Modern Co-Ed in Idaho Looks Chic But Saves Money

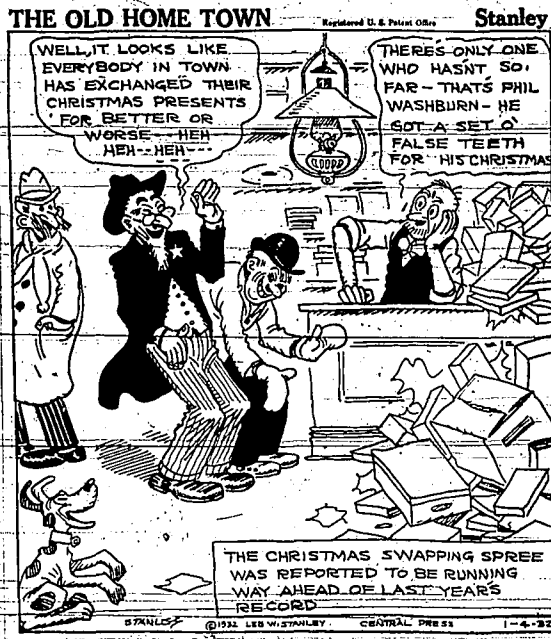

**\$56,000 DEFICIT
CAUSES INCREASE
IN HOSPITAL TAX**

Twin Falls County Commissioners' Statement Explains Levy's Advance From 9 to 25 Cents

On account of approximately \$56,000 deficit in operation of Twin Falls county general hospital the past two years, Twin Falls county commissioners have increased the 1931-1932 hospital tax levy 16 cents from 9 to 25 cents on each \$100 of assessed valuation in 1930, according to a statement given out by James Barrow, chairman of the board of county commissioners, last evening.

The total deficit the statement says, \$56,000 exceeded \$32,000, was caused by lowering by the former board of rates charged for pay patients of the hospital, together with the almost no farm products prices. A \$40,000 deficit in the hospital's operation this year was apparent to the board when it fixed taxes last October, the statement says.

The operation of the hospital in 1930, according to the county auditor's annual report, cost \$106,000.78.

Here is the commission's statement: "The question has been asked why the hospital tax for 1931 was increased over the tax levied in previous years. We would have answered in the affirmative the fact that the tax levied made in September, 1931, payable in December, 1931, and was expected to carry over into the expense of the year 1931. When the present board went into office in January, 1931, it found that the expense of the hospital had exceeded the cash receipts by \$41,608.87. These expenditures included the expense of the hospital and the care of the old folks in the home, in addition to the care of the indigent in the hospital proper. The county auditor's report, page 24, shows that the total amount raised and collected during the year 1930, for the hospital was \$25,705.71, leaving a net deficit of \$15,903.16. This deficit was caused by two things—first, the lowering by the former board of the rates charged at the hospital for pay patients, and second, which has the greater bearing upon the question of the prospective pay patient to meet properly his obligation to the hospital and thus compelling the county to bear the cost at least temporarily this added burden.

In order to determine the amount necessary to pay the probable deficit for 1931 our figures had to be based upon the expenditures and the cash receipts for the first eight months of that year. While the expenses were being rigidly supervised and cut where possible, the receipts were also declining sharply, and it was found that there would be a probable deficit of not less than \$46,000 for this year. Adding this deficit to the deficit of nearly \$18,000 for 1930, and considering the further fact that our assessed valuation had been decreased approximately five million dollars, as well as the further probability of the slow collection of the 1931 taxes, the board felt that it was necessary to levy the maximum tax of twenty-five cents on the hundred dollars of assessed valuation for the hospital, which it might add, a poor or indigent tax.

According to the county auditor's records, if every cent of this 1931 hospital tax were to be paid, it would exceed the sum of \$61,918.31, and the board would have a deficit of about \$6,000. With the amount of taxes that are going and should be about this year, it will readily be seen that this tax will in all probability not produce enough this year to clear up the deficits for both 1930 and 1931.
