to make their escape.

Minidoka county officers, as well as former sheriffs and deputy sheriffs of Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln and Malheur counties are named by the St. Louis police department's letter as possible participants in division of the \$1000 reward.

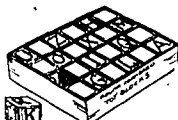
