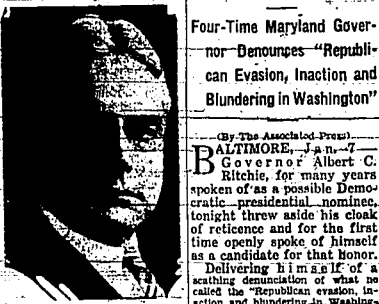

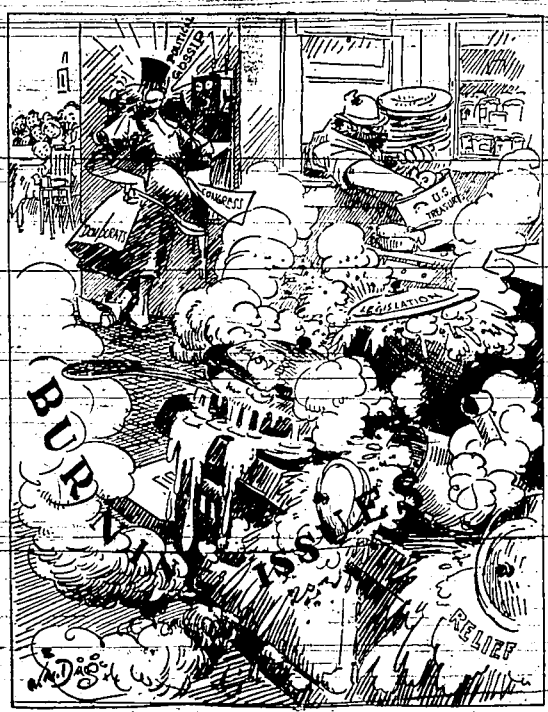

BURLEY PLANS FOR LEADERSHIP WEEK

Agricultural Program Consists of Lectures and Instruction by Experts

BURLEY, Jan. 7 (Special to The News)—Speakers and instructors for Leadership Week to be held in Burley, February 1 to 8, inclusive, are being lined up at the local University extension office by County Agent W. W. Palmer in cooperation with officials of the University of Idaho.

The agricultural program consists of lectures and instruction to be given by extension specialists and agricultural experts each day of the season, one hour meetings both morning and afternoon. On Monday, the first day, G. R. McBride, soil specialist, will discuss soil types and requirements of the Mininko project in the morning. In the afternoon he will speak on crop relations and commercial fertilizers.

On Tuesday, Claude Wakeland, head of the department of entomology, will talk on insect pests and their control, both morning and afternoon. He will discuss the wire worm situation in Cassia county, alfalfa weevil and grasshopper control. On Wednesday, E. R. Bennett, extension horticulturist, is expected to be present to discuss production practices to improve potato quality.

Thursday, both morning and afternoon periods will be taken up by E. T. Benson, extension economist, who is now in Washington. Mr. Benson will discuss the agricultural outlook for 1932. Friday, E. F. Rindler, extension animal husbandman, is on the program. His subject will be the utilization of farm-grown feeds and by-products for feeding livestock.

The public is invited to attend these meetings, which are open to all without charge. At the conclusion of the talks questions on the subjects discussed will be answered by the speakers.
