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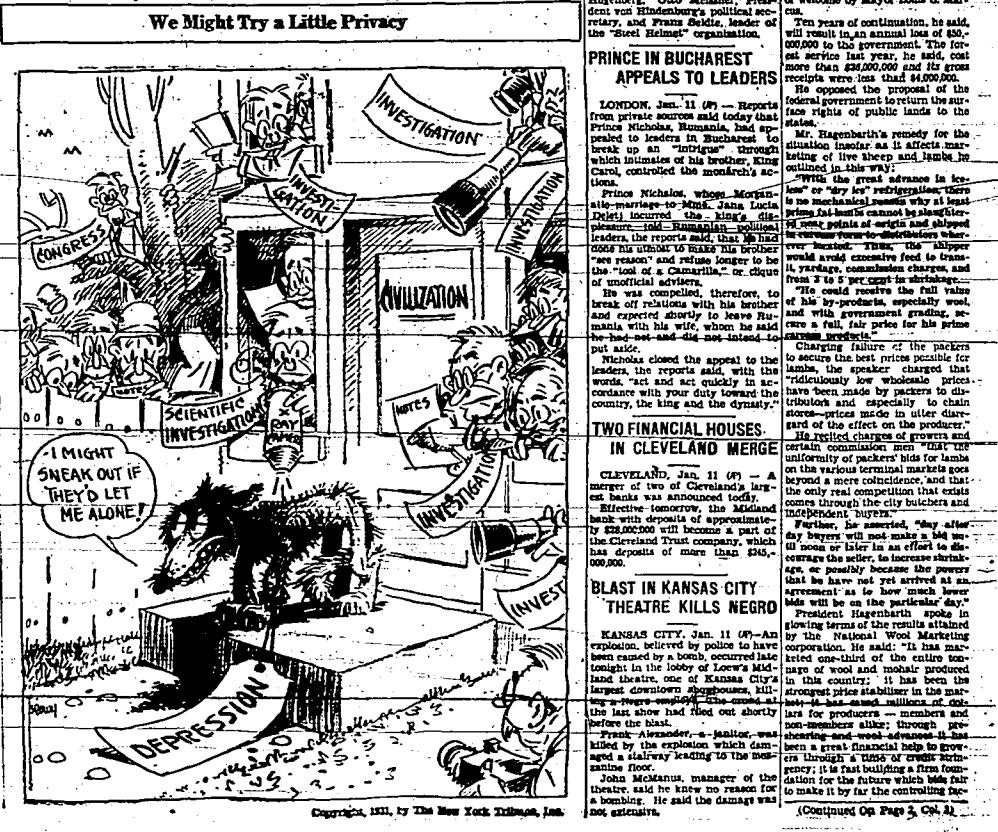
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BURLEY RESIDENTS ENJOY GATHERINGS

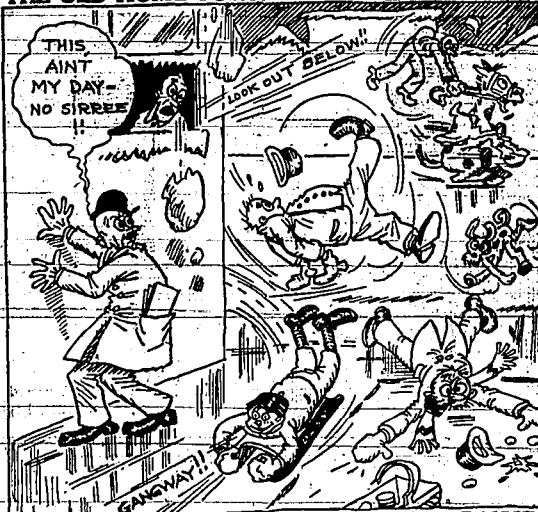

POTATO SHIPMENTS AT BURLEY SHOW INCREASE

BURLEY, Jan. 11 (Special to The News)—Following a lull during holiday times, potato shipments are somewhat on the increase from the Burley irrigation district territory. The price is still far from being attractive to growers, the top being 50 cents and a little less, a 100 pound bulk and with sacks and twine furnished by the dealer. Number 2a is \$1.00 a ton.

The proportion of number 2a is larger than usual. The quality of the tubers, however, is said to be very satisfactory. Car loadings from Burley and Declo, up to the end of December, have been 1412 shipments of this number of cars, a little over one-third was forwarded from Declo. About 600 cars were forwarded from Burley, together with scattering loads, together with scattering loadings from other points on the project.

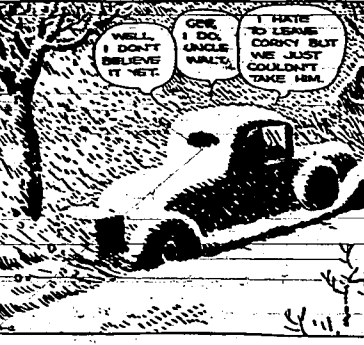
