## CHRISTMAS CROWDS MANIFEST HOLIDAY SPIRIT OF SAFETY

Churches, Lodges and Public Institutions Make Preparations For Fitting Observance of Day

Cloudy weather which marked Christmas eve had no discouraging effect on the crowds that thronged the streets and visited the gayly decorated and brilliantly lighted mercantile establishments. Stores, hotels, auto companies and other places of business had elaborate Christmas trees or Yuletide decorations.

Many social activities marked the evening, while Christmas Sunday school programs were given in the Lutheran and Methodist churches and at the Salvation Army headquarters. The postoffice forces have been taxed to the utmost during the last week with the sending of presents out of the city and the delivery of presents and packages throughout the city. The organization under the management of Captain P. W. Monrobert, worked smoothly and efficiently and the mail was delivered on regular time unless delayed in arrival in the city.

Religious services will be a feature of the celebration. The celebration beginning with the splendid and impressive program given last night at Asenation Episcopal church ushering in Christmas day.

At St. Edward's Catholic church, the usual three masses for Christmas day, will be celebrated by the pastor, Monsignor Kent R. Keyser, beginning at 8 o'clock with high mass and solemnity by the full choir at 9 A. M.; followed by a low mass immediately thereafter, and closing with a low mass at 10:30 A. M. at which the pupils of St. Edward's parochial school will sing Christmas hymns and carols. There will be brief sermons at the 8, 9 and 10:30 masses. There will be Communion service at Asenation Episcopal church at 10:30 A. M.

At Emmanuel Lutheran church, there will be special Christmas program at 11 A. M. with sermon by the pastor, Mr. H. Ziegler. In the afternoon at 8 o'clock, there will be presentation of the Cantata "Tidings of Comfort and Joy" by the regular church choir and the children's chorus; featuring vocal solos and choruses. One of the most impressive lodge services ever held in the city will be that presented by the Klutha Temple, a group of more than a score of Christmas carolers set out from the Presbyterian church at 4:30 A. M. on an annual visit to the hospital and to the homes of Twin Falls, bringing in their songs a bright message of Christmas cheer to sick and afflicted ones.

Christmas day is to be observed at the hospital with Christmas dinner for the county's wards who are confined to the institution or are residents there.

Members of the nursing staff, who will not exchange presents among themselves today, but they had pooled the money that they would have spent for gifts, and will use it to provide some of the essentials of Christmas cheer for a number of needy families.

In nearly 150 homes in and about Twin Falls the day will be made brighter by reason of baskets and toys that were selected and sent out yesterday from a generous store of contributions at the Associated Charities hall. Throughout the day, E. J. Finch, Associated Charities chairman, and last evening, new calls were received for a helping hand, especially in preventing disappointment of little folks on Christmas morning. The average family which received a contribution to Christmas cheer from the Associated Charities was composed of five persons, Mr. Finch said.

Eighty-six girls in and about Twin Falls who are 12 years of age, or younger, are invited to attend the first annual Christmas tree party in the Elks hall at 2 P. M. today. An enormous evergreen that was too big to be set in the hall until the top was trimmed, has been placed in the middle of the hall and decorated with hundreds of twinkling colored lights and much tinsel and color. The Elks have prepared for their little guests nearly 1000 bags, each containing a big handful of candy and nuts and an orange. During a short wait for Santa Claus to arrive and distribute the treat, the children will be led by Lem Chaplin, a past exalted ruler of the lodge, in singing Christmas carols.

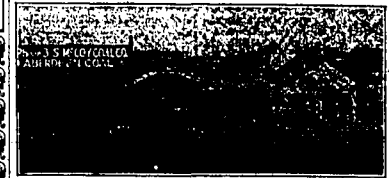

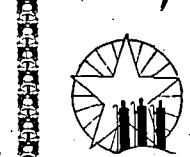
